## **Brazilians Top Three at the Worlds**

The 1993 Lightning Worlds were held in Ilhabela, Sao Paulo, Brazil this past May. 42 boats from seven countries competed in the beautiful waters between the Island of Ilhabela and San Sebastian. Green mountains were on three, sometimes four sides of the race course during the races.

The regatta was a very well organized event and the hosts put together an outstanding social schedule to keep the participants entertained. Manfred Kaufmann and crew, brothers Renato and Marcelo Silva, won the regatta by showing amazing consistency in a variety of conditions. It certainly didn't hurt Manfred and his team to be from the home waters. Current was a huge factor in the regatta as was picking a side and getting there in the right fashion. There was a shipping channel on the east side of the sailing area that caused big differences in the current. There was never an early shift on the beat. You had to sail to a side to get the best of each weather leg.

Three days before racing showed beautiful wind out of the southeast 15-20 mph. It was warm and sunny and there seemed to be few shifts. The practice race was a good indication of what the first part of the week would bring, Fernando Hackerott won the race in a 25-year-old boat with less rake than anyone has used for 35 years. He and his team of Fredrico and Riccardo Costa (twins) were going very fast. Also being from the home club they also appeared to know where they were going.

All of the competitors stayed in hotels or homes within a five minute walk from the sailing site. Our accommodations were great. The food was outstanding. The Brazilian people were warm, friendly and made all of us feel very much at home. The parties were events in themselves. In many international events, believe it or not, the Americans are not always the most welcome people. This was not the case in Brazil. We felt like the whole town was putting on the event—and they seemed to enjoy themselves doing it.

In nine of the first nine weather legs, it paid big to go right—hard. After each start in the first three races we were on port tack within 30 seconds after the gun. The line would be favored a little leeward to keep boats away from the committee boat. In the first race with the wind 8-I0 mph, the Brazilians showed the rest of the fleet what the week was going to look like. Actually Rob Ruhlman and his team of Abby and Bill Haag led the fleet around the first lap. Luis Lebreiro and Kaufmann caught Rob on the second time around. Even though the current was stronger on the right, the puffs and shifts were better on the far right side.

In the second race with the wind I0-12, we tacked to port at the gun from the middle of the line and went hard right. Claudio Biekarck was to our left and after a few exchanges, we picked him up by being to his right near the weather mark and led the fleet. As we worked out to somewhat of a comfortable lead, we noticed this 20-yearold faded white Mueller boat with faded white sails grind down Claudio and his team on the last beat to finish second. The conversation on our boat was "who are those guys?", but we did notice their boat getting much louder cheers than ours at the last leeward mark. Later we learned that those guys compiled a 2-2 for the day. "Those guys" were Manfred Kaufmann and crew. Manfred sails IOR boats out of Ilhabela. He has also represented Brazil in several Olympics—in Solings and Tempests. He also won all four qualifying races in San Diego in 1980—in Lightnings.

The third race saw a little more wind with Larry MacDonald leading the fleet to the right but still mixing it up with our boat, both Gonzalez brothers, Manfred and Hackerott. At the first mark Larry led, Manfred second, our boat third and Manuel and Tito 4th and 5th. The only big move was on the second beat, Hackerott passed the Gonzalez brothers and rounded overlapped with us and passed us downwind.

The series was definitely taking shape for Manfred with a 2-2-2-6 pts. We were next with 9-1-4-13 pts. There really was no one else without a bad race. Several North Americans already had two bad races.

There was a layday on Wednesday to enjoy the sights and beauty of the island. Nearly all of the participants engaged in some activity and I doubt that anybody even strolled through the boat area. Part of the group took jeep and truck rides across the island to the beaches. My team of Ned Roseberry and Joe Starck hitched up with Greg Bull and rode (and walked) bikes up a large hill or mountain and ran into the Hackerott team and Brad Read's group and slid down a natural waterslide. We don't have too many of these in Columbus, and I doubt that Newport has any either. Also, there was a lot of on-the-beach volleyball. It needs to be said that the Chilians beat the Americans in a good, close, hard fought match, beating the USA in the last part of the last game. The staying power of the Chilians was outstanding.

The next day, Thursday, marked the beginning of a significant change in the weather. We had no races on Thursday, due to rain and no wind. It was also a little colder. The next day, Friday, our scheduled last day (with only 3 races completed) brought more of the same with the committee desperately trying to get at least one race in. The breeze came in about 5-7 mph out of the southwest and we were starting a race "inside". This means the wind blows from the mountains and the course doesn't need to be so far out, since realistically it would be the same conditions one mile away from the base of the mountains as three miles away. The wind really wasn't settled at the start, but I don't know if it ever was going to be settled. The locals had always told us that it could only blow from two directions; Southeast and Southwest, at the start it was blowing from the Northwest. Jim Allen,

Paul Gelenitis and Mike Huffman and out boat tacked to port soon after the gun from the leeward end of the line and started heading right-this group of four was looking pretty sporty on both sides of the course. But in hindsight, this next major shift was more predictable than any during the week. The wind was about to do what the locals said it would do- go to the southwest. Near the last 1/3 of the beat, the wind filled in from the left and shifted about 20 degrees to the left. By the end of the first lap it had shifted 50 degrees. George Andreadis, Tom Allen Jr. and Manfred had mediocre starts but went out to left and were at the jibe mark when the bulk of the fleet rounded the weather mark. Manfred and his team were in about 4th or 5th. George and Tom, Jr. sailed a solid race to finish 1-2. Fortunately for some of us, the wind went goofier on the last half of the last beat and 5th through 30th reached into the finish (some spinnakers) about 20 boatlengths apart. Manfred lost a bunch and I finished 18th, keeping the series still alive for many.

The last day was interesting because it was quietly understood that the RC was going to get one race in no matter what the conditions, so five races without a throwout meant it was anybody's game. That is really a fun feeling.

The fleet sailed out to a building 8-10 mph breeze out of the southwest (from the mountains). The race started with a little more and about 1/2 way up the beat went 30 degrees right. It made for a long starboard with many North Americans fighting for the lead. Larry MacDonald rounded 1st with Jimmy Allen, Brad Read, Rob Ruhlman, Manfred and our boat rounding bow to stern around to weather mark. Since the wind had gone so far right, the next leg was almost a run. Two-thirds down the leg the wind went back to the original direction and some of us less aware folks were now fighting a tight reach and a 2 to 3 knot current at the jibe mark. We, as our friend Brad Read put it, tacked more at the jibe mark than we did on all the race's weather legs combined. We went from 5th to 38th. Tito did about the same. Larry led most of the way around, but got passed by Manfred on the last beat. Tom Allen, Jr., Claudio Biekarck and Rob Ruhlman were 3-4-5.

Going into the last race Manfred led with 7 points with

a throw-out. The only boats that could beat him were Hackerott and Biekarck. Hackerott needed to put 16 pts between their boat and Manfred and Claudio needed to put 14 pts between their boat and Manfred. This sounds crazy but it almost happened. Manfred, somewhere in the first beat, chose to stay with Claudio. The race was much lighter than the previous race and it was getting late in the day. Dave Starck led the fleet around the first mark and miscalculated the placement of the jibe mark boat about 2 kilometers. No, in defense of Dave, the new jibe mark was stretched out a little to give the spectators a little show. The mark was about 20 yards from the beach -- where the current was still 2 knots. Larry, Peter Hall and several others were struggling to make the mark. We had learned big from the previous race and went extremely high and went about 15th to 5th at the mark. As boats were tacking and hitting the mark, spectators on the beach were screaming. It was kind of fun. Meanwhile, Manfred was back in about 13-15 staying with Claudio Bierkarck. But, Hackerott almost won the Worlds, had Larry not held him off and if Manfred lost one more boat. It was much closer than it appeared. Manfred won the regatta with Hackerott second, Claudio third. Larry MacDonald, with his team of Trevor Born and Jody Swanson sailing, who came on real strong when the course moved inside, finished fourth and our boat was fifth. Enough can't be said about the job Manfred, Renato and Marcel did in this regatta. They totally dominated. It was close at the end but it was wild sailing. Hackerott also sailed very well. He and his team sailed smart and were also probably the fastest boat out there. When you look at the series you see how consistent Claudio Biekarck was. Brazilians were 1-2-3. It was impressive.

The last evening was great fun. The Brazilians are classy people. I mean if my home club went 1-2 in the World it would be a little tough for some to take. This was a festive evening. I don't think too many people ate dinner and I think many partook in several Brazilian grain drinks.

Ilhabela was a fun regatta. The major Lightning regattas have really been snakebit since the 1990 NA's it seems. But these hosts put on a great show. Congratulations to Manfred, Renato and Marcelo.

- 3. Walk with your eyes closed so you can practice finding your way on the water after dark.
- 4. Pick up a "local" early in the regatta so you have local knowledge and energy to sail.
- 5. Learn the lingo of the "Great White North."
- 6. Oh, and the most important item, get a great crew!
- 7. And, HAVE A BLAST!

# Canadian Open Championship

Montreal - 3 & 4 July, 1993

They have come from Thunder Bay, from Toronto, from Newport, RI. They have come in beat up '75 Caprices and in shiny '93 BMW's. In all shapes and genders, from the Jane Fonda look-a like to the flabby businessman past his prime. In all ages from 13 (Sean Carroll, of Burlington, Vt.), to 62 (David Bull, of Syracuse, NY).

They are the Lightning Sailors. A breed to be feted for their prodigious appetites, extending from the downing of immeasurable amounts of beer, to the raiding of salad bars and dessert tables. Dessert tables do not look the same after Lightning sailors, sort of like Poland after Attila the Hun.

Lightning sailors like to live dangerously. The danger is not their spinnaker, although it is roughly the size of a football field, but rather the water, a hostile milieu to which most Lightning sailors are genetically allergic (see above about beer).

Lightning sailors are characters. I know of no other class that can assemble such a diverse bunch of people, make them do crazy things with their bodies, such as hiking, and maintain such a great sense of gentlemanly fun. It was only fitting that our home fleet, Fleet 215, should host this event under the avuncular patronage of Russell Scrim, one of the Class' legends, and the Honorary Life Commodore of our Club.

Anyway, I had the honor of being Chairman of the Race Committee. This post, which is largely ceremonial, brings me senatorial perks, such as the free use of a motor yacht for a weekend, the undivided ministrations of the professional crew, mostly female and nubile, and a large supply of fancy sandwiches and exotic drinks. I also get to witness some of the antics on the water, and thus to gather true-to-life material for Flashes, a publication that does not shy away from controversy.

Lake St. Louis, our home playing field, is also shared with numerous power boaters, a group of people known for their nautical skills and impeccable manners. Thus I got to see "Bung a l'Eau", "Sex'Tant" and "QE3" (yes, QE3!!!!) going full tilt on their way to the St. Anne de Bellevue bars. There was also "Raider", a powerful Scarab sporting three 200 HP engines on its transom, and probably looking for the Lost Ark. Such displays of good taste and understated elegance are what makes boating on Lake St. Louis so special.

But such an event is made by the actors on the stage: Dick Hallagan, from Newark, NY, just back from a 9th place finish at the Worlds and a second at the Europeans, eager to show us all that the yanks still dominate the Class. Hannah Swett of Rhode Island, with a mostly female crew that included Rick Fastiggi (Did you really have this operation, Rick?), determined to confirm that women not only own the world (we knew that), but could whip our derrieres too. ... Peter Hall, our local luminary, thirsty for revenge after a disappointing finish at the Worlds. And of course, the entire Fleet 215 in full battle gear. Other competitors of note were Anthony Staples, one of our leading young sailors, Jean Francois Simard, who was lucky enough to train with the great Peter Hall himself, Tony McBride of Pointe Claire, and Marty Essig, a young man from Royal Hamilton who had won the Lightning Canadian Youth.

The supporting cast of organizers, groupies, soundmen, and other hangers-on consisted of Mark Osterman, regatta co-chairman and competitor who, with wife Jane Lalonde, had to both run the event and play in it; of Brian and Catherine Thorniley, who cornered the local communication infrastructure through their intensive use of VHF, SSB, C band, Omega, Loran, GPS, TGIF, Cellular phones, and homing pigeons. They also ran the finish line and did the results; and of many other dedicated volunteers.

