As you can see from our roster, we have become a midsized fleet as Lightning Fleets go. There are some 17 Lightning's in our greater sailing region – Colorado, Nebraska, and Wyoming (this may be the largest local region in the world). Of these, 9-10 berth at Cherry Creek Lake and the others are scattered throughout the intermountain west. On any given Thursday night, 4-7 of these boats is on the starting line. Over half our fleet (Bill Cabrall, Steve Davis, Marty Mulhern, Dave Spira, and Bob Stoller) went "outside" to venues as far away as the Orange Bowl, California Circuit, North Americans, and Bluenose this year.

In our local racing, Bill Cabrall won our Spring Series; Steve Davis won our Summer Series and clinched our Season Championship on the last evening of racing. Steve also became the undisputed burger-flipping champion of our club's Thursday night "buck-a-burger" post race parties. It's worth mentioning that Jan Davis did such an amazing job organizing social events that we have had to elect a 3 person committee this year in order to the momentum going.

Beth & Brad Hamilton joined the fleet this year with 12428, Nancy Nowak sold her boat to a man in Arizona. Dave Spira and Steve Davis are both running 2 boat campaigns, with one boat sailed locally and the other campaigned "outside". This can be a mixed blessing, as Steve & Jan Davis spent Christmas Day locating the boats in Nashville and heading South to the Orange Bowl. Earl Harris sold #584 back East this fall, after keeping it inside for over 40 years. We hated to see this boat go, but love the idea of having it sail again.

Increasing the number of boats on the starting line is our biggest challenge. We're working on it, with techniques typically western. While shopping today, for example, I noticed the car in front of me had a Michigan license plate and an "I'd rather be sailing" frame. I pulled into a parking lot behind him, got out, introduced myself, and gave him my phone number and the fleet sailing schedule. He claimed to be a big boat guy, but we'll fix that. First you rope'm, then you haul'em in!

We are very proud of our participation in the organizations that make sailing possible both locally and nationally. At this writing Marty Mulhern is the vice-commodore of S.A.I.L., the regional US Sailing body. Four of our members are officers of the Denver Sailing Association (DSA), and we've had a Lighting Fleet member as Commodore of DSA for the last 4 years. This year Steve Davis became the Treasurer of the ILCA, and next year Bill Cabrall may end up as a measurer or member of the technical committee.



We sponsored a Lightning Lab this year over the Memorial Day weekend, and had a fantastic time. A Lightning Lab is one of the best, if not the best things, a fleet can do for itself and it's members. In our case, Bill Faude agreed to come out and instruct, and was also able to spend time with relatives here in Golden, Colorado. The shore sessions were extremely informative, filled with all the little tips and tricks that it can take years to discover, particularly in a geographically challenged fleet such as ours. Now if we'd only had wind ...

Next year we intend to increase our numbers on the water locally, our presence at national events, and start to build a junior sailing tradition. We hope to hold another Lightning Lab, and we'll have some of our young people at the North Americans. It's going to be a great year.

The season started with Bob Shapiro heading down to the Southern Circuit with Margo Krukonis and Brad Winslow.

Southern Circuit Highlights: Eating ice cream on the sidewalk in St. Pete, "creative" word games in the car driving between regattas, finishing 25th out of 71 in a race at St. Pete, dinner at Brad's parents in Seminole, no capsizes, lunch with Bob's Mom in Maryland on the way down, lots of sun and fun and laughter and camaraderie and good food and great sailing.

Southern Circuit Lowlights: Snowstorm in Massachusetts the day before we left, Margo (first time racing) asking "Why are all the other boats in front of us?" boat leaking like a sieve – an inch of water in the "air" tank during each windward leg, snowstorm in Connecticut on the way home.

Southern Circuit Summary: 3600 miles of driving and 80 miles of sailing – the most fun you can have and still be G-rated (except for those word games...).

Fleet 493 races on Bow Lake in Strafford, NH. On Golden Pond may have been filmed on Squam Lake, but the sounds of the loons for the movie were recorded at Bow Lake. Our summer series, the Bob Evans regatta, is named after Chief Bob Evans who for many years organized and ran the races on Bow Lake. This summer we raced 14 races. When it was all over, Bob Shapiro came out on top, thanks to great crew work, lots of luck and a boat that no longer leaked. Margo and Brad both sailed lots of races with Bob. Also crewing were Greg Shapiro, Marc Couch (who was plucked out of a daysailor on the starting line to round out the crew), David deSwaan Aarons (no chance that is spelled correctly!), and Norbert Church.

