2002 was a soft year for club racing at Cowan. Several spring weekends were canceled due to heavy conditions and in the summer we suffered through multiple hot and muggy high-pressure drifters. Only a few boats got in enough races to qualify for the fleet championship trophy. James Taylor finished on top followed by Mike Brock and Ken Irwin. In between club races Taylor, Brock, Dick Pugh and Steve Weeber were regulars on the regatta circuit.

Major Regattas

Representing Cowan, James Taylor, Mike and Alicia Kemp and Mike Brock did a few of the major Starting out at 02' St. Pete championships. championship, Mike and Mike crewed for Jim to a 36th In July Taylor/Kemp and Brock doubleplace finish. deck their boats and headed to the ACC's at Rehoboth. Jim, Mike and Alicia sailed exceptionally well placing 3rd and qualifying for the Pam Am Trials. Mike Brock with an east coast crew finished 37th. The all night trip back to Cincinnati was a bit long and tiring as they endured two flat trailer tires. In August, the same two boats head to the NA's. Taylor/Kemp team finished 12th in the Championship fleet and qualified for the World's. Mike Brock finished 24th in the Governor's

In November, Dick Pugh and Bill Young took their boats to Bluenose. Bill finished 21st and Dick 25th. Jim Taylor

crewed for Eric Brandt (Leatherips) and guided him to a 5th place finish.

Fall-In Regatta

Cowan's annual fall regatta is the district's second most attended regatta other than Pymatuning's Spring Classic or the district venue. This year we hosted 17 boats in cold, wet and windy conditions. Cowan was proud to put ten of its own boats on the line. Some new additions included Jeff Pugh (son of Dick Pugh), who came back from Chicago to skipper Mike Kemp's "Hazardous Waste" club boat. Bob Frantz and son Eric got some first time experience in their boat that they usually club race. John Hayes who spent the last 15 years restoring Lightning #96, yes #96, had his daughter Betsey and Ed Auer join him on the race coarse. While #96 is not competitive with the newer boats, it was a real delight for us to see #96 on the coarse. In Joker's Wild we saw a skipper change as Jim Taylor turned the helm over to its owner Mike Kemp, and did the crewing with Mike's wife Alicia.

Saturday started out with a 30-minute delay to see if the wind would settle down. With little change in the wind and some light drizzle, the race committee sent the fleet out. Three long races were sailed in shifty conditions. After Saturday, Cowan boats including Mike Kemp, Dick Pugh, Steve Weeber and Mike Brock dominated the top of the fleet. Unfortunately for Mike Brock a 4th place in the third race was DSQ Sunday morning that dropped him in overall standings. In the end it was Mike Kemp showing us he is as good as Jim Taylor with a second place overall finish. Dick Pugh, or "master of Cowan", followed in third with steady regatta crew Jeff and Susan Ross. Other places include Steve Weeber (6th), Bill Young (8th), Jeff Pugh (10th), Mike Brock (12th), Ken Irwin (14th), Jim Young (15th) and John Hayes (17th). 2003 will be Cowan's 30th year for its Fall-In regatta. We plan to do extra marketing to get 25 boats on the line. For those out of district boats, this is a perfect venue to get ready for Bluenose.

Fleet Membership

Fleet skipper activity has remained about the same level as 2001. However, we saw a significant increase in crew activity. One boat has changed hands and we expect the new owners (Kathy & Dennis Rhoades) to become active club racers.

Year-End Get Together

Mike and Ann Brock hosted the annual year-end Christmas party at their house with traditional Italian food, drinks and plenty of pool hustling. Many long-time and past Cowan Lightning sailors were on hand along with the new crew.

The Summer Bay Race was won by Al Mast with Ted Ganley and Tom Hopkins in hot pursuit. The Fall Bay Race marked the end of the racing season with another Bullet by Al Mast followed up by Jim Hopkins and John Farquhar.

The James V. Ganley Fleet Champion Trophy went to Jim Hopkins this year after a very close battle with his father. This was the first year since the inception of this award that the Fleet Champion was not decided until the final race of the season.

Fleet 325 sails at Rehoboth Beach, Delaware on the beautiful Rehoboth Bay, acclaimed to be among the finest sailing waters on the east coast. Our fleet has dwindled down from a one time fleet of over thirty boats, to only three boats and we have not been having fleet races for several years. Each year we have tried to sponsor at least one open regatta. This has normally been the Delaware Governors Cup Regatta with 10 to 15 boats attending.