Three races were sailed on Saturday, after an unauspicious morning where the competitors were zapped with lightning and pelted with rain.

No fewer than three general recalls and the imposition of a brutal 1 minute rule were needed to get the fleet going in races 1 and 3. Some degree of skewing of the line towards a pin advantage was also needed to keep starboard tackers from crossing the line.

Dick Hallagan came out of these shenanigans looking like a hero, with finishes of two firsts and one eighth place, with Staples, Leibel, Essig, and Hall not far behind. Peter Hall started that day a disturbing descent into the depths with finishes of 2, 6, and 12.

Sunday's early northerly quickly died while backing to the west, forcing numerous course changes, shortenings, pin resets, and other such activities as race committees are wont to do. The day was spent chasing evanescent breezes, looking for nonexistent puffs, and riding large shifts into glory or oblivion. Oblivion it was for Hall, with finishes of 18 and 24, as well as McBride (26 and 11). Glory for Mark Osterman, who got a second and a third.

Light air work has always tended to favor the old guys, who have more patience, slow-response nerves and flabby muscles. 18-year-old Marty Essig somehow managed to stay out of trouble through it all, with a 12th, acquired in Saturday's first race as his throwout. He thus gave all notice that the Royal Hamilton's Lightning Fleet has some very strong talent in the wings.

Allan Leibel of the Royal Canadian and our Anthony Staples had a tie for a strong second, won by Leibel, while Dick Hallagan and Mark Osterman completed the honor roll with a 4th and 5th overall.

Thus we got what we were looking for in the first place: the agony of defeat, the sweet smell of success, and all the ups and downs between these two that are at the core of Lightning sailing: A game which makes other gratuitous human activities, such as spelunking or bungee jumping, look purposeful and rational.





## The Qualifiers

As much as I hate to sail this series, I keep coming back to sail the Qualifiers; to scratch and claw, to bitch and moan, to try to compete in the "Blue Flight" of the Lightning North American Championship. I had some great help in 1993: Lori Fosterfourth trip to the NA's and one trip to the Worlds; and Brian Hughes-many trips to the NA's in many different classes. With their experience, strength, and humor, this put 14255 in the top spot.

This year in Milwaukee three unusual factors concerning the racing happened to all contestants. The following article will tell how the team of Hallagan, Foster, Hughes handled the situation and gained an advantage: 1) light air series, 2) Olympic courses 3) P.M.S. effect on three race series.

The Lake Michigan legacy of 1971 and 1976 for big sea (rollers of 6' to 7') and strong winds, just never happened in 1993. Many out of staters came to Milwaukee with beefed up crew weight, ready for the big blow. However, some of the local hot shots seemed to be sailing light. (What did they know?) The answer was in the water temperature and the safety factor. At 52 the Race Committee could not ignore the safety issue and to race on windy days created too much personal risk. (The locals knew, sail with light crew; they can't sail on heavy days.) The entire week from August 8-13; the race time winds never got over I0 mph, a big switch from 1971 and 1976. On 14255,

we rarely needed our 440 lbs. on the high side all week. on August 7, little did we know we had half the boats beat before we launched the boat.

Olympic Courses (O/E) were sailed every race in the Qualifiers. What did this mean on 14255? Sail change every race and we got really good at it. The reaches were not freed up, so we used a reacher chute on legs 2 and 3. Lay out the runner on the third leg, switch the sheets on the second buck, then attack the leaders on the run. Attack, we did; always looking for the best jibing angle, create havoc when on starboard, and get to that inside position at the leeward mark. We also had a new polyester runner; nobody beat "the whiz".

The P.M.S. situation was fresh in my mind from sailing the Masters in Sheboygan. It is a bitter pill. In Milwaukee, the flat water gave the line spotline a stable platform from which to sight. Two spotters at each end, with binoculars, taperecorders and video. The Race Committee was just doing their job. PMS and you were in the Green as the qualifiers ended with only three races. The start program for our boat was: Lori calls the time, Brian calls the line, and Dick did what they said to do and no tricks.

In conclusion, there is no award to win the gualifiers, but the reward is great. People stopped calling me Mr. Hallagan. The results show the rest of the story.



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

## North American Championship

The Lightning NA's in Milwaukee was once again subject to the weather jinx which has plagued us for the past few years. However, four light-air races were run, in spite of fog and light winds. I was ably assisted by Jay Lurie and Brian Hayes.

### Race 1

Wind: more East, less South than sea breeze direction, shifting to South on last beat. The water was very flat.

Our start did not seem great, but given the fact that 13 boats were over early, by the committee's count, and nine scored as PMS, probably it was as good as could be expected. The leeward end was considerably favored, but we started in the middle of the line. All the boats to leeward of us were punched out. Hannah Swett, directly to leeward, and punched out, was making it difficult to live on starboard tack. She was one of the boats PMS'ed. We tacked to port soon after the start. Our lane was not great, but OK. Eventually we worked out from under a boat to weather of us, which was keeping us from pointing as high as we would like. We held this board all the way to the layline.

The wind had shifted considerably to the left of where the course was set. I think this would explain the large number of boats over early, since the leeward end was so favored at the time of the start. Because of this wind shift, all the boats to the left seemed well ahead, all the ones to the right, of which there were not too many, seemed behind. For a while we had to foot a bit to keep our wind clear, but we eventually got through the boat to weather of us, and were able to shift into point mode. Brian and Jay felt we were gaining rapidly on the boats on the left and I was concentrating on maintaining good speed and point. The unusually flat water and relatively steady, 6 knots of breeze, provided a sensation of great speed over the surface. The wind looked like it was stronger ahead on the water, so we were happy to continue to the layline.

Terry Hutchinson, was an early leader on the left. We were surprised when he tacked to starboard tack to go back for more. We decided he was a greedy devil. Little did we know that five legs later we would be tearing out our hair as he got the last shift of the race right and we got it wrong.

When we tacked on the layline we had all the boats from the left with the exception of Tom Allen Jr. Tom tacked in front of us and he led around the mark. Terry was a few places behind, having plumbed the left side a little heavily. Bill Faude was in third, a couple of boatlengths behind. As usually is the case in light, steady air, the two reaches were a parade, to let everyone get to the leeward mark and start beating again.

The second beat was a bit more square than the first because the wind shifted back to the right. We tacked to starboard after a minute, to cover Bill Faude and Danny Norton. on starboard tack, Bill Faude was set up slightly

nose out. He seemed to be going fast compared to the rest of us. Fortunately the wind phased left a bit causing us all to tack to port tack where we seemed to have Bill be more in control on our weather quarter.

Jay used the compass to good effect to keep us in phase. The Tom Allen team let us get to the right of them later in the beat, which worked to our advantage. When they tacked over to port tack on the layline we were able to return the favor of the first beat and tack in front of them by about four lengths.

On the run Terry Hutchinson and Phil Lotz jibed to port early. They gained considerable distance, and for a while looked like they both might get us. The wind was shifting right and filling as it had done in the first qualifying race two days earlier. Tom brought up a following breeze to round the leeward mark only two lengths behind. At the end of the leg, the wind shifted back to the left allowing us to protect our lead for the time being. Just as it did, there was a slight waft of much cooler air from the South, the precursor of our soon to come undoing.

As we rounded the leeward mark, Tom tacked right to starboard tack. We immediately tacked to cover. Things deteriorated rapidly from this point. We were sailing through the spinnakers coming down the run which, in my experience, is almost never a smart move. After we finished playing dodge the wind shadows a quick check over the shoulder revealed big problems. That waft of cool breeze, which I felt at the end of the run, had turned into a full fledged southerly.

The whole group was lifted up 25 degrees in big time pressure. If we tacked now we would cross behind about ten boats. Tom elected to do so, which turned out to be smart on his part. We decided to stick it out and wait for the wind to come back. It seemed a reasonable thing to do since we were almost laying the finish line. We should gain from either a lift or a header as long as the wind remained equal all across the course, which it did not.

The leaders with Terry in front, reached into the

committee boat end of the line in a relative hurricane while we tried to tack to the pin end, with relatively little velocity. The fleet had really bunched up. It was a really painful feeling to be within a stones throw of the mark, while the finish horns kept beeping. We just could not get there from here. It was very frustrating because the indications of what was to happen were apparent on the run, but we didn't stop to think. We should have realized that the sea breeze was coming in. If we had continued on port tack for only 50 feet after rounding the leeward mark instead of covering Tom, we would have been fine.

### Race 2

The wind had shifted to the right, which was Southeast and still light at 6-8 knots. The real challenge was to forget the disappointment of slipping from first to ninth on the final beat of the first race, develop a fresh mental attitude, and see what we could do. The course was a windward/leeward with a gate 21/2 times around. This was the first time I can remember this course being used in the North Americans. It worked fine and having the run after the first beat is so much more interesting, at least in light air, than the parade type reaches.

The weather end of the starting line was heavily favored, making for a likely general recall. For some reason, no one was over early so the entire fleet got off to a crowded start near the committee boat. our start was somewhat mediocre, so we had to tack several times for clear air. Early on we didn't seem to be in good shape. Stu Nickerson was an early leader from the left side. He was patient, waiting for what seemed a likely back. Brian observed that everyone who got to the right of us gained while we seemed to be gaining on the boats to the left. The wind was already well right of where it had been all day, and didn't seem to be continuing to shift. There was no perceptible increase in the veer occuring, so he reasoned that the right side was working for some inherent reason, that could continue. This turned out to be the golden revelation.

Stu Nickerson was way ahead of us when we started to work back to the right. We picked a couple of little shifts and got on over there whenever it looked reasonable. Every time we sailed on port tack we gained considerably on Stu. We came to the weather mark, nearly on the starboard tack layline, from a long way out. I think we rounded first. Tom Allen was second but passed us on the run. Stu, eventually had to eat a large relative loss, but still rounded close behind us. on the run we held port jibe early. Stu was pushing us hard, helped by his 100 pounds less crew weight, and the wind filling in from behind. Steve Hayden followed Tom Allen, on the other side and passed us along with Tom.

At the leeward gate, we chose the starboard mark, but tacked to port tack right away. This placed us on Tom's hip inside in the lift. We made an initial gain, and eventually caught him and Steve Hayden, when they let us get to the right side. At the weather mark, Tom took a conservative duck, when actually, he had room to tack inside and round ahead of us. It seemed like we were sailing like real gentlemen! Stu Nickerson played the right side effectively, this time up, to round a close third.

The visibility was rather poor on this beat. Fortunately, the race committee had a large sailboat stationed at the weather mark. She was a beautiful yacht, a seventy square meter, I believe, with impeccably maintained natural topsides. They had a huge American flag, flying from the mast head. The flag showed above the fog bank, making it easy to know where the weather mark was. This was an excellent thing, and all race committees should consider doing the same when visibility is questionable. In this case it was key because we were playing the right side of the course and needed to know how far we were from the layline early in the leg.

The second run was fairly uneventful tactically. We had a lengthy discussion with the Tom Allen team about the location of the leeward gate, which was not visible in the fog. Eventually we found it though. Tom chose the right mark while we took the left. Tom tacked right away, so we were both on port. Stu was slightly to the left on Tom's hip. This was the reverse of the situation starting the second beat, where we had been to weather. They seemed to be gaining initially as we had when in the same position. Perhaps we were jumpy after what happened on the last beat of the first race, but this made us plenty nervous.

The race committee had signalled a new course to the finish, 15 degrees to the right of the old weather leg. The committee boat was under way having started upwind after we rounded the leeward mark, and causing a bit of a wake and considerable noise. We couldn't see exactly where the finish would be, which became a concern, because we continued on port tack for a long time. All of this added to my nervousness. We tried to reason that the best we could do was protect the right side, which had been favored on the previous two beats. At least we wouldn't look too stupid if we got passed from the left, but given what had happened all day, it would be pretty dumb to be passed from the right. We took a short hitch back left, when we could get in front of Tom. We tacked to port tack right in front of him to protect the right. He tacked to starboard, as soon as we tacked to port.