Ned Hinds finished in second place, using an almost all family crew of wife Karen and son Derrick. Ned did use a neighbor as crew for a couple of races. Ned has won the Bob Evans

Regatta 22 of the 26 years it has been held!

Mike Aversa in third place was tough as always, but had problems finding crew and couldn't make all the races. Seems as though outfitting nuclear subs comes ahead of sailing sometimes – what a crazy world we live in Daughter Jillian sailed all the races with Mike, and Peggy Martheze also sailed one day. After that day, Mike remarked that Peggy (never having sailed before) did "a great job of staying out of the way!"

In January 2002 the Boynton bunch declared the end of an almost 3 year project to restore the family's Lightning. The project started with the boat's foam core filled with water at a weight of almost 1400 pounds. Two summers were spent digging out the foam and refitting. Alas in November 2001 at an estimated 1000 pounds, the crew declared mutiny and made a surprise 2001 Christmas purchase of Pat Zachary's 13888. In early June 2002 the 13888 made a new home on Bow Lake. After three months of sailing in the Bow Lake Summer Series the Boynton's were back to true racing form. In 2002 the 13888 came away with wins in both the endurance category (only boat to sail in every race all summer long) and most crew (at least one different crewmember each weekend). They were also first to the windward mark in one racel The crew of the 13888 What Now? is looking forward to 2003 as the year when they master that thing wrapped around the front stay - AKA the Spinnaker. Watch out!

Son Jamie Boynton made every race, Papa Bob made all but two (Greg Shapiro guest-skippered those two races and beat his old man to the windward mark in one of them!), Uncle Steve, Mom Sandy, Daughter Laura, Son John and Roommate Jacques rounded out the Boynton's crew.

9662 was looking great the first couple of weeks of the season, but then disaster struck. It was destroyed – oops – not destroyed, merely broke off its mooring, wound up on the rocks and has numerous huge holes in it. Bob Murphy reports: "Don't refer to it in the past-tense just yet. That boat has more lives [or at least as many lives] as Wal-Mart has fiberglass kits." Rumar has it that the Bob Murphy/Norbert Church/Dave Sandmann trio of sailors has acquired a newer boat, and that they'll be out for bear on the racecourse next year. But first, they'll have to move the gimbaled beer holders from their old boat to their new boat!

In the middle of the summer, Bob Shapiro got an email from Joe Ray of the Massabesic Fleet. Could Bob and his son Greg possibly resist this offer?

NA's Lowlights: Practiced gybe sets 427 times and still screwed up every one we tried in the races, drove home 13 hours overnight and then went to work, taught Joe how to capsize in the qualifiers, wish the boat was 2 feet shorter (see highlights).

NA's Highlights: Tiger's game, oysters in Detroit, fried turtle and turtle soup, hanging out with friends from New England, Go Karts, great racing! Our results in the Yellow Fleet got better every day. After opening with an 18th and a 23rd, we got a 4th and a 2nd, and then on the last day, got a 2nd and a 1st! Alas, the first 2nd was actually an OCS (now you know why we wish the boat were 2 feet shorter!).

Bob Shapiro traveled off the lake to four regattas during the



summer. True to form he capsized at two of them. Please not that for Bob's last 4 capsizes (including 2 in take Champlain in the middle of October) – Jim Lerner has been on board. Is there a pattern here?

The Spofford Regatta was renamed the Dave Fitch Memorial Regatta in honor of Dave Fitch. Bob and Greg were proud to have Dottie Fitch on board 14111 for the regatta. Dottie hopped around the boat like a 25-year-old – not like the 39-year-old that she really is! (Wink! Wink!) Dottie read a wonderful poem about Dave at the awards ceremony – leaving nobody with a dry eye. In the 37 (is that a typo?) years I have been sailing Lightning's, Dave and Dottie are two of the nicest people I have met.

At the Squam Lake Regatta, Bob Shapiro, Greg Shapiro and Jim Lerner co-skippered. [Bob was at the helm for the capsize on the way out to the race course!] This is one of the prettiest places in the world to sail – and sometimes the wind shifts no more than 83 degrees during a race! At the end of the regatta, Bob's team was in 7th place, and Mike Aversa with daughter Jillian, and Jamie Boynton, was in 8th.