This year, things were different. We had planned to hold the Governors Cup, but in January we were asked if we would cosponsor the Atlantic Coast Championships. We were told to expect 30 to 40 boats, and after the proposal was accepted by the RBSA Board of Trustees, three members of our fleet, Chris Raubacher, Barry Pierce, and Dave Racine began to plan for the event with the help of Mike Beaver. With a lot of help from Washington and SSA people, we began to expand and detail our plans.

As we moved along, the attendance picture began to change with the notice that this regatta was to also be a qualifier for the Pan Am Games. So we upped our preparations to handle 45 boats. Things worked out well with lots of people offering to help with the regatta. A great race committee was lined up and the use of several motor boats were offered, plus several necessary items were donated.

As the beginning day of the regatta approached and came to be, we found ourselves with 64 boats registered to sail. There was a great deal of anxiety as to our ability to handle that many boats.

However, the early planning proved to be good and the regatta came off with very few problems. If fact it was so successful that RBSA has been asked about hosting other regattas and this thought has been received favorably by the club. Due to scheduling conflicts it was decided to forgo the Governors Cup this year, but we are hoping to reschedule it for 2003 and expect it to be bigger and better than ever.



The Whatley Lightning has always been fast. This year saw the arrival of a new Whatley craft [#15047] and this one was REALLY fast. With Christian doing most of the skippering and his dad serving as an able substitute, Team Whatley won the Blair Trophy for the July Series, the Custance Cup for the Around the Lake Race, the Russell award for the August Series, and the Howdy Wood Trophy for the season championship. They capped their stellar season by winning the annual regatta. This is the first time in many years that the regatta trophy hasn't gone to a visiting boat.

The rest of us did have fun in the wake of the Whatley's. Dwight Gertz received the Pop Closson Bowl for the last three races of the season. Art Cunningham came within a point of winning the July series and finished up second for the season. Wally Ackley, Bob Sengstaken, and Doug DeCluit rounded out the top five for the season. As the roster shows, there are now over 20 Lightnings in our neighborhood. 14 of them raced at least once in the Summer of 2002 and several others were seen day sailing. Two owners didn't race themselves but crewed for other sailors.

The fleet's annual dinner saw a record number of other awards. 13 children received participation awards donated by Art Cunningham. Janet Rosenquist was recognized as a super crew for eight years of sailing in every race. The coveted Golden Bucket trophy was awarded, after much deliberation, to Will Abbott, who managed to capsize twice in one day. The Fleet Spirit award was given by outgoing Fleet Captain Doug DeCluitt to Barry VanDemoere for his "can do" approach to constructing an apparatus that allowed us to weigh boats for the first time in recorded history. Special recognition was also given to Tony Wagner who survived a close call with an overhead power line while towing his boat exactly where a parking lot attendant told him to. We even got an advance look at a new trophy under construction (built with New Hampshire granite) to recognize sailors who have unplanned encounters with the bottom of the lake.

We ended our festivities by electing Art Cunningham as our new fleet captain for 2003. We all left the party grateful for the fellowship of sailing with such a nice group of people and the privilege of spending our Summers in such a beautiful place.

Last year, we wrote that 2001 was one of our best years ever. Few could argue that 2002 wasn't just as much fun. Participation in our Sunday Series remained strong, and we had many 'Road Warriors' carrying the LSC Burgee to away regattas around the state. For a small fleet, we had a lot of sailing going on! All but three of our boats raced.

Sunday Series Racing The traditional LSC Sunday Series kicked off this year on April 21. The usual suspects claimed the podium positions. George Siegle, with Ann Siegle and Gil Chesbro on 'Fins' had two bullets and a 2nd. Pat Dolan with Stocy Kotecki and Gary Marx aboard 'Wind Dancer' got the other 1st, plus a 2nd and a 3rd. Mike Moody with Ken Knight on 'Moody's Booty' sailed consistently to score a 2nd and two 3rd-place finishes. Dying winds shortened sailing on the following Sunday, but not before 'Fins' and 'Wind Dancer' each claimed one more bullet. You know it must be light when an LSC race is called off – we lave our Sunday sailing. With two weeks of sailing practice, we were ready for the regatta.