Stu continued out to the right, so given our game plan, of protecting the right, we elected to stay with Stu. In the end we kind of split the difference. This left Stu on our hip when we tacked over to starboard. We sailed a long time on starboard tack with Stu on our hip, closer to the starboard tack layline, where all the previous gains of the race had been made. This leg was no different. Before we had finally decided we should take a hitch on port to get on top of Stu, Tom found a nice left shift to come back at us with somewhat of a gain.

We decided to wait and plant one in his face. He didn't appreciate the humor in the situation, given what a gentlemen he'd been at end of the second beat. The way we looked at it was that we needed to get back at him for the last beat of the first race. Anyway, we tacked to port right on him only a length or so in front, forcing him back to the ugly left side of the course. Stu was storming in on what seemed like another end of race relative hurricane on a starboard tack lift. We couldn't cross Stu, so had to put a nice lee bow on him which required a great down-speed roll tack, in order to pull off. This was where some great team work and effort on Brian and Jay's part really paid off. Any screw up here, and Stu had us by the S and C's. We were only 100 yards from the finish and not going to lay it. It was not a pretty time to get rolled as would happen with any less than a perfect tack. We had barely enough time to squirt out from under Stu and be able to tack across his bow and get the gun.

So we ended the first day on an up-note after the great disappointment of the first race. Tom Allen and team were in front with a second and third.

On Thursday, the fog rolled in thicker than ever. After postponing on shore, the off the-dock match race series was started. We got eliminated by Colin Park in the semifinal. We put up a good struggle, after fouling at the start gun and turning a 270 into a 360. I came away feeling that it was a lot of fun, and hope to have the opportunity to do it again at next years NA's. It sounded like the cheering section on the dock was having more fun than us. Betsy Alison, Larry Colantuono, Theresa Parker won the final against Colin.

### Day 2 Race 3

On Friday, we were blessed with a beautiful I0-12 knot breeze, out of the North East. Unfortunately, when we were starting at 11 o'clock it was starting to die. The course for this race was an olympic. our pre-race considerations were to try to stay out of trouble and rely on our boat-speed, which we were pretty confident could put us in front after any kind of reasonable start. We considered local knowledge input that said the left side of the course, nearer the shore, usually experienced stronger breeze with this direction.

However, I suspected that at three miles off shore where we were starting, the shore influence was not as great as in club races held closer to shore. I suggested a start at the weather end affording an immediate tack to port and almost certain clear air. The drawback to this is that you make a total committal to one side of the race course. The other option, Jay suggested, was to use the top secret, force-field start. We chose this one and it worked well. We were pretty much in the middle of the line. Larry MacDonald was two lengths below us, poked out a bit. Terry Hutchinson was three lengths below Larry and punched out considerably. The three of us were free to drag race out to the left corner, which worked out well for us. The wind was perfect for Brian to hike and work the boat in the waves, while Jay sat low to leeward and played the jib and kept track of the tactical situation.

I was really beginning to groove on it when Larry, still below us but a little bow out, got antsy, suggested that we were on the layline, headed, and do we need any more reasons to tack. Jay was suggesting the same thing for a while, so I reluctantly consented to use the turning around stick, to make us go the other direction. As it turned out, when we got to the mark, we still had to take a two boatlength hitch on starboard tack.

But the long port tack worked out well. We seemed to get a private lift, which Larry and Hutch didn't. They both fell into our wake. I was starting to think that somehow going to church last year was paying off!

We rounded first, with three lengths on Larry, and Terry further back in third. Terry had to sail high on the first reach to defend against George Fisher. As usual, the reaches favored the lead boats. Larry chose not to fool around with attempting to get us by luffing high, so the two of us were able to gain on Terry, since we went straight for the mark on both reaches. As we neared the leeward mark, the Yellow Fleet was in its starting sequence, apparently having had several general recalls. We were concerned that they may get off in time to be going upwind with us. Fortunately for us, we got around and started the second beat before they got too far off the line. Some of the people in the second half of our fleet were not so fortunate. Several competitors complained of having to sail too far to the favored left side of the course to get clear air.

On the second beat, we were able to sail clean. We tacked over to starboard at the same time as Larry did. We both sailed all the way to the port tack layline. Larry again seemed content not to mix it up but to get to the favored side as quickly as possible. This made it easy for us to defend, but provided no opportunity to open up much. Larry waited for us to tack to port first, when we felt we were on the layline. Larry tacked quickly, on our hip, so had reasonably clear air to hang there, awaiting his opportunity. We laid the mark from where we tacked onto port. We gained considerably on all the boats that went only slightly right. The breeze was continuing to die and still had more strength on the left side of the course. Because of this we gained on anyone who sailed port tack early in the leg.

On the run, we unwisely chose to protect the left, waiting too long to jibe. Larry gained on a puff from the right (as you face upwind). I was a little too pig-headed and not flexible enough. I figured that the wind would be stronger on the same side as on the beat. However, the situation was changing. By the time I was willing to admit what was happening, it was too late to cross Larry. He had sailed lower and faster. We had no choice but to let him jibe first. The wind was filling in from the left side now, so he gained the lead. Earlier in the leg, Jay noticed that Terry jibed over to port and didn't seem to be losing. We should have taken this as our cue and jibed to the closer jibe to the mark across Larry's bow. Oh well, we could make the next beat interesting, if the wind was now on the other side. We could force him to tack a lot and maybe get to him. However, the committee took that opportunity away from us by deciding to shorten the course to finish at the leeward mark. It was probably a wise decision in view of the dying breeze. So we had to settle for a second to Larry's win.

As we watched the remainder of the fleet finish the race, we were pleased to see that all the right people were finishing low down, to give us a reasonable points lead. When we found out that Terry had gotten a little too good of a start and been over early, it got even better. All we would have to do in the last race in order to win, was to stay within 6 to 8 places of Tom Allen, Dick Hallagan and Steve Hayden. The wind was dying, so it looked like a scary race coming up.

### Race 4

### Wind North East 6 knots. Course: Olympic

Our tactic was conservatism. The committee went to a one minute rule by hoisting the I flag for the first start, since they were anxious to get it off. If there were any general recalls, they ran the risk of running out of time and wind.

We started in the middle of the line with no one around us. Tom Allen Jr. gave us fits by starting off the leeward end and heading left. The wind shifted a bit to the left, so early on he looked good. However he got too far that way and ran out of race course. We struggled a bit, trying to stay in touch with the right people. We tacked several times, kind of playing the middle. I started to feel that I had been too conservative at the start. Tom Allen Sr. went all the way to the right corner, which gave him a substantial lead. He held on to win the race. We picked a couple of good ones right at the end of the beat to round third. We were close on Matt Burridge's transom, and Colin Park was close on ours. This was fine. If we could stay here for the rest of the race, we would be in fat city, so to speak. All the people with reasonable mathematical chances to beat us were behind several places.

But the wind gods conspired to make things interesting. At the jibe mark the wind died completely. The whole fleet strategically poised itself to pass us in the next puff. After jibing, we doused the spinnaker, and drifted for a while. Everyone started to sail high, almost 90 degrees to the course to the leeward mark. I was not patient enough with this. I could not resist the temptation to head off to the mark. As a result, when the wind filled back in, Matt gained considerably, and Colin and Phil Lotz rolled over us.

Tom Allen, Jr. got to within a few boats, and only 50 feet of us. He was keeping his chances of winning alive, in this light fluky stuff. Tom Niles was sailing a low course straight for the mark. Everyone else was sailing a fast high course. After a while we decided to come up to the fast high-of-the-mark course, on behind Phil and defend. This proved to be the wise move as the wind filled back in from above. At the end Tom Niles died, so we didn't look so foolish for giving up the low road.

We rounded the leeward mark in about fifth place, with all the right people behind us. The wind again became really light. We tried to stay close to all the right people. In this stuff things get scary, because if the wind fills from one side, as it usually does, boats start to sail considerable distance where there is wind, and the ones without the wind just sit helplessly. It was apparent that the race would have to be shortened to finish at the next weather mark in order to make the time limit. Tom Allen went to the left, Dick Hallagan and Steve Hayden to the right. We stayed in the middle. At one point Bill Faude on the right looked like he had the race won. He was still a quarter mile from the finish and in this stuff, it's still anybody's ball game until the fat lady sings. A short time later, some boat far to the left looked really good. This left hand boat was so far away we could not see who it was. We feared the worst, that it was Tom Allen, Jr. who had gone that way. It turned out to be Manuel Gonzalez, and the breeze didn't hold up for him. We were able to get to the breeze on the left, to blow us across the finish line. Through it all Jay made sure that we didn't get too uptight, with humorous comments on the passing scene.

After a great party, we wrapped up the North American Championship for 1993. I can't possibly give enough credit to my teammates, Jay Lurie and Brian Hayes. Brian helped immensely with the logistics of getting to Milwaukee and being ready to race. Jay always is helpful, in keeping things from getting too tense, and being aware of the tactical situations. He was always aware of what the compass was telling us when decisions to cross behind other boats or to tack had to be made. Their continuous discussions of the tactical situations and possible moves kept me appraised of what was happening without looking around. It is a reassuring feeling to know that nothing was going to get by these guys. Brian's years of Lightning sailing and excellent sense of how much to heel the boat at any given instant, insured that we never slowed down in waves. This allowed me to concentrate on starting, and keeping the boat moving fast with steering and mainsheet trim. It really takes a cohesive team to have a successful regatta in competition of this calibre.



## **Presidents' Cup**

As we sailed out to the course for the final race of the Qualifying Series, we were feeling pretty comfortable that we could qualify for the Blue Fleet, given our finishes in the first two races.

That all changed rather abruptly at the start of Race Number 3, when through my error in judgement, we were over the starting line before the gun, in a race where there were no individual recalls, in a series where there was no drop race. Counting the premature start in the Series not only excused us from the Blue Fleet, but our points total barely qualified us for the Green.

We certainly found the Presidents' Cup fleet to be competitive. The weather shortened the series to four races, and conditions were light, sometimes fluky, and the racing usually close.

Race Number 1 was a bit of a disappointment for us. We finished eighth, and generally found ourselves sliding down rather than up the fleet as the race progressed, exhibiting very mediocre speed.

Dave Stix of Chicago took a big lead and won the race easily. Mike Huffman and Paul Wurtzebach were second and third respectively, so it was beginning to look like a Chicago sweep. Between races, we made several tuning adjustments to try to retrieve our sagging speed. Whatever we did seemed to work, as our final three finishes were one, one, two. In Race Number 3, we rounded the first weather mark fourth and only moved into the lead in the final ten feet of the race. Andrew Horton had led all the way, and only lost out to us on a final unlucky shift. In the final race, Brian Starck sailed a super race, turning his small lead into a horizon job as the wind faded towards the finish. Finishing the Series with a surge was Pablo Amuntegui of Chile, who finished with back to back thirds in the final two races.

The Race Committee created some excitement when they signaled a windward-leeward course for Race Number 2. All the other races started with standard triangles. In my experience, the windward-leeward course is distinctly better than the triangular course, because the two reaching legs of the triangular course simply allow the leaders to build insurmountable leads on the bulk of the fleet. However, I had been concerned that at the North Americans, with three fleets converging on each other, the windward-leeward course might be unworkable. To my great surprise, the windward-leeward course seemed to work very well in Milwaukee, with minimum interference between fleets.

Hopefully, we can begin to use the windward-leeward course more often during the North American Championships. I would like to thank my teammates, Jenn Graham and Paul Olivier, who contributed not only to this victory but to a very exciting season.

The biggest winners of all were the Race Committee, the Race organizers, the Jury, the Yacht Club, and the local Fleet, who did such a wonderful job all week under very trying conditions. The hospitality was warm and friendly, the race committee work was flawless, and everyone had a wonderful time. We will try to do as well in Toronto next summer, and hope that you can all attend.

Buechner was 3rd with 16 points, and Gabel and Ehrenberg were tied for 4th with 17 points.



Alison. Wardwell got DSQ'd for failure to enter the starting zone properly.


The second match between George Sipel and Heidi Dickerson, also came down to inches. And so it went as almost 200 spectators looked on.