At the Massabesic Regatta, Ned Hinds joined Bob and Greg on the boat. The team got steadily better, with finishes of 4, 3, 2 and 1 – good for 2nd place overall. If Massabesic agrees to start providing crew trophies, we'll be back again next year!

Bob's last capsize of the year was in Burlington, VT with Jim Lerner (sound familiar) and Adam on board. Nobody seems to know Adam's last name, but he works at the TV station with Kika and did a great job crewing.

The Bow Lake One Day Lightning Flash Regatta was held on September 14. In addition to being an open regatta, it also included the New England District Master's, Women's and Junior's Championships. The open regatto was close to the end. After 5 races Ned and Bob were tied for first but a strong finish in the last two races by Bob (with Greg and Margo on board) gave him the title for the second year in a row. Ned Hinds, with Karen Hinds and Ken Deyett, was runner up. Out of the silver were Mike Aversa, with Jillian Aversa and Bruce Donle, and Bob Boynton with Jamie and Steve. Visitor Todd Cox took home third place silver. In the Master's Championship, John Hughes was the winner. Our own Jeff Baker (just back from hiking the ENTIRE Appalachian Trail with wife Stacey) picked up third place silver sailing with Pat McQueen in the Master's. Kika Bronger won the Women's Championship (and also caused the most damage - but to her own boat). James Unsworth, with Stephan Demers and Brad Harris sailing, came down from Burlington to win the 1st race (beating all the women, masters and "regulars") and went on to an easy win in the Junior's. Please race with us on Bow Lake next year on Saturday, September 20, 20031

After the races, the Fleet 493 Auxiliary served refreshments and a taco bar dinner. A big thanks to Karen, Caroline, Stacey, Margo, Pam, Werner, Bob, Jamie, Charna and all the other helpers! Pam and Werner Daigneault were race committee all year, with help from Wayne and Bruce Donle. Pam had major surgery at the beginning of the season and against doctor's orders was back on the committee boat a week later!

The Martha Comstock award is presented each year to the person who best exemplifies the spirit of Bow Lake sailing. This year it went to Ned Hinds. Ned has been the backbone of sailing on Bow Lake for many years and truly deserves the award. Congratulations Ned!

What has now become a tradition on Thursday nights is a classic weekly battle of Team 'Girlfriend' and Team 'Permanent Accessory' in our all-dinghies-welcomed summer series, with continued participation of at least 3 Lightnings every week from May until September. History

Founded in 1932 as a British Officer's sailing club with 17 members and nine boats Lagos Yacht Club membership now stands at 250 active members and 123 boats.

Lagos commands the entrance to a large inland lagoon and is the major deep water port for Nigeria. Tides range plus or minus 3ft (depending on the rains). With temperatures varying from 25 C to 35 C, racing and cruising takes place every weekend throughout the year with a mixture of harbour, creek and off-shore sailing. These include both one and two day events, in Lagos Harbour dodging commercial shipping, in the creeks avoiding canoes and fishing stakes. At times offshore swells reach up to 20 ft thus producing some very challenging conditions. The best sailing can be expected during the rainy season between March and October with wind-speeds ranging from 12 mph to 24 mph and occasional line squalls (gales). The rest of the year is marked by light wind mixed with Harmattan haze (fine dust from the Sahara desert), particularly in December and January.

Presently the club operates a mixed fleet of over a hundred dinghies comprising 39 Lightnings ("Woodies" and "Fibres") still in sailable condition, approx 29 Hobie 16s, 26 GP 14s, 14 Ospreys and a few Lasers.

Lightning Fleet 510

The first "Woodies" were built locally in 1946 to the plans and specifications of the Lightning Class but were too heavy to be registered as such. The cost of these boats is very revealing. In 1951 it was reported that a prefabricated boat, excluding sails, could be bought for £120-6-od per boat (about \$190). One of these original boats still sails albeit occasionally as befitting her age. The "Fibres" were imported from USA and Switzerland starting 20 years ago with the latest additions within the last 3 years. Maintaining the boats is not a major problem since the Club has excellent carpenters and fibreglass craftsmen. The mast and boom sections are extruded locally. In the absence of any ship chandlers fittings, sheets and wire ropes are imported by members when returning from overseas travels.