LSC Regatta "Big Water" Lightning skippers came from near and far to attend Lansing Sailing Club's 37th Annual - Lake Lansing "Tune Up" Regatta. Justin 'Gus' Dey, with daughter Rachel and George Peet, came

from the Saginaw Bay Fleet. The Lake Michigan sailors, Bill Gibson, Steve Jenkins and Dave Gibson, arrived after the 4+ hour drive from Chicago. Jeff Hagman, Jennifer Wood and Al Newell represented the Western Lake Erie Fleet 42. The other long distant traveler was Jeff Bodkin of the Pymatuning YC, a resident of Shaker Heights, OH (near Cleveland) came with Eli Milonas and Julie Pierce of LSC was their 3rd.

We again used the one day regatta format: 1st start at 10:30 am with 2 short races back to back, come in for a delicious chili - cornbread lunch break, then plan on 4 more races, but no race to start after 4 pm.

David Nickels of the Lake Fenton Sailing Club, with Jennifer and Nancy Armbruster, took 1st place honors, after the tie-breaker with Jeff Hagman of the North Cape Yacht Club, both were at 13 points after the 5 race one-day regatta. David had 1st places finishes in race 1 and race 4. Jeff had a 1st place finish in race 2 and a 2nd place finish in race 5. The Chicago crew, Bill Gibson, Steve Jenkins and Dave Gibson, with 20 points, placed 3rd. Their best results were 2nd place finishes in races 2 and 4. LSC skipper Pat Dolan with Doug Carlson and Gary Marx, earned 22 points to place 4th. Their best race was a 1st place finish in race 5. LSC's Fleet Captain, George Siegle with Ann Siegle and Gil Chesbro had a 2nd in race 1 and a 3rd in race 5 earning 29 points to place 5th in the regatta. LSC's Pat Dolan was awarded the "Ye Olde Silver Platter" for the third year in a row. This honor goes to the highest placing Fleet #387 skipper as visitor boats usually drive away with the top regatta honors.

Back to Sunday Sailing... Our Sunday format is two races, back to back, with the first starting signal at 1 p.m. A lunch break is followed by the third race. The three-races-per-day format was new for 2001 and has proven popular. We managed to get in 66 races this year, the most ever. Only a few days were completely shut out due to either no wind or too much wind. Even though we sent a lot more boats to away regatlas, our average number of boats on the starting line remained above 6, with a couple of 9 and 10 boat days. The three usual suspects 'Moody's Booty.' 'Wind Dancer' and 'Fins' battled throughout the season, with Moody leading most of the season followed by Dolan and Siegle. The Marshalls, sailing 'Ohm,' proved tough on light air days, picking up a number of first-place finishes. After missing most of August and September, Siegle edged back in front of Dolan in early October, but just barely. The three arrived at the final Sunday, October 20, with only 90 points lout of about 3000+) separating them. Behind the scenes, skippers and crews were calculating the possibilities. Though incorrectly reported at the time (it's that 'new math'), it later was determined that with five boats on the line, three wins would allow Dolan to pass Siegle for 2nd, three wins would allow Siegle to pass Moody for 1st, and one win would secure the championship for Moody. The 'Fins' crew continued their hot streak and won the first two races, but not by much; it was close all the way around. So it was down to one race – seven legs windward-leeward on a chilly, windy and typically shifty day. Moody and Siegle both started cleanly on the left side of the line and headed up the course nearly even and on starboard. Getting near the west side of the lake, 'Fins' tacked first to get back in touch with a boat going up the middle. This proved to be a huge mistake. 'Moody's Booty' tacked almost immediately as well. But the Lake Lansing winds gave it a ten degree lift that 'Fins' did not get, and by the



first mark, 'Moody's Booty' had a sizeable lead of 20+ boat lengths over second-place 'Fins.' The lead expanded and contracted, and by the bottom of downwind leg four, the gap was almost a quarter leg. After two big shifts on the beat, the gap was closed down to six boat lengths heading into the last of the downwind legs. 'Moody's Booty' did a bearaway set, but gybed shortly onto port. 'Fins' gybe-set the chute and tried to cover from behind on port. The margin was down to about three to four lengths when boat boots gybed simultaneously for the mark. 'Fins' dropped the board, put the pole on the forestay and hiked for a fast reach to the mark. 'Moody's Booty' headed up to protect their wind, but started to get overpowered. The slippery cockpit kept them from getting their weight out, and the combination of the puff, a stalled rudder and the Lightning's big square chines induced a slow knockdown. The two boats exchanged offers of assistance and congratulations to close out the season. The 'Fins' crew sailed alone up to the finish, but mused on what could have been a great mark rounding and an epic tacking duel up the final beat