## Bit by the Lightning Bug

How did I get into this? What got me involved with racing a Lightning Class sailboat? I've really got to go back to childhood--a fortunate time growing up with loving parents in Grosse Pointe, MI. Dad had a good job during the depression and that made one almost affluent. When I was about 8, he bought an old sloop named Ventura that had been impounded by the Coast Guard for rum-running during prohibition. It was a New York 21 class, built around 1904. 38' overall with a 12' beam--but only 21' on the waterline with just 2' of freeboard. Of course it was gaff rigged and had just 4 1/2 feet of headroom in the cabin. This would never do, so Dad added a new cabin with 6 1/2 feet of headroom--shortening the sail to accommodate the extra height. Dad didn't much like to paint the boat and, since he was in rubber chemistry, he coated the entire boat with black rubber-smooth on the bottom but treaded on the deck and cabin top. To wind up the halyards, Dad fashioned two reels, each from a pair of old auto steering wheels, that he mounted to the front of the cabin. We were known at the city pier, where we berthed, as the "bug-eyed Chinese junk"--no offense to the Chinese. But, ugly or no, it was my introduction to the pleasure or sailing. As a teenager, I also had a 12' rowboat converted to sail with a cat-rigged Snipe main.

W.W.II came along and Dad sold the Ventura. After the war, I was helping to make Chryslers as a summer job while going to college. The assembly-line worker next to me kept talking about the boat that he and his family were living on. When he learned that I had done some sailing, he invited me to have dinner on his boat and teach him how to sail it. He was using it as a house and knew nothing about sailing. Well, you guessed it. His house boat happened to be the Ventura and we promptly powered up the old Kermath engine, cast off, and headed out into Lake St. Clair for a sail. There's always that

special time on an auxiliary powered sailboat when you get the sails hoisted and steer off to fill them while shutting down the engine. This special time, though, was filled with screams from the family below decks punctuated by lots of clanging and banging. Years of being a house makes heeling a shattering experience. Into the wind--drop the sails--and head home with tails between legs.

College--Army--marriage--family all came along with no further thought of sailing. Then, in 1968, the company moved me to Davenport, IA, and we bought an old Dutch colonial overlooking the Mississippi River. The day the van was being unloaded, the Lake Davenport Sailing Club was having their annual "Polar Bear Regatta". Lake Davenport is a euphemism for a wide spot in the River above Lock & Dam #15. There were 80 sailboats filling the river and I knew immediately that I had to join them--next year though, since this was October. I started looking for a C-scow, because this was the popular boat on the river, but every time I'd go to check one out, it had just been sold. Finally, I came across an ad in the Davenport paper for a Lightning, a boat that was also raced at Davenport. I made an appointment to go see the boat with Margaret Ebert, recently widowed by the untimely death of Clayton. Margaret told me that she would only sell the boat to me if I promised to race faithfully in Davenport. I didn't know whether or not I'd have time to race, but I lied a little and for \$1300 became the new owner or 6033--a Hoernecke double planked cedar hull that had been brought into life as Hot Canary II by Dr. Chuck Maltby, of Pymatuning YC, in the late 50's. Little did I know that I'd been "bit by the Lightning Bug". The new boat became Bullship.

The folks at the LDSC were kind enough to take me right in--anything for a new racing skipper, a sentiment that is still universally true at almost all yacht clubs. It took a whole day to put the boat together the first time. What an overwhelming array of wires and strings and drums and blocks and shackles, etc., etc. The first sail was equally memorable. The wind was a good 15 knots out of the South--that's across the river from Illinois toward Davenport for you who are geography deficient. I bundled my wife, Annie, our seven year old, David, and our five year old, Tom, up in life jackets--got the boat into the water, the sails raised--and coaxed the family in for their first ever boat ride. Just as we were about to push off, Mike Steffensen walked up and asked if I'd ever sailed a Lightning before. When I replied that I had not, Mike asked if he could go along and I was very relieved to welcome him aboard. For those of you who don't know Mike, still a LDSC Lightning sailor, he's about 6' 3" and puts a lot of weight over the side when he hikes. Thanks to Mike, the ride was uneventful and I got my first realization that a Lightning was not your typical day sailor. I also learned just how helpful sailors are to each other--wherever you go.

The racing calendar began and I browbeat my neighbors into crewing so that we could go out and abuse our bodies to finish very, very last. They got smart sooner than I did and began finding other things to do on weekends and I was into the bane of every Lightning sailor, finding crew. It's been said that you have to train a hundred people to come up with two for a race, and I certainly believe this. Our neighborhood of big, old homes was occupied, with the exception of our family, by

Catholic couples with large families of 11-10-9-9-8-8 children, all within two blocks. I put out the word that I was looking for volunteers and up walked 14 year olds Mike Spellatich and Larry Liebscher, saying they wanted to learn to sail and would like to be regular crew. Together, we learned about Lightning sailing and racing and did I ever get spoiled. Mike and Larry would come up to the house one hour and a half before starting time and pick up the sails, put them on the boat, and get the boat race ready. I'd go down 15 minutes before the gun, jump into the boat, and off we'd go. They were just as eager to put the boat away and during the second winter they refinished the inside and the third winter they did the outside. Wow! No spinnaker set (we had a 1 1/2 oz. Murphy & Nye) ever took more than 3-4 seconds and jibes were just as quick. For three years they never missed a race and we became co-champs of our little puddle with Mike Steffenson.

The shock came when we went out into the real world. Bill Buckles, then from Decatur, IL, always totally dusted the LDSC bunch during our Polar Bear. I made a couple of trips to St. Pete and one to the Red Flannels and Midwest Districts at Sheboygan. Our goal wasn't to win--it was to avoid finishing last and we weren't always successful. At Sheboygan before one start in 8 foot waves, Dr. John Esser sailed over and asked if we'd ever sailed in waves like that. When we admitted we hadn't, he asked if we wanted to know how. Of course, we said sure, and his reply was a classic: "up and down". Our trip to Red Flannels was also interesting. Saturday dawned rainy and windy--out of the east in the 20's which put 8-10 foot seas on a very angry looking Lake Michigan. After a couple of hours waiting out a postponement, the RC started making threatening noises about going racing. Just then a sloop of about 24' started out of Montrose harbor with sails down and little 7-1/2 horse kicker humming away. If you've been to Montrose, you know that you head West toward the City to clear a protective breakwall before you turn out into Lake Michigan. As the sloop tried to make the turn, it became quickly obvious that 7-1/2 horses was not going to get him head to wind in those seas, and he had no room to make a turn down wind. With his real power strapped to the boom, he helplessly struggled to keep the waves from pushing him onto the breakwall but to no avail. The whole Lightning crowd watched in awe as the sloop's crew scrambled onto the breakwall in safety and Lake Michigan made fiberglass kindling out of a once handsome sloop. The RC quickly abandoned for the day. Whew!

Larry and Mike went off to college and my job moved me back to Chicago in '72 where we lived in the far western suburb of Geneva. Sailing was just too inconvenient after being spoiled at Davenport, so I sold 6O33 and struggled with my temper on the golf course--but every decent summer day I wished I was somewhere sailing a Lightning. When another company offered employment in Syracuse in '78, it was the prospect of resuming Lightning racing--not the job-that convinced me to uproot my family again. And it was an active Lightning fleet in Cazenovia vs. an inactive one at Skaneateles, that convinced us to settle in Caz. In hindsight, all of this worked for the best for me and the family, but at the time I was strictly selfish. Even before Anne and kids joined me in Caz, I'd purchased 12809, a white Mueller with one of the first experimental ovals (not anodized and no foam floatation), an aluminum centerboard, and one of Kirk Reynolds' first Lightning sails. This combination made Bullship II an absolute certainty to turtle when capsized--even with three strapping adult males standing on the fully extended centerboard -- and I

know this from first hand experience.

Fleet racing at Caz was like starting all over again, always looking for crew and always trying to figure out how to make Bullship II go as fast as everyone else. We had some good sailors like Jeff Penfield, Dave Guinther, Tad Helmer, Dick Tuttle, and Milt Rubenstein who didn't like to lose. And when you were brave enough to go to a regatta, there were bunches of sharks, like the Hallagan family, Kirk Reynolds, Mark Sertl, Jim Gocker and the "Gockettes", and others too numerous to mention. The first five years in Caz, I never won a fleet race and never finished in the top half of a regatta. Someone smarter would have given up. Instead, I figured it must be the boat and sold 12809 and bought 13369 from Sandy Huntsman. Bullship III felt faster and we did better--but I'm sure it was more psychological than anything else. If you think your equipment is slow, you always have an excuse and you neglect to work on your own skills. It was when we took Bullship III to our first districts a couple of years later that we got the real shock -- 785 pounds !?!? I took out soggy foam, drilled holes, used hair driers--I tried everything, but each year the boat got heavier and heavier. On flat water like Lake Cazenovia, the extra weight didn't seem to bother you very much and you could still win if you were on the right side of 40 degree shifts, common on our lake. When you went to regattas with chop, though, you were dead. You also develop bad habits sailing a boat you think is slower. Since you have no chance if you sail the conservative center against faster people, you tend to shoot corners and hope you get lucky--but no one is ever lucky all the time.

My first Masters competition was in 1986 and was the closest I've ever come to winning. We raced at Henderson Harbor, NY--the greatest sailing venue that I've ever seen. It has small lake waves with big water air. Dick and Janet Sinn had just purchased a new Nickels for son, Tad Helmer, and they offered to crew for me on their boat. We went into the last race with 6 points, tied for the lead with Fisk Hayden. Crit Currie had 7 points and Dick Hallagan had 8. Half way up the last beat, we were a solid second behind Jim Carson and covering Fisk on the center left. Hallagan and Lal Burridge went right about 8 and 15 boat lengths behind, respectively. My crew, Dick and Janet, yelled at me to cover Hallagan, but I said no way, we've got to beat Fisk and we've got Hallagan on a tie breaker (who beat who most often at that time). Well, you guessed it. The wind clocks 25 degrees bringing Hallagan in first with Carson second. It's a mad dash to the finish against Crit and, I know you'll find this hard to believe, Crit's crew of Scott Finkboner and Audrey Matteson actually have Crit hiking. They nip us by two or three feet so we settle for third instead of what looked like certain victory. That will teach me to listen to my crew.

The Masters has certainly become my favorite Lightning competition and I've missed only San Diego out of the last eight. After borrowing competitive boats a couple of years, I finally scraped up enough money to get my first new Lightning, 14369 -- No More Bullship. Now I don't have any excuses about slow equipment, except that every year it seems to get harder. Young hot shots like Bruce Goldsmith and Tom Allen must use fake I.D.'s to compete--and anytime you beat Johnny Mac, the Carson/Lal Burridge syndicate, Bob Mather, Manual Gonzales, Crit Currie, or Fisk Hayden, you know you've sailed well. And how could I forget past champions, Dick Hallagan and George Fisher. Anyway, see you at Hamilton in August -- if you're lucky enough to be 55 or over and sailing Lightnings.



The good news is that the KISS (keep it simple stupid) principle is alive and well in small boat sailing. The bad news is that some of us have to keep relearning the concept. I think the "secret" to success for most of the top sailors is that there really isn't any secret. They don't fool with a lot of adjustments, they are just religious about a small number of details like heel and sail trim and are careful to have at least one member of the crew keeping their head out of the boat looking at the big picture. For most of the adjustments, set them once and don't fool with them (that is a lesson I have to continually relearn). Following are my views on which adjustments are important and which are not. While probably not everyone would agree, I think most of the good sailors are sailing the boats with fairly similar setups.

### Tuning the Rig

I really believe that the rock stars out there are pretty much following the tuning guides. Exceptions arise, however, when the tuning guides get out of date, and some minor changes evolve. If you don't have a tuning guide, ask your local sailmaker, they should be happy to help you, after all, they want you to win.

### Mast Butt position

Put the base of the mast maximum forward; 15-7/16" from the back of the mast to the front of the centerboard pin. In some boats this won't be possible because of the prebend that we will talk about later. If this is the case, move the mast back a hole. It doesn't seem to make a lot of difference, the boat that we sailed to second in the 1989 and 1990 NA's was back one hole.

