They traveled to events like the North Americans, Southern Circuit, etc., where they fit in quickly and were embraced as part of the family like a long-lost brother and sister coming home.

Due in no small part to his charm, wit, and disposition, "the skipper" was lured into "volunteering" to sit on the ILCA boards, where his talents were recognized immediately by Mary Huntsman. He was quickly voted onto the Executive Committee and began serving as Treasurer. "The crew" likes to sail. She has a lot of other interests as well, gardening, keeping the skipper in line, etc., but the thing that really draws her to the sailing is the people. While "the skipper" runs about working on a variety of projects simultaneously, "the crew" is the glue that holds it all together. Tremendous people-skills, "the crew" is smart and organized. She has a smile that can make everything OK and an easy-going manner that can make a bad race seem not that bad.

With "the skipper" totally immersed in Class affairs and the Board looking for a person who would be the "perfect fit" of people skills and business sense to run the Association, the answer became perfectly clear. So in December of 2006 the Class offered a contract to "the crew" to run our Association, and, by default, we ended up with the best "Two-for-One" sale in the history of the Class.

Jan and Steve Davis have received their fair share of accolades, and rightfully so, since they dedicated so much of their time, efforts, and energies into the day-to-day operations of the Class. There are few people cut of the fabric that can make a lasting, profound, indelible, positive impact on the people with whom they associate or a situation in which they inherit. They attended countless events, big and small. There were highlights (3rd place at the Worlds in Greece while Steve was President), low lights (contracting hepatitis while at a regatta in South America and pulling content for yearbooks) and some unusual trips (armed escorts in Nigeria).

Steve has been a driving force in helping the ILCA reinvent itself. He encouraged great ideas and was instrumental in launching programs from those ideas that continue to thrive. Jan was the key to reorganizing the ILCA Office and was dedicated to making it not only efficient but,

perhaps most importantly, transferable. Her goal was to make it so when she was done she could hand over the keys to the next caretaker and the transition would be smooth and painless.

They both, predictably, achieved their goals. Steve finished his term on the Executive Committee with the Class in better shape than when he arrived. The Class was fiscally sound, internationally admired, and the model for other class associations. Two years after Steve stepped down, Jan handed over the keys to the office she had rebuilt to Laura Jeffers, and the transition has been seamless. Jan's handling of the process of upgrading our database, creating a new vision for Flashes and transitioning the year-book to a user-friendly format has saved the Association thousands of dollars and made the ILCA a leading example of how class associations should be managed. They set the bar high for the rest of us, and for that, we should all be grateful.

This yearbook edition is dedicated to Jan and Steve Davis in thanks for their dedication, leadership, friendship and indelible path they have created for the rest of the ILCA family to follow.



Victor Lobos – Treasurer




Bill started racing Lightnings in 1947 on boat #134. He's owned #1495, #7195, #10895 and still has #14495.

The Limbaugh Fund was established in honor of two of our most avid supporters. Helen was our Executive Director from 1965 to 1982. Jay was our Class President in 1964. The Mary Huntsman History Fund Charter of the Fund

The Mary Huntsman History Fund's primary objective is to help recover and properly preserve the Lightning Class heritage. The Fund is named after Mrs. Mary Huntsman, Past President and Officer of the Class, and who was the first to hold the Historian VP position when it was established. Under her Presidency, Mary secured the purchase of Lightning number one and subsequently coordinated its donation to the Mystic Seaport Museum, where the boat has been restored and is displayed.

Use of the Fund

The Mary Huntsman Lightning History Fund was formed in 2004. Its primary objective is to help recover Lightning memorabilia and properly preserve Class heritage.

How may Gifts be Made During Your Lifetime?

Gifts of Cash: A gift of cash during a person's lifetime is the simplest type of gift. These can be made in person or anonymously, directly or on behalf of another person. Gifts within a year are deductible from that year's income taxes. You may send a check to the ILCA at any time or include an extra amount of money in the renewal form when you pay your membership every year.

Gifts of Marketable Securities and Investment

Real Estate: Gifts of appreciated securities and real estate held for investment purposes are often more beneficial to the donor than gifts of cash. When such items are donated, the donor receives a contribution deduction equal to the current market value of the security and generally, the excess of the market value over the donor's cost basis is not taxed. Often it can be advantageous to donate substantially appreciated items than to sell them and pay the capital gains tax.

