## The Helen and Jay Limbaugh Fund

Created to further an appreciation of the joys of Lightning sailing among Junior and Active Members of the International Lightning Class Association. It is meant to be funded by donations from class members in honor of Helen and Jay.

The Helen and Jay Limbaugh fund was established in memory of two of our most avid supporters. Helen was our Executive Secretary from 1965 to 1982. Jay was our class president in 1964. Both remained strong supporters of the class long after their tenures were completed.

The aim is to help junior sailors improve their boakhandling skills, teamwork and tactical abilifies. Print, video and/or electronic media may supplement these efforts. Future uses of these funds could be, but are not limited to: support for the US Sailing Sears Cup, fund junior racing clinics, trophies, etc. These efforts will doubtless evolve over time as input is received and as needs change.

Only the income generated on an annual basis may be used to supplement such programs. The principal may not be spent.


## The ILCA Fund

The ILCA fund was formed in 1982 to give some direction and impetus to the solicitation of charitable gifts. The Fund is directed by three former ILCA Presidents. The long term goal of the Fund is to build an endowment equal to two hundred percent of the annual operating budget. This should help guarantee that the

class remains solvent and ensure future sailors the opportunity to enjoy the excitement and fellowship of sailing a Lightning.


## How to donate

When you pay your annual membership dues, include something extra as a giff to either fund. If you donate in excess of $\$ 50$ you will receive a gold sticker to place proudly on your boat that will allow others to see you love the Lightning.