### Rake

There are two methods of determining mast rake, one is to to put a mark on the forestay which is even with the top of the mast band when the forestay is pulled down the front of the mast. Then the forestay should measure 44" past the mark to the center of the pin in the turnbuckle (43-1/4 on an Allen boat). The other way is to shackle a tape measure on the main halyard, pull it up into the top ball and measure to the top of the deck in the middle of the transom. This measurement should be around 26' 4" (Matt Fisher sails with a little less rake and one or two others with a little more, but this appears to be pretty average. The forestay method is a little more reproducible if the band is in the right place whereas the main halyard method requires some calibration of how hard to pull the tape. I pull it as hard as I feel I can without possibly breaking the tape. For both methods, make sure the backstay is off. Now leave the rake alone and don't fool with it.

### Mast Blocking

With no other shrouds on, find where the mast naturally lays back against the forestay. This is the neutral position, it is where the mast sits in the absence of any bend. Fill the back of the mast partners up snug with blocks, then add 7/8" extra blocks (prebend) as the standard sailing position. I see a lot of people sailing with not enough prebend. Make some small blocks if you have to. You probably have \$10,000 or so invested in the boat and you spend a lot of time in it, so take the time to make some small plywood or plastic blocks to get the prebend right. A helpful hint for being able to move the blocks is to drill two 1/4" holes down through one of the big blocks, then use a piece of 3/16" rope to make a handle on the block. As discussed earlier, if the mast partner is not big enough in the front to take the prebend, move the butt back one hole, or cut out the front of the partner.

This is the mast blocking for 95% of the sailing conditions. The other 5% will be discussed later. Shroud tension

Set the uppers at 250 pounds, with no prebend blocks in and no backstay on. Loos gauges tend to vary a little bit so find an "average" one by trial and error. The ultimate adjustment on the lowers is to sail upwind in 6-10 mph wind and set the lowers so the mast is straight sideways on each tack from the gooseneck to where the uppers intersect the mast. A helpful rule of thumb is to set the uppers at about 200 pounds on shore with the prebend blocks in. This is also equal to about zero on the Loos gauge with no prebend blocks in. But be sure you check it carefully while sailing. At the beginning of each year I fiddle around on the water getting the mast straight on each tack.

Now you have the rig tuned for almost all conditions. Make note of the settings, leave it alone and don't worry about it anymore.

### Other adjustments

### Jib cars

We used to have adjustable jib cars, but we took them off. Maybe some other people move them around, but all they did was distract me. We use 2-1 jib sheets which I strongly recommend, it makes adjusting the jib, particularly letting it out, easier in breeze. All you need is two small Harken blocks (H-223), 36' of 3/16 rope and another 18" piece of 3/16 to tie the blocks on. We dead end the line on the cockpit coaming on the inside rather than tieing it to the jib car itself. Doing this takes half the load off the jib car so it doesn't skip in waves and is easier to adjust if you ever want to move it. Also you have twice as fine an adjustment since only one end moves when you move the car. We set the jib car so that the jib sheet is parallel to (or very slightly behind) the trim line on the jib. On a Nickels boat with a single lead jib sheet, or a 2-1 jib deadended on the car, and a Fisher cut North jib, the car has 6 holes showing behind it. It stays there 95% of the time. The only exception is heavy air (above 20) particularly with flat water.

### Jib halyard tension

Some of the tuning guides describe a system in which there are marks on the jib halyard for light, medium, heavy, and "why am I out here" conditions. These are good guides, but I think there is a simpler system. We tension the jib halyard until we can definitely see that the load is all on the jib, not the forestay. At that time, the forestay is dangling maybe 1" inside the jib luff. Our front crew, Karen, then has the responsibility to keep that same amount of "dangle" in all wind conditions. So in heavy air the jib wire stretches a little and the dangle disappears, she tightens the wire. Conversely, in light air she lets it off. This system works out to be the same as the measurement system described in the Fisher -North tuning guide. The mistake I see a number of people making is not having enough wire tension on the jib. If your wire downhaul doesn't work, fix it, so that you can easily adjust it. We run our wire up onto the deck on each side, with an extra 2-1 purchase on it.

### Traveler height

I think it is important to have either a good vertical adjustment on the traveler and/or the ability to pull it to weather a little. It is necessary to be able to center the boom without having to sheet so hard that the leech hooks to weather in light air, particularly in waves. Pulling the bridle to weather is the most effective way to be able to center the boom without over tightening the leach, but having the bridle at maximum height works almost as well. Pulling the bridle to weather each tack is a nuisance, however, because you have to adjust it every time you tack. To some extent the importance depends upon the sails you use; it is more important with the Fisher cut North and less important with the North M5. From what I have seen, people using Shore sails use a little weather bridle. My inclination is that 90% of the objective is accomplished by being careful to keep the bridle at maximum height for the wind conditions, but there is some additional benefit in pulling it to weather. If you read last year's yearbook, Matt Fisher strongly believes in pulling the bridle a little to weather and he definitely makes it work. But be careful, the boom should never be to weather of the center line.

The bottom line is that if you don't have either adjustment you are definitely giving up pointing ability and/or speed in some conditions.

### Spinnaker pole height

I think it is important to be able to adjust the spinnaker pole height in light or puffy broad reaches and runs. We do this by leading the pole adjustment to the deck forward on each side. The pole wire has a Harken 223 block inside the mast, then one continuous line runs from one side into the mast, around the H-223, out the other side of the mast and up to the deck. This also gives you a 2-1 purchase for those times when it is hard to pull the pole up. The objective of the pole adjustment is to help the chute fly in light air. When the luff collapses, lowering the pole immediately will help fill the sail right away and get you going again. Keeping the clew heights even is a good rule of thumb, but just watching the luff of the spinnaker to make sure that it isn't drooped, leading to a collapse, is the real objective. The front crew should do height adjustment because whenever the pole goes down it also goes forward, so the middle person needs to adjust the guy at the same time that the front person is moving the pole. Sailing the Boat

The main point of this article is that you don't need to be fiddling around making a lot of adjustments. The mast blocks, jib leads, outhaul, shroud tension, etc. are set pretty much in one position and left alone. But the top sailors, I think, are very attentive to a few adjustments: <u>Boat heel and jib trim</u>

The boat must be kept at the correct heel, otherwise the skipper has to do a lot of steering to keep the boat on track. Unfortunately the Lightning has a rudder that is extremely inefficient, which dictates doing as little steering as possible.

Going upwind, the correct heel seems to be with the weather chine just barely out of the water, except in extremely light air where a little more heel works. The front crew should be sitting inside to leeward continually playing the jib (wind conditions permitting). They should be letting the jib out in the lulls, and after hitting a bad wave, and pulling it in during the puffs. The objective being to keep the jib constantly at the same place on the spreader; about 2"-3" in for flat water, 1" in bumpy water, and outside the spreader in survival conditions. In our boat Karen is constantly adjusting the jib without waiting for me to ask her, although she generally tells me what she is doing. I also tell her what I want on the jib if there are some unusual conditions.

### Main trim

Keeping the back foot of the top batten parallel to the boom is still the rule of thumb that works, even off the wind. One thing that we have noticed in sailing with other people is that it is interesting how many skippers spend a lot of time yapping at their crew about flying the spinnaker properly, but don't work the main at all. The skipper should be constantly playing the main on reaches, making sure that it is always on the edge of luffing.

Heavy air

There was an article in Flashes last fall that discusses heavy air sailing. Briefly, the first way to depower is to ease the bridle, then use a little backstay to depower the main (and flatten the jib). If we have to depower with the backstay, at the same time we move a mast block from the back of the mast to the front. If it blows harder still, we take up about three turns on the lowers.

In summary, get the boat set up right, then pay attention to sailing, not to the details.

## HIGH TECH vs. SAIL IT SIMPLE

The dilemma between the "high tech" and the "sail simple" approach has been in the mind of many competitive sailors in the past. It seems like, in order to win races, a top sailor should be an expert on complicated subjects such as aerodynamics, meteorology, fluids behavior, etc. Most sailors believe that a deep understanding of these subjects gives the "edge" that makes the difference between winning a race and coming in second.

It is clear to me, that when you sail more often, you race more ofter and, as you spend more time on the water, you begin to develop "feelings" that later on will help you feel the boat. In order to make it go faster you begin to develop certain abilities that help you react and even anticipate changes in wind, current and wave conditions. As your sailing progresses and you begin to win races you start to wonder, what am I missing in order to win a top championship, such as the Worlds? More often than not, you believe that the answer is in "high tech," that there lies the key for success.

From my perspective, the most relevant aspect of "high tech" is the psychologi-

Santiago, Chile cal edge, when you believe that somone beats you because he knows something Fleet 490, Acuelo Lake Fleet that you don't. Of course, the easiest way to get rid of this "disadvantage" is to begin studying and reading "high tech" articles and books and to begin using this knowledge on the race course. More often than not, you will find that your scoreboard position is not improving and, even worse, you are going down the list. The main reason is, that it is extremely difficult to manage so many variables at once in a boat that only carries three crew on board. In big boats, it is easy to have on board specialists, a navigator, a meteorologist, a sail trimmer, etc. When you have few people dealing with lots of issues, they end up forgetting the basics, the "simple things" that help us win races.

I don't believe that "high tech" makes one sailor better than others, I believe it is "time on the water" and the quality of the people we sail against that makes the difference. And concentration and keeping in mind "the simple things."

## SAIL EXPO

Thanks to Sandy and Mary Huntsman for a post-show report about Sail Expo held in Atlantic City in February, 1994. The Class entered Sail Expo for three basic reasons: to gain publicity, to get non-Class member boat owners to join the association and to get new owner/members for the Class.

From any of the above the show was successful. It seems that better than half the sailors attending the show at some time sailed a Lightning and are impressed by how classical it still looks. According to a fellow exhibitor, "The Lightning is what you picture when you think of a classic sailboat." Being in the show served as an example and reminder that the Lightning is one of the foremost one design boats. The former and present Lightning sailors attending signed the Lightning poster. Anybody you know?

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## **GEORGE'S AXE**

### Prologue, 1953

There was more than enough room under the deck for a young child, especially a slightly built eight year old boy. He enjoyed lying on the large, white canvas sail bag now stuffed with extra life preservers. Below deck was cooler on hot, sunny days and warmer on grey, blustery days. Indeed, he liked everything about the boat. In the cockpit he sometimes helped his dad by holding the jib or, if he was lucky, by helping to steer. Quite often he simply sat with his chin on the leeward coaming while dragging his hands in the water.

After a few summers the sailboat was sold and a power boat bought. Though he certainly liked this craft too, an affinity for sail had been established forever. Maybe someday.....

### 1992

It was another hot, sunny day that found our young boy, now middle aged, sitting quietly in church waiting for services to start. Beside him sat an elderly couple, lifelong friends of his family. The white-haired gentleman turned to him, "Say, Bob, you know that Lightning I bought from your dad?" He nodded yes. "Well, I don't use it anymore, and I was thinking that if you wanted it, you could have it."

Lightning #871 was now mine.

### THE SURVEY

Say what you will about rose colored glasses, sentimentality, and 20-20 hindsight, it's all too true. To me the boat I saw sitting in the middle of that cow pasture was beautiful. Actually, she didn't look that bad. White fiberglassed hull, green painted canvas deck and varnished mahogany brightwork and interior. The only questionable areas were at the bottom of the stem where the glass was separated from the hull and the same at the transom. I'd fix her. No problem.

My brother and I hitched the terribly ancient, homemade trailer up to my car and gingerly hauled her to the road. My Walter Mitty-like revery was torpedoed but two miles later by the frantic honking of my brother who followed. Looking in the rear view mirror, I could see the boat and the smoke. Smoke! The boat was on fire!

Smoking only, as it turned out. The hull had shifted and was riding on top of the starboard trailer wheel. The resultant friction had burnt through the fiberglass and scorched the wood. I can fix it. No problem.

