It was a great year for the CAD. The season started off at the Southern Circuit with four boats making the trip down for one or all the events. Mark Schneider was 12th overall circuit, Dick Moyer 16th overall circuit, John Faus 9th overall circuit and Maury Benbow 31st in Miami, 8th at St. Pete Masters' and 28th overall at St. Pete.

Next up the CADs were held at Little Egg Harbor where great conditions were offered both days. Mitch Knatt won the twenty-five-boat fleet, just ahead of Mark Schneider and Rich Warren.

Many made the trip down to Severn Sailing Association for the ACCs at the end of July. With seven boats making the trip down, three made the top ten—Caroline Patten, Will Brown and Brian Taboada.

CAD also had the honor of hosting the NAs this year. Women's, Junior's and Masters' were held at Metedeconk. Jody Lutz and the large amount of volunteers helping with the regatta and measurement put on a great regatta in very windy conditions, but every fleet had fun. The District won two of the three championships, with Courtney O'Connor and crew winning the women's fleet and Timothy Crann and crew winning the Juniors'. Other finishers in the Junior fleet were Arielle Delisser in 4th, Jason Lutz in 5th, Kayla Ellis in 14th, Gillian Frances in 15th and Chris Schon in 17th. The Masters' fleet had three, with Rich Warren in the top three, his brother Steve in 9th and Maury Benblow in 13th.

The seventy-five-boat fleet at the North Americans, hosted by Toms River Yacht Club, had six CAD boats in the Blue Fleet. Jody Lutz took 8th, Will Brown 10th, Rich Warren 17th, Brian Taboda 19th, Mitch Knatt 30th, and Caroline Patten 35th). There were three in the Green Fleet. Steve Warren took 5th, Dick Moyer 12th, and Keith Taboda 13th. There were four in the Yellow Fleet. Mike Warren took 3rd, Matt Reiser 4th, Eric Reitinger 6th and George Glenn 10th.

States were held at Ocean City at the end of the season. Fifteen boats made the trip, and John Townsand and crew took the win over George Glenn and Brown Baer.

Pan Am trials were held at Davis Island Yacht Club in Florida. Jody Lutz and Will Brown qualified. Jody and crew will be representing the USA at the Pan Am games. Will finished 5th.

The highlight of the 2010 sailing season at Metedeconk was the hosting of the WJM Championships the first week of August. The regatta attracted forty-two boats and sunny skies, ample wind (at times more than ample!) and a first-rate team, both on the water and land, attracted smiles from the contestants.

Regatta chairman Jody Lutz crafted a team of club volunteers who spent months planning and working to pull off a top-rate regatta. Mission accomplished. From the moment the boats arrived at the club to the final victory toasts on the trophy ceremonies, the regatta ran efficiently and, most of all, was fun. Imagine if Jody had let another beer keg get tapped!

There was fine racing, and products of the Metedeconk Junior Program took two of the three top honors. Timmy Crann won the Juniors, becoming the fifth Metedeconk winner of this prestigious championship. Jason Lutz took fifth, and club members Gillian Francis and Chris Schon also competed. Courtney O'Connor took the Women's crown. Her crew was Timmy Crann's sisters, Meghan and Caitlain. The regatta also saw a return to Lightnings by Mimi Dimon, Deb Freeth Corriston and Teri Gelenitis who finished sixth. The Masters was won by Peter Hall from Canada, who edged out Steve Davis for the honors.

Besides the happiness among the competitors, the holding of such a prestigious regatta did much to increase the spirit and community of Metedeconk's members. From Class stalwart Jim Carson's excellent Race Committee management to the assistance of new club members who barely had seen a Lightning, the support of the club in holding the event produced comradery and relationships









that will assist the Club long term. We thank the ILCA for allowing us to host this fine event.

The race course in 2010 was absent Jim Carson, as he was on the disabled list much of the year. Jim's presence was important to the fleet's development, as always, acting as Race Committee Chair for WJMs, lending his Lightning out to fleet members, including Timmy Crann's victory in the Junior NAs, and providing guidance. Jim was able to defend his BBYRA title over the summer, his 26th overall.

Possibly one of the most amazing 2010 feats was Jim's opening race the Central Atlantic Districts in June. Jim was still hobbling and intended to sail a Districts race to qualify to sail in the North Americans. As the first race began, winds increased dramatically, with blasts sending many sailors into distress and disaster. Jim persevered and took a second before settling onto shore and the rocking chair for the rest of the day, still showing flashes of his sailing excellence.

The Central Atlantic Districts, held at Little Egg Harbor, was won by Metedeconk's Lightning Fleet Captain, Mitch Hnatt. Mitch's 2010 racing was diluted a bit by his growing family, but he won his first Districts after many top five finishes. He also qualified for the Championship flight at the North Americans, finishing thirtieth. Mitch also won the Lightning Spring Series, which serves to crown the Fleet Champion for 2010. He furthered his Lightning title to become MRYC Club Champion, a title he has won many times, beating the champions of the other fleets. Mitch also led the Advanced Junior Class, which has lessons in Lightnings each week during the summer. The members of that class made up much of the four Metedeconk boats that sailed in the Junior NAs.

2010 at Metedeconk can be known as the year of the Jody. Jody Lutz was everywhere: he served as the Commodore of Metedeconk for 2010, was well as the aforementioned Chairman of the WJMs. Several doubted his sanity when holding even one of these titles, and we were surprised that Jody didn't have a Charlie Sheen crash landing. To the contrary, his work helped pull off a fine year at Metedeconk. More importantly, after Jody got done being a politician, he won the Lightning Pan Americans Trials in Tampa in the fall and will serve as the U.S. representative in the 2011 Pan American Games in Mexico. Jody also scored an eighth in the North Americans.

Keith and Brian Taboada continued to travel their Lightings to several regattas, from the Long John in April to the Atlantic Coast Championships in the summer. Brian

finished second at the ACCs, held in Annapolis, edged by eventual NA Champ Dave Starck. They competed in the Districts (Keith 5th, Brian 7th), as well as the North Americans held at Toms River. Brain qualified for the Championship flight, finishing nineteenth. Keith finished thirteenth in the Presidents Cup, a bit of a disappointment for him. Observers blame his long term crew, Russ Schon for the decline in results.

The fleet welcomed neighbor Matt Reiser in 2010. Matt is not a Metedeconk member, but he had always been present at invitational events at Metedeconk. Matt had a fine year, finishing fourth in the Districts and also sailed the NAs, taking fourth in the Governor's Cup.

The Metedeconk River Yacht Club expanded in 2010, with a new building constructed to house the club's juniors during their daily lessons, racing and regattas. This junior club house was named in May at the club opening, the "Andrew Brennan Junior Center" to honor one of Metedeconk's finest young sailors. Andrew grew up sailing Lightnings, and one of his laurels included winning the Junior North Americans. The Club house will stand as a constant reminder of Andrew, of his smile and ability on the race course.

The fleet was further buoyed by the awarding of the Steketee Trophy, which is awarded by the ILCA each year to the fleet that has been outstanding in promoting and developing racing. We are very flattered by the award and look forward to continue to be a hub for excellent racing in 2011.

We look forward to 2011 as we are hosting the Central Atlantic Districts in July. Co-chairs Mitch Hnatt and Richard Thomas promise a good time to be had by all.