Gifts through Wills: Remembering The ILCA in your will is another method of giving. Such a gift is deductible in calculating estate taxes. Provisions for the gift may be included in the body of the will or by adding a simple codicil. If you desire to establish a separate memorial gift within either the ILCA Fund or the Limbaugh Fund, or to specify the purpose of the gift, this may be done by so stating in the provisions of the will.

Gifts of Boats and Equipment: You may consider donating your boat and equipment to the ILCA, thereby helping make them available to newcomers. You can deduct the fair market value of your donation from your income or estate taxes. It may be more advantageous for you to give the boat to the Class than to sell it. The Class has the procedures in place to facilitate making this important gift.

There is no time better than the present to make gifts to our Class. Your contribution will assure that the next generation of sailors will have the same support that we all now enjoy. We hope you will consider planning an ILCA donation, always informed, by appropriate legal and financial counsel.

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
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John McIntosh, Sr



In Memory

On March 23, 2010, only a few short days after another hugely successful Deep South Regatta had finished up, the Lightning Class heard the news that we had lost a legend. John McIntosh, known to all as "Johnnie Mac," had passed away.

Johnnie Mac founded the Lightning Class Southern Circuit fifty years ago and was a fixture in Savannah as long as most Lightning sailors can remember. He won two of the first three Deep South regattas and never lost his appreciation for the toughness of the competition. He was a past Class President, a charming and handsome man whose passion for the ILCA, the Southern Circuit, and youth sailing brought him so much respect and adulation amongst all sailors.

His successes were not limited to Lightning sailing. He served in the Army during World War II, making him Captain Johnnie Mac. He ran a successful business and proudly raised a family, many of whom still enjoy boating like their dad. He mentored many young sailors, was involved in the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games and assisted in the preparation of the yachting bid that brought those events to Savannah.

Over the past few years, the Deep South Regatta was defined by Johnnie Mac's presence. Whether as host to an impromptu campground in his home or as a competitor, he began staying on shore only a few years ago. While holding court from one of the cozy leather chairs in the Savannah Yacht Club bar, Johnnie Mac distilled the essence of charm, welcome and wisdom. The event wasn't a "happening" until he arrived. The Southern Circuit and the Deep South Regatta won't be the same without John. He touched a lot of us in the Lightning Class, and his contributions will not be forgotten.

Johnnie Mac was a special man to Jan and me. Our mutual interest in the International Lightning Class Association, the Southern Circuit, all things sailboat racing and youth participation made for an immediate friendship. It was his integrity and intelligence that made the friendship important to us. I suspect that he enjoyed the company of Jan the most, though we all had some good times together.

I first met John in Miami at the Masters' World Championship in Miami when I provided him a Lightning boat and my wife. No wonder John liked me! Thankfully, Eric Oetgen sailed as well so that everyone and everything could get back to the dock safely.

To watch John get on the boat in the morning when it was howling and to see him on the race course was an inspiration for me. Here was a guy that was enjoying life and sailboat racing, even after several joint replacements and in incredibly difficult conditions. It was amazing. I don't think we were able to get him on a Lightning boat after that event, but it didn't matter. I didn't know John in his prime racing years, but I could see from that experience what a formidable competitor and sportsman he was.

Truly, the highlight of our trips to the Southern Circuit was to stay with John in Savannah and talk about the Lightning Class and what he was doing with his young sailors. His house was an incredible museum of trophies and pictures, along with youth sailors running around.

Of course, in the evenings a few rounds of backgammon and whiskey were enjoyed as well. In the mornings, there were a few times when we were all up and ready to get to the Club and were wondering if John was OK, as he wasn't moving. We would send Jan in to his bedroom to find out what was going on, and John would start yelling, "I'm still alive!"

When Jan and I visited John at the care facility last year, it was difficult to see a man whose mind was keen but whose body was failing. He was certain that he would be back in his motor boat for the next Deep South Regatta.

I know that John had many interests in his life. I am privileged to have known him through his sailboat racing interest. He was intelligent and passionate and a gentleman—not traits that many sailors have. His lifelong work for the Lightning Class is appreciated by many. I will always recall his voice in my ear, "You have to feel the boat and make it slide through the water."

Fair winds, my friend. We will miss you.