### THE GAME PLAN

Due to other demands on my time, work on the Lightning did not commence until September 1993. The first order of business was exploratory surgery at the stem. A fracture in the glass was carefully opened and probed. There was nothing inside! The bottom of the stem was gone! The incision was widened. This did not look promising. The thick fiberglass was cut to the top of the stem and peeled back on both sides. The ends of all the planks were completely rotten and the stem ate through at the bottom.

The game plan now was to build and install a new stem. A call to Worthington brought a membership in the Lightning Association and a set of plans. No problem.

A new stem was made using the plans and the remainder of the old stem (after careful removal) as patterns. While the boat originally had been built entirely of mahogany, with the exception of the fir plywood deck, I decided to use white oak instead. White oak is difficult to work with due to its incredible hardness which was just why I, as well as generations of New England shipwrights before me, preferred it for framing.

Installation of the new stem was a challenge since there was nothing to attach it to. An internal bow subframe of white oak was fabricated on which to attach the stem. This would also serve to strengthen the bow and provide a grounding to attach the (as yet to be made) scarfed-in plank ends. I decided to thoroughly examine the transom before tackling the plank work. Two to three layers of thick fiberglass were tediously removed.

Talk about ruining your day. It was a total disaster. The day and the transom. It too was rotted beyond salvage. In fact, it was no transom at all but the top of a piano! Honest, the gold stenciled name of the manufacturer on the inside was still in excellent condition even if nothing else was.

OK. So now we make a new transom, replace the fore and aft ends of the planking and we're back in business. No problem.

Well. almost, but not quite. A beautiful new transom was built of five quarter mahogany but its installation depended on new plank ends and they weren't yet in place. I purchased several planks of mahogany, planed them to thickness and ripped them to size. The old planks were cut back into the hull three to four frame stations and staggered from plank to plank so as not to weaken the stern. So far so good. That is, if I could ignore the rot in the frames, which was now visible.

It was time we had a talk. I sat down and talked to myself for two days. I was able to reduce the predicament to several conclusions: First, I wanted this boat. My family (wife and two young daughters) wanted this boat. Second, there was already a considerable investment of time in the project. Could I come this far and abandon it? Third, my name had been drawn in the lottery for a dock at the state marina on our Mosquito Lake reservoir. This guaranteed a dock for five years starting in April of 1994. Fourth, to continue would probably mean the replacement of many frames and maybe most of the planking. Last but not least, I enjoy working with wood. No, I love it. I have a fairly complete home shop and a modicum of ability. After having built my own house, several barns and a host of cabinetry, I find that nothing can compare to boat building. It is a different art altogether and it touches a different chord. To one immersed thus, it is the boat that is the end and boating a distant second. Yes, my decision would be to defy all logic and continue. But the end product would be different. No longer would the aim be just to achieve a functional boat but to create a beautiful restored classic watercraft. Something that I and my heirs would be proud of.

No problem.

Phase II

To do it right I had to be able to see the wood. The hull was still mostly covered with fiberglass and the interior painted. The glass peeled off without too much of a problem and took many bungs with it. I found out the hard way that it pays to wear goggles, a respirator, hat and shop coat when removing glass from underneath the boat. Removing old fiberglass causes the air to be filled with miniscule particles which are VERY hazardous to eyes, lungs and other body parts.

The planks thus revealed were cupped and shrunk. Up to quarter inch gaps between them was not unusual. After several false starts with different methods paint remover was used on the interior. Two heavy applications and two weeks later the interior was once more bare. Five coats of paint were removed. As suspected, many frames were bad and ALL the midship frames were cracked at the turn of the chine. On reflection, this is not surprising as the Lightning design allows for no support midships at the sheer. In other words, one has this great cavernous cockplt and nothing to support the sides from flexing under the loads incurred while heeling over except for these tiny knees which aren't even on the plans. In all, 15 of the 36 side frames were replaced and 8 of the 18 bottom frames.

White oak, as mentioned before, was used to replace all frames where necessary. Now a word about hardware. The boat was built with copper rivet fastenings. While none of these were found to have failed, some had stretched slightly and most were distorted. I opted to use stainless steel bolts, washers and nuts in their place. For fastening planking I used slotted, flathead, silicon bronze wood screws. These are all expensive little buggers but they are the best. Steel, zinc coated steel, brass or aluminum fasteners are persona non grata on any boat. They won't last. They are doomed to failure.

While on the subject of materials another very critical decision I made was to use West System. This is critical because it dictates how the planks are to be cut and assembled. Whereas traditional planking requires that the edge of the plank be jointed with an outside caulking bevel, this is not done with epoxy joining. The edges are flush. Fortunately the sides of a Lightning are flat and not rounded so just true ninety degree flat edges are required.

Back to frames for a moment. The process of replacing frames was as follows. First the bungs covering the plank screws were removed with a pocket knife then the screws themselves with a variable torque, reversible drill. A sawzall with long metal cutting blade was then run down in the joint between the side and bottom frame to sever the copper rivets. The frame, now free, was laid down on a new oak plank and used as a pattern for the new. This was cut out and a bevel jointed on the plankside edge to match the bevel on the old. The frames were purposefully cut long so that they extended some eight inches above the sheer line. Deck plywood had already been removed. Two coats of West System were then applied and allowed to dry before the frame was rein-Because the frame was being installed onto stalled. planking which was to be replaced, steel screws were used which would later be thrown away when the new planking was hung.

Whoa, I hear someone saying this guy's nuts. Why not replace both at the same time. Now while this is likely true, one cannot disassemble both frames and planking at once without creating an awful mess on the floor. We have here a symbiotic relationship.One depends on the other for integrity. For all intents and purposes, this is building a new boat without the mold frames and strongback. This project depends on maintaining the integrity of the existing shape. For that reason the side frames were left long. As a pair of frames, port and starboard, were installed, a temporary one by four stringer was bolted across the hull to each. This was for two reasons. First it

would guarantee the shape of the sides as adjoining frames are removed for replacement and second these numerous cross stringers would form a platform on which the hull could rest when turned over to work on the bottom. They would later be sawn off flush with the sheer before installation of the deck.

Once upon a time it was possible to plank many boats even larger than the Lightning without splices in the planks. Those days, at least in the midwest, are gone. Parameters set by the transportation industry seem to dictate that no boards longer than 13 feet shall be shipped inland. So splices are inevitable.

One of the best written sources of information on replanking that I have found is Allen Taube's, <u>The Boatwright's Companion</u>. Herein is also valuable instructions on frame replacement. Taube describes the traditional method of lengthening planks by the use of butt joints and butt blocks. However, due to the circumstances of this particular project and the simplicity of the Lightning design, I modified this somewhat.

Here's how I did it. Since I planned on replacing the bottom or chine plank after the boat was turned, I started with the second side plank from the bottom. This was unscrewed, removed and disposed of. By the way, don't even think about reusing the old screws. If they aren't already broken or break upon removal, they now possess internal stresses which render them unfit for reuse.

With a putty knife and scraper, the remnants of previous caulking were cleaned from the top and bottom edges of the plank, on either side of the one removed. Next, I took the forward plank (two were required for this strake) and fit it into the old space with the assistance of a helper. (I had already ripped it to its required width.) While holding a piece of typing paper on the stem end of the plank so that its top edge was even with the planks top edge and extending the paper over the fore edge of the stem rabbet, I used the flat of a pencil to trace the edge of the rabbet. The plank was removed, and the end cut using the traced line as a guide. If the rabbet is undercut, as was this, refitting and rasping will achieve a nice fit which will lock the end of the plank in the stem. I then marked and cut the aft end of the plank so that it fell exactly half way between the frames at the station where it would be spliced.

The plank was placed upside down on the floor and butted up to the plank to be spliced on. A ten foot long straight edge was used to line up the two boards while a butt block was held firmly over the joint and a drill ran through both block and plank. The planks were then turned face up and countersunk for the flat-head stainless steel bolts which would hold it all together. Once epoxy was applied to the ends of the planks and the bottom of the butt block, the planks were assembled, again using the straight edge as a guide, and allowed to dry for a day. Epoxy was also brushed on the inside of the planks where they would contact the frames. Used plastic bags were placed under the glue joint to prevent the glue from adhering to the floor.

After drying, the plank was set in place, firm in the stem rabbet, and fastened to the frames. Because of the stress caused by bending, the end of the plank is not fastened first but rather the second frame to prevent splitting. Working towards the stern the remainder of the plank is fastened, keeping its bottom edge tight against the top edge of the plank below. Small wedges at the top edge of the new plank helped here. The aft ends of all the planks were allowed to remain longer than their finished size as they would be cut flush with the transom after its installation.

Succeeding planks were done similarly except for the number of splices each required. Due to the necessity of staggering splices (it could weaken the hull to have all the splices at the same frame station), every other strake must have three boards and therefore two splices.

Another exception to the process of attaching succeeding strakes was the application of the bonding medium. After the strake was fastened to the frames it was removed, West System epoxy applied to the mating surfaces then refastened. Believe me, it is much easier and neater to do it this way than to apply the epoxy first and THEN attempt to fit, drill and fasten the plank. To make drilling and counterboring of holes easy use the fuller combination tapered drill, stop and counterbore. It's the greatest invention since TV remote control.

If, at the initial fitting of the plank, gaps (anything other than dead flush) were found between the planks a filler was added to the epoxy mixture. I used West #405 filleting blend since it imparts a tan color which nearly matches the mahogany. All the written sources agree that epoxy, especially with a filler, and opposed to all other adhesive mediums, has the property to span and harden in gaps.

I would have liked to describe the rest of the project to its completion but since at this writing it's not done, I won't. I will, however, share most of my plans so that later, if perchance you see this craft, you can gauge my success or lack thereof.

### Some Tips from the Top

#### Use Sail Trim to Help Turn Your Boat

Everyone knows you turn a boat with the rudder. This directs the stern of the boat in one direction and turns the boat by pivoting it around the centerboard or keel. However, steering with the rudder has a couple of limitations: first, you can't turn if you are not moving very fast because the rudder only works when water is flowing over its surface.

Second, steering with the rudder slows you down. The further you push the tiller to one side, the more the rudder's surface area will be exposed to the flowing water, and the more the rudder will act as a brake.

Because the rudder has disadvantages, you must use other turning methods if you want to go faster. Here's where the sail trimmer plays an important role. You may have noticed on a windy day, for example, that the skipper has a hard time bearing off around the windward mark unless he or she dumps the mainsheet. On big boats, the sail trimmers often have more control over the direction of the boat than the helmsperson!

Just like the rudder, your sails can be used to help turn the boat around its underwater pivot point. Sailboards are a great example of how this works. Since boards don't have rudders, they rely on the position of the sail for turning. When a board sailor wants to bear off, she pushes the whole sail forward over the bow. This puts more wind pressure forward of the daggerboard, so the bow pivots to leeward.

The same principle applies to a sailboat. If you want to turn away from the wind, pull the jib tight and let the main out. This moves the effective sail area forward, which pushes the bow away from the wind and pivots the boat around the centerboard. If you want to head up toward the wind let the jib out and trim the main in tight. Now the working sail area is behind the centerboard, so the boat will head up.

As a sail trimmer, you should use these techniques any time the boat changes course. It's very important to ease the main, for example, whenever you are rounding a windward mark, bearing off behind a starboard tacker or trying to keep from rounding up on a reach. Likewise, you should ease the jib a little any time you are luffing into a tack or rounding a leeward mark.

If you consistently use sail trimming techniques to help turn your boat, your gains around the race course will be significant. Try this: on your next practice day, sail out into open water and remove your rudder. Then practice turning the boat with your sails only. This requires good coordination between the helmsperson on the mainsheet and the forward crew on the jib sheet. If it's windy, you may need to raise the centerboard a little to move the center of lateral resistance aft and reduce weather helm.

### Sailing Upwind In A Chop

Steering a Lightning through a heavy chop is not an easy task. The "resonation" made by the bow slamming the waves when it isn't"done right" is the best tattletale there is of improper tune and steering. While it isn't possible to miss them all, there are some things that can be done, sail trim, tuning, and steering wise to help make the job a little bit easier.