Hermitage Cup Race

For many years the Hermitage Cup Race was listed in the Guiness Book of Records as the longest dinghy race regularly sailed. The race was established in 1940 and covers a distance of approx. 127 kilometres from Lagos along the inland waterways (creeks) meandering parallel to the Atlantic coast line to Badagry Town and



back. Initially it was a 3-day-event with overnight stays in Government rest houses. Nowadays it has reduced to a combined two day race with no outside assistance allowed meaning that every item of equipment required for sailing, eating, drinking and sleeping has to be carried along. It is an endurance race with helms and crews fighting exposure to the elements (hot sun, rain, dew etc.) and mosquitos. Each boat keeps a log and is allowed to deduct stops (anchoring or mooring) in excess of 1 hour from its sailing time. The logs are cross-checked with those of other competitors. Due to prevailing south westerly winds the outward leg tends to be a series of beats all the way to Badagry and can be achieved in daylight if the winds are good. The return journey is usually done under Spinnaker ranging from


only 3 boats (1 Lightning, 1 GP 14 and 1 Hobie) completed the course, albeit the GP 14 and Hobie 16 finished after the time limit (18:30 hours) and had to retire. The winner was Lightning 14448 "Kiwi Magic" helmed by Helmut Braun and crewed by Dolly Braun and Martin Hannah with a total sailing time of 20:37 hours (last year 13:28 hours) out of which the last 13:12 hours (04:00 to 17:12 hours) were sailed non-stop.

runs to fine reaches while negotiating the S-bends of the creeks. Night sailing is permitted outside the Lagos Harbour limits and nothing can match the exhilarating feeling of flying at midnight under spinnaker through a creek filled with fish traps, sprinkled with floating islands of weeds (water hyacinth) and bordered by mangrove swamps on one side and palm trees on the other under the ethereal glow of a full moon while listening to the rollers breaking on the beaches of the nearby Atlantic Ocean occasionally interrupted by frantic shouts of helms and crews trying to avoid an unexpected obstacle.

This year 9 Lightnings (including 1 "Woodie"), 2 GP 14s and 2 Hobie 16s participated in the race out of which

Cape Fear Fleet 511 gained two boats in the 2002 season when Jim Harris and Pierce Barden relocated to Wilmington, NC, raising Fleet 511's total number of Lightning's to eight. Jim and his family came to us after an extended stay with Clarks Hill Fleet 257 in Augusta, GA, while Pierce and his family moved back from cold Harrisburg, PA having spent the prior season with Susquehanna Fleet 253.

The Carolina Yacht Club, founded in 1853 and third oldest in the US, held a variety of races throughout the season. The fleet began sailing in April when Richard Waldkirch won the Dorman Cup regatta. The summer series consisted of fifteen races held over the course of



five Tuesday nights and was won by Steve Johnston. This series was sailed mostly in heavy air, and even had one race in which the race committee clocked wind gusts of 48 knots! Harris convincingly won the July 4th Cup regatta. The fall series was won by Barden and consisted of nine races held on three Sunday afternoons.

In late August, the fleet hosted a two-day regatta that counted as part of the Southeastern District traveling circuit. Jim & Connie Harris hosted a spectacular Friday night party while other fleet members handled regatta logistics and responsibilities. Fifteen boats competed in varying conditions. Saturday saw lots of wind, waves, surfing, one broken mast, and other minor breakdowns. That night the club hosted a social and talk given by Dr. Stuart Walker, followed by dinner. Sunday brought light air that required lots of patience and a race that barely finished within the official time limit. Four Fleet 511 members placed in the top half with Barden winning the regatta, Harris in second, Johnston in fourth, and Sawyer in sixth.

Fleet members that sailed a minimum of five regattas faired well in the overall 2002 Southeastern District standings, with Sawyer and Waldkirch finishing third and seventh, respectively.

Our fleet was also well represented at some of the larger Lightning events. David Pyle and Sawyer each attended the first leg of the Southern Circuit in Savannah, GA in March. Sawyer and Barden went to the Atlantic Coasts in Rehoboth Beach, DE in July, and Barden sailed in the North Americans in La Salle, MI in August. To conclude the season, Theresa Kramer, Sawyer, and Waldkirch competed in the Borderline held at the NC/VA border.