In the end, it was 'Fins' by only 11 points (21 wins, 3167 points) over 'Moody's Booty' (17 wins, 3156 points) - a margin of just 0.3 %. But for the quirks in our scoring system, this is about as close to a draw as you can get. A wind shift here, another boat on the line there and it could have been a different result. 'Wind Dancer' was close behind with 14 wins and 3066 points. Ron Marshall, usually sailing with Jane Marshall and many-times fleet champion Bob Hill, sailed to fourth in 'Ohm' with 7 wins and 2640 points, and Blaine Severin skippered 'UPF' to fifth with one win and 2166 points. Skippers needed 26 races out of 66 possible to qualify, and the best 26 were counted. Nine skippers qualified for season honors and there were 21 different skippers on the starting line in 2002.

Away Regattas Lansing skippers hit the road in record numbers in 2002. Despite our small size and conflicting Sunday races, the fleet skippers made a concerted effort to attend district regattas this season - and it shows. Competition for people's time was tight, with EIGHT home MSU football games (a big factor in this college town - many alums in the club), the Detroit NOOD, Sunfish and Laser regattas, and a season series that came down to the final downwind leg of 66 races. But we still managed to send boats all over Michigan. At North Cape, Larry Koster crewed for George Peet. Three boats made the trip to Michigan Districts at Tawas - George Siegle, Gil Chesbro and Ann Siegle in 'Fins'; Blaine Severin, Koster and Tom Rasmussen in 'UFP' and Mike Moody, Helia Vogel and friend in 'Moody's Booty.' Competition was intense on this beautiful bay of Lake Huran. Though memories are a bit fuzzy, it's widely believed that the 'Fins' team, with their 28th place finish, was the first Lansing boat to have qualified for NAs. Higgins Lake is a favorite among LSC sailors. Making the short trip up US-27 were Neil Harrison, Alanna Harvey and Jim Newton in 'Fubar', Severin, Koster and Dennis Dudley in 'UFP' and Siegle, John LeFevre and Ann Siegle in 'Fins.' This was Harrison's first away regatta. Congratulations Neill Bay City is also a popular destination for LSC sailors because it's Matt and Andrea Dahline's hometown. Severin, Rasmussen and Harrison sailed 'UFP', and Matt Dahline, LeFevre and Koster sailed 'Fastidiots.' George Siegle with Ann Siegle and Koster had a great week at North Cape - North Americans aboard 'Fins.' Although they had to miss the last day of racing, Team Fins enjoyed the competition and camaraderie of NAs -

and they came back better sailors for it. The nearby Pontiac White Cap Regatta was attended by Severin, Julie Pierce and LeFevre aboard 'UFP,' and Pat Dolan, Stacy Kotecki and Terry Kleiman on 'Wind Dancer.' Pat Dolan reports that he will be sailing in the upcoming Bluenose with Moody and Kleiman. Severin and Koster are our official 2002 Road Warriors!

Season Awards This year, LSC combined its traditional "Crew Appreciation Night" with the "Annual Banquet." In addition to trophies for the fleet champion [Siegle] and runner-up (Moody), several other awards were presented. Ken Knight, sailing with Mike Moody, was awarded 'Crew of the Year.' Tom Rasmussen was presented with the 'Wet Bottom Award' for going 'all out' for his team. Legend holds that Tom did a 'missed hiking strap with a full twist and half-gainer' from Severin's 'UFP' but didn't even get his head wet. Tom would have won gold, but the French judge was bought off by the Russian mafia and he scored only an 8.7.

We had no real rookie crews this year, so the 'Rookie Crew of the Year' will have to wait for 2003. Neil Harrison was our most improved sailor this season, moving up a whole finishing place, on average. The final award, and one of the most important, is the 'Carinthian Award.' The award is presented annually to the skipper who most actively advances the interests of the Lansing Lightning Fleet. Mike Moody was a regular instructor in LSC's Discover Sailboat Racing Class. In addition, he was active in fleet racing and away regattas. And, he showed great competitive spirit and sportsmanship throughout the year and especially on the final day of the Sunday Series. Way to go Mike!