The natural inclination when sailing through chop is to power the boat up as much as possible. While obviously the boat does need extra punch, how that punch is directed is most important. The first indication that the boat is not set up just right and that there is maybe too much power for the wind is the feel at the helm. If there is too much weather helm (the boat wants to round up into the wind) the boat will be very difficult to steer through the chop. Excessive weather helm means the tiller will be pulled to windward of centerline and the rudder will be literally dragged through the water.

Usually it is not too little backstay or too much mainsheet that creates the problem of excessive weather helm. Most Lightning sailors are comfortable with setting the mainsheet so the upper batten is angled outboard slightly from parallel to the boom. Most also just pull the backstay until the slop is just barely removed (unless it is blowing really hard). However, it is the traveller position that usually unbalances the boat. Normally we think that we want to pull the traveller up to a point where the boom is close to centerline since the mainsheet is eased and the upper batten is open. However, the bottom of the main is still powerful and the lower leech is hooked in relation to the centerline of the boat. In chop it is not unusual in a 8-IO mph breeze for the traveller to be down to leeward perhaps as much as 6". Actually, the true gauge will be the feel on the helm. The helm must be nearly balanced so the boat can almost steer itself straight upwind all by itself. In flat spots, the traveller can be pulled back near centerline and the mainsheet trimmed to the batten parallel to the boom position. However, as soon as the boat enters waves again, traveller must go down and the sheet eased.

It is also natural to want to heel the boat a great deal because it seems to put a more"V'ed" hull shape to enter the waves. While this may be true, a boat sailed with more heel develops more windward helm. Instead, try to keep the boat flatter, maintaining the weather chine no more than 3-6" out of the water. Many Lightning sailors sail with the chine just barely touching the water so that the boat is only heeled I0 degrees at the most. A boat that is balanced and sailing fast can still be steered to misss the biggest waves.

Steering around the waves should not be accomplished with only the tiller. The more the tiller is wiggled, the greater drag and the more the boat will slow down. Instead, ease the mainsheet (sometimes as much as a foot) to help the boat bear off and then trim it back in to help the boat head up. Be sure when trimming the main back in not to overdo it so the weather helm again won't load up.

Be sure to adjust the jib also as the boat heads up and bears off, but don't overdo that either. If the jib is eased more than the ease of the main, the boat will not have the tendency to bear off and it will be much more difficult to "steer" through the waves. Unless it is extremely light, the jib should be eased out so the



batten is angled close to the tip of the spreader and never trimmed inboard more than 1"-1.5," inside the tip. In light winds, don't be afraid to ease it out to as much as 2" outside the tip of the spreader.

Check that the extra life jackets, tools, water bottles, spinnaker poles, etc. are brought in from the ends of the boat and centered as close to the centerboard pin as possible. The crew weight too needs to be centered close with the skipper moving forward and the forward crew moving aft to help minimize the boat's tendency to hobby horse through the waves.

Finally, be careful to avoid pinching at all costs. A boat that is going fast through the water will go up and over the waves much easier than one that is slow and loaded up with excessive weather helm. Good luck and happy slamming.

#### **Balancing the Lightning**

I have always believed that everyone should have many different interests and hobbies in life. Too much of one thing generally leads to stagnation and boredom. I think that you have to have the proper balance in your life to be happy and successful.

"Alright," you may ask, "but what does that have to do with Lightning sailing?" To be honest, EVERYTHING!!! Just as you need to constantly change and try new things to avoid becoming stagnant, the Lightning needs constant movement and adjustment so that it can be sailed at its fastest all the time. The following are some ways we use to make sure that we have the right BALANCE when we race the Lightning.

#### Checking your upwind heel

The first thing that you should realize is that the Lightning is a hard-chined, very square, flat boat!! If you could look, from under water, at a Lightning sailing at various heel angles I think many people would be surprised at how drastically the profile of the boat changes with just a few degrees of heel.

When sailing upwind the middle crew is responsible for making certain that the boat has the proper heel and that the crew weight is positioned correctly fore and aft. You should make certain that the transom is never dragging in the water. If it is, move your weight forward. You also need to maintain proper heel angle. In very light air we try to have the boat heel so that the weather chine is about 4" to 6" out of the water. This will allow gravity to fill your sails without sliding to leeward when a puff hits. If there is a lot of chop you will need to heel more to get the forward section very narrow and pointed so the boat does not pound in the waves. In flat spots you can sail the boat a little bit (2" to 3") flatter.

In moderate wind conditions we usually have the middle crew turn around so that their chest leans on the rail.

This allows them to a) see the race course a little easier so that they can give good tactical information to the skipper, b) keep their upper body and head out of the skippers line of sight and c) gives them ability to quickly check over the weather side to monitor the heel of the boat by checking to see how far out of the water it is. In moderate air we try to keep the chine out of the water about 2", this is about 8 to 10 degrees of heel. These are the conditions when subtle changes in weight can make huge differences in pointing and speed. There should be constant adjustment to keep this angle of heel.

In heavy air the middle crew will basically disappear over the side until the weather mark (when they will need you to fiy the spinnaker!). In these conditions the balancing of the boat and keeping the proper heel becomes the responsibility of the skipper. It is very important to keep the boat as flat as possible. As the boat heels more the centerboard loses its hydrodynamic efficiency and you will slide to leeward. The skipper must steer and play the backstay, bridle and mainsheet to keep the boat tracking and flat.

The secret of keeping the Lightning going fast at all times is having your crew working in unison so that you maintain the proper heel angle. If you practice sailing your boat focusing on keeping the proper balance it will give you and your crew a "sixth sense" and feel for the boat so that maintaining boatspeed will become second nature.

#### **Light Air Sailing**

This article will focus on light air sailing, particularly on the small lake conditions that many of us experience in the middle of the country.

#### Boat set up

We currently use a combination of "North" and "Fisher" sails, with no difference in how the boat is set up for light winds. We follow the "North-Fisher" tuning guide with the exception that the tension on the lowers is determined on the water by sighting the mast while close hauled so that the mast is straight (sideways) from the gooseneck to the uppers. One difference from the guide is that we use a little more pre-bend than is recommended. I think a number of the better sailors also do this. David Starck does, as well as Greg Fisher, at least the last time we talked about it. To set prebend, we determine the "neutral" mast position by noting where the mast is with only the forestay attached. We then fill up the space behind the mast with blocks until the blocks are snug, but not pushing the mast forward. This is the neutral position; maximum prebend then uses a good one-inch of additional blocks in the back of the mast. This is the set up we use when it blows hard enough to use the backstay, at which time we take 3/8" -1/2" of blocks out of the back and put them in front (see

future article on sailing light in heavy air). The optimum sails for light air would be a fuller jib and a flatter main with a more open or twisted upper leech. Pre-bend helps accomplish this.

All other adjustments we leave in the normal position. We make sure the bridle is at its maximum height and or pulled a little to weather, particularly with the Fisher-North main, and we sit well forward in the boat. Very light air (0-3) is the only time we have the jib luff and forestay at the same tension, in all other conditions all the load is on the jib luff. **Tactics** 

In simplistic form, go for speed, not direction and go looking for the wind. Sailing downwind in variable wind is, for me, the most fun. The trick is to find the puffs and stay in them for as long as possible, so that means bearing off once you are in it and run parallel to its direction, i.e. downwind, to maximize the time spent in the puff. once it is over, head up and go as quickly as possible through the light air before the next puff, then ride it down as long as you can. This often means heading as much as 20-25 degrees low of the mark. We adjust pole height quite a bit in these situations, up on the reaches and in more air, down in the lulls and on broad reaches.

The upwind tactics are pretty much the classic textbook stuff. In oscillating winds, we depend a lot on the compass, trying to be on the lifted tack as much as possible, and one crew is looking far up the course for other boats (hopefully not in your class) signalling coming wind shifts.

A couple of comments:

•In very shifty winds, the sails are almost never optimally trimmed, so have them eased very slightly to keep the boat freed up a little and moving fast. **Be very aware of keeping the boat moving fast, rather than being oversheeted.** 

•Make sure the jib person is constantly playing the jib, out in the lulls and bad waves, in for the puffs. Try to have front or middle call waves so you can bear off for a little more speed.

•Our general philosophy is to sail conservatively up the middle, but this sometimes doesn't work on narrow lakes in light air, because the wind wants to come off each shore, onto the lake. This sometimes means that there is a zone in the middle where you will be continually bouncing off headers. This isn't fun.

•Don't go chasing puffs (sailing upwind) after the fleet is in them. If you see shifts **coming**, go for them, but once the fleet is in them, you usually end up continuously out of sync.

•In the light air, big waves of San Diego, we found ourselves letting the jib out more as we got used to the conditions, but we kept the main relatively centerline, bridle to weather 1" - 2" if you have that option (we didn't at the time). This kept a little weather helm but kept the jib feed open. Karen played the jib almost continuously in the waves.

Above all, be patient and don't get frustrated, keep the boat moving for speed, rather than direction.

#### **Trimming the Fronts**

For many of us skippers it is much easier to see what is happening with that big sail in front of our faces than the little one at the front of the boat. However, we know from computer flow programs, that the jib provides 80 percent of any sailplan's driving force. That being the case, it seems to make sense to give some careful consideration to the person in the front of the boat who trims the jib. But what does this person look for, in order to trim the jib to best affect?

The easiest way to get the correct settings for the jib is simply to look at your sailmaker's tuning guide. Set the jib lead to his measured position from the headstay, usually in the 96-I00" range. Then simply pull the jib in until the top batten lines up with the spreader tip or a little inside, whatever the trim guide for that particular jib suggests. This is usually good enough to get close to the ideal trim for most conditions. But what are some of the finer points we are considering when we come up with these numbers?



Here are some things that go through my mind. First of all let's think about how it works. The jib luff is the furthest forward of the boat's center of lateral resistance, while the leech of the main is the furthest aft. The lift contributed by these two parts of the sailplan, must be in balance or the boat will want to turn rather than going straight. These forces must be balanced about the centerboard. If they are not, the helmsman can feel it in the form of excessive weather helm or a lack of any helm when the boat is heeled to the optimum angle for the conditions. We want to trim the sails so there is only enough weather helm to make the boat easy to steer. When we go out for our prerace tune-up, we sail up-wind initia11y and see how the boat feels. If the helm is too heavy we may be trimming the jib too eased, or the main may be trimmed too hard. So we make that necessary correction. Frequently people refer to the criteria that the luff should break equally, top to bottom, as you head up. This is a good starting point, but the Lightning often performs best with the jib trimmed so the top breaks a little early, particularly in rough water.

The helmsman and jib trimmer need to work together to maintain the best windward performance. We always use the luff tell-tales as a guide. The leeward one should be flowing all the time. The weather one can be allowed to lift intermittently, or in heavy conditions and smooth water, continually. In lighter conditions, the jib trimmer should always have the sheet in his or her hand.

Whenever the boat feels slow, or the leeward telltale starts to stall out, the sheet is eased slightly to keep flow over the leeward side of the jib, as indicated by a steady leeward telltale. Then, whenever there is a puff, the sheet can be trimmed to facilitate higher pointing through the puff. In full hiking conditions the sheet isn't adjusted as much and the forward crew hikes. However, it is important to get the boat set up with jib trim that properly balances the helm. If the lead is too far forward, the lower part of the jib becomes too full. This situation is recognizable because the bottom of the jib will tend to luff, and the helm will be excessively heavy. This can also mean the main is overtrimmed.

When the lead is too far aft, the bottom of the jib is too flat. If this is the case, to keep the leeward telltale flowing, you have to push on the tiller. or if you ease the sheet out until it is easier to keep the leeward telltale flowing, the top of the jib is continually luffing. once again, I feel that it is bad if the leeward telltale ceases to flow, but the weather telltale should be flying slightly up about 50% of the time in anything but light air with flat water.

Just a word about the angle of the top batten. I've usually had the best performance, when the top batten is nearly parallel to the boats centerline or just slightly open from the position. The jibs that are flatter in the head like to be more open so the top batten points more to leeward.

This touches on the basics of lead position and sheet tension. In the finer tuning category we can get into headstay sag and luff tension, but that is a subject for another time. In the meantime if you wish to talk about tuning, please feel free to call me at North Sails East.

We had a great 1993 sailing season in our district, the most important events being the European Championship in Greece, organized by the Yacht Racing Club of Athens, and the Italian Championship, organized by Circolo Velico Tiberino on Bracciano's lake, near Rome.


For us, in regard to the first event, six Italian crews took part, five from Marsala Fleet 449 and one from Trasimeno Fleet 453. The period (20-26 June) was unusual for a European Championship, and with only one month's communication in advance many more skippers were unable to participate. We obtained fourth position with the crew of Reina, Maggio, and Ottoveggio; the sixth position with Alagna, Alagna, Paxia; the seventh position with Rustichelli, Mearini, Scarpocchi; the tenth position with Valenti, Puletto, Vitaggio; and thirteenth with Tramati, Prinzivalli, Montalto. It cannot be considered a true European Championship but a meeting of Italy versus Greece.

With regard to the second event, there were nineteen Lightnings on the starting line, two with Swiss crews. Of the Italian crews seven were from Fleet 449 in Marsala, three crews from Fleet 453 in Trasimeno, one crew from Conero Fleet 466, and six from Rome Fleet 479. This championship confirmed the return of the Rome fleet activity and this is very important for us because it establishes again a geographic homogeneity of our district, and represents a central place which cuts down the traveling expenses. So we met at Anguillara Sabazia on the lake, received by the organizers with commendable hospitality. Only five races were sailed because meteorological conditions provided a hard wind. And in those conditions the Sicilian crews had the advantage for in Marsala the wind is often very heavy. The 1993 sailing season saw a continuation of the trend toward increased participation at both the fleet and regatta levels.

The District Championship Regatta was held at Atwood Lake for the first time in Fleet 212's 42 year history This lake is nestled in the wooded hills of northeastern Ohio and consists of two distinct sailing areas separated by the dreaded...."Dog-Leg". Anyone attempting to race through this feature of the lake knows that concepts such as "safe leads" or "hopelessly last" have no meaning here. This course took best advantage of the water and wind available and greatly enhanced the strategic and tactical options on the downwind legs. George Fisher won the Ohio District Championship Trophy again, followed by Rob Ruhlman, Dick Pugh, Jon Anstrom, and Tom Varley.

This was the second year that current District Commodore Dean Caley has distributed the Ohio District Newsletter each month of the sailing season. This informative and well written newsletter concentrates primarily on the theme that regattas are loads of fun for all participants and that newer members are encouraged to join in regardless of their skills on the race course. It also does an excellent job of keeping all of the district members up





July: Gary Hurban won the 4th of July Regatta, and took a third in the Districts.


August: We spent three Sunday afternoons on the porch, eating, drinking, reading, bragging, and waiting in vain for some wind.

When the ice went out, we had to weight the docks down with barrels filled with water. That helped protect them from floating off the pilings or having the decking removed by power boat waves.

The water conditions prevented us from putting our boats on our docks until late May instead of the last of

April. We had so much rain that we weren't able to work on the crash boat to prepare them for the season. This made for very nervous and frantic preparations, as our regatta is normally held in late May or early June. The regatta was held as scheduled on June 5th and 6th in conjunction with the Thistle fleet from Rochester Canoe Club. We had plenty of rain and wind and cold water. The Saturday night party was held at RCC with good food, beer, and some dancing. I want to thank all the volunteers that brought hors d'oeuvres and especially Larry Weinstein and his wife for putting together the steak dinner with all the fixings. It was wonderful. I also want to thank Dick Hallagan who served in his 5th or 6th year as regatta chairman. With his attention to the budget we were able to run a fine regatta and stay "in-the-black" even with a smaller attendence than usual; all at a "come-and-race-with-us" price.

Our fleet has five major series that are run for the Lightnings; the Spring Series, Summer Series, Fall Series, Summer Bay Series, and the Overall Champion Series. The Overall Champion Series is a combination of Spring, Summer, and Fall Series scores. The Summer Bay is an early morning Sunday race that is held on the Bay before we head for the lake to race in the afternoon. We had 24 different boats compete in 48 races throughout the summer. We race with anywhere from 3 to 15 boats; with an average in the 7-9 range.

Bob Jamison won 1st place in the Spring, Summer, Summer Bay, and Overall for the year. Congratulations for an outstanding season. Landy Atkinson placed second in the Spring, 5th in the Summer, 3rd in the Fall, and 2nd overall; also a fine season. Bob Crum and his lovely bride Jan placed 5th in the Spring, 2nd in the Summer, 2nd in the Fall, and 3rd overall. Bob and Jan sailed the "Most Races" and were also given the "Most Improved" award. Dick Doherty won 3rd place in the Spring, 4th in the Summer, 4th in the Fall, 2nd in the Summer Bay, and 4th overall. World traveller Dick Hallagan placed 4th in the Spring, 5th in the Fall, and won the Missil trophy (awarded for the Labor Day series). Sixteen year old Chad Atkins won 1st place in the Fall, and 5th Overall in a season filled with travelling. Watch for this kid in the coming years. Howard Stickney won 3rd in the Summer, and 4th in the Summer Bay Series. Allen Hamilton placed 3rd in the Summer Bay Series. Bill Wright placed 5th in the Summer Bay Series. Other awards include Neal and Eva Smith winning the Burns-Hanna trophy, which is a Memorial Day Series. The "Rookie of the Year" award went to Dale Hamilton.

Families are a very important part of the Lightning heritage in our club and all over the country. Dale Hamilton has begun sailing boat 11050 with his daughter as one of his crew. He inherited the boat on the passing of his mother, long-time member Bertine Hamilton. Ernie and Bertine Hamilton were mainstay and active members of the club for many years. God rest their souls. Other racing families include Allen Hamilton who sails 10096 with daughter Sally Atkins, and grandson Matt Atkins. John Atkins oft-times crews for his son Chad. Gordon Wright crews for his father, Bill. There are several others that can be found from time to time on the race course with their small children. Dave Walsh, for one, can be seen on the race course with 2 or 3 of his young sons (ages 7-10). We have relaxed our fleet racing rules to accomodate short- and extra-handed crews. This allows these families to join us.

In the past three years, the fleet, led by Dave Walsh, has helped support an Optimist fleet. If the children develop an early interest in the sport, we hope to bring a lifetime of sailing enjoyment to these kids. We are looking to them to crew, skipper, and grow our fleet in the future. The future for the Lightning class is with the families and the youth.

Our fleet has several boats that make the regatta circuit in and around Central New York. Anywhere from 7 to 9 boats can be found "on the road". Five boats went to the Districts with Lori Foster placing 2nd and was awarded the district "Rookie of the Year" trophy and Uhg (but that's another story). Lori is an outstanding crew for many throughout Central New York, sometimes those crew are deadly when they start to take the tiller. Dick Hallagan did a lot of travelling this year: starting with the Southern Circuit in March, then on to Brazil for the '93 Lightning Worlds in May. Local crew Lori Foster and Bob Bush from Philadelphia shared the adventure where they placed 9th. In June, Dick went to the Europeans Championships in Athens, Greece with son Peter and daughter-in-law Kristen as crew; they placed second. In August, Dick travelled to Sheboygan to race the Masters where he place 5th. The next week found him in Milwaukee primed for the North Americans. With crew Lori Foster and Brian Hughes (from New England) they won the Qualifier Series. They continued with the magic and finished 3rd in the Championship Series. Congratulations Dick, Lori, and Brian. Alan McReynolds of our club made his first trip to the NA's as skipper with Landy Atkinson and Amy Greenlee as crew. They reported having a lot of fun and laughs, even though they got DFL in the "green fleet". Good Luck next year.

The fleet welcomes new member and proud boat owner Brad Poulos. Brad was guest skipper for Neal and Eva Smith for much of the year. He was so smitten with the boat that he had to get one for himself. (So why don't you think about handing over the tiller to your crew, maybe they will be struck by the Lightning as well.)

I would like to thank Dick Hallagan for being Regatta Chairman over last few years; it has meant a lot to the fleet. I would also like to thank Howard Stickney for again being the Secretary/Treasurer. He really keeps the fleet running smoothly, and I have always enjoyed working with him. I also want to thank Lori Foster, last year's fleet Captainess, for helping me with her many ideas and, of course, the mailings through-out the year. I also want to thank the fleet for showing up to race and have some fun.

1993 Evans Regatta - Race Committee Perspective

Saturday p.m. at 1:30, the last boat came over the finish line. We had just finished three back to back races which had started at 10:00 in the morning. Paul Wurtzeback with crew Karen Johnson and Mike Elmogreen were leading with two firsts and one second. Behind was Brian Phelan with crew Bruce Heida and Dave Poquette with a first, third and fourth. Rounding out the first five were Jeanne Ehrenberg in third, Rob Hamill fourth and Dan Reichelsdorfer in fifth. Comments from all sailors reflected the most ideal weather conditions one could want with an offshore breeze varying from 8-12 miles per hour and a flat sea. Another cause for comment came from the fact that we had run three races in about 3.5 hours. All were Olympic courses, two of which went the full distance while one finished down wind after five legs.

The reason we can run our races in such optimum time is that we keep a rather short diameter for our fixed buoy system. A fair estimate would put the windward mark at 3/4 mile. To avoid a jam at the first windward however, we extend the first leg to about one and one quarter mile. This worked beautifully and after rounding the first mark no further problems arose on our rather tight triangles, yet the total time of the winning boat was about 45 minutes. From our experience we would like to see other clubs try this combination of a long first windward leg and shorter subsequent windwards with comparable shorter offwind legs.

Sunday brought a second idyllic day with winds slightly increased from 10 to 15 and still offshore giving us very flat seas. Paul continued his winning ways with two firsts followed by Brian with two seconds. Dan Reichelsdorfer had steady four and five to edge him into third place a point ahead of Jeanne Ehrenberg. Rob Hamill held onto his fifth place position.

As usual, all committees carried out their tasks without a hitch under the guidance of Vicki Vannieuwenhoven. Something of its character will be remembered by John Esser's remark after first acknowledging a great regatta with "What are we going to do the rest of the day?" We told him to try Bayfest!



1993 was a year of rebuilding for Fleet 126. Building on last year's successes, we continued to bring in more participants and got them to participate more often.

The Fleet purchased a boat that is available to all area sailors with an interest in the Lightning so that they can get out on the race course as skipper, and see how much fun it really is. The Fleet also participated in "Sail Awareness Day", a mini Sail Expo to introduce sailboat racing and Cedar Point Yacht Club to people in the area. This was followed up by an Open House at the Club where we took people out for short sails so they could experience sailing a Lightning.

Within the Fleet, we picked up a few new players, notable Tom Glynn, Whit Batchelor and Cary Shaw, although we did lose a few as well. Unfortunately, the Hendersons moved when Fergus was assigned to a new position in Singapore. Fergus, a former Fleet Captain and Secretary, along with his wife, Sarah, were Fleet institutions, always on the starting line, always bringing in new sailors, and always the first to participate in onshore fleet activities & regattas. Edson White's boat suffered a crippling blow from a tree during one of those nasty winter storms we had. Steve & Elysa Wexler were AWOL, Steve trying to complete his medical internship this year. And, late in the season, Tom & Jody Ingram sold their Lightning and bought a Snipe so they wouldn't have to find a third crew anymore.

Nonetheless, we had more boats on the starting lines this year, and almost doubled the number of boats that qualified this season. Part of this increase came from the institution of multi-race days almost every weekend, an idea of Phil Lotz's that was tested last year and really came into its own this year. The concept of 3—4 quick races in one day, usually windward—leeward, got a lot more boats out on the line and made the competition tougher than ever.

Fleet 126 hosted two regattas this year, as we do every year: The Early Bird (the weekend before Memorial Day weekend) and the Fall Classic (two weekends after Labor Day).

The Early Bird attracted 25 boats from as far away as Annapolis, and the weather gods shone upon us with puffy, shifty conditions that tested everyone's early season sailing mettle. An incredible steak dinner topped off Saturday's two races, and of course, the party continued. On Sunday, one race finished up the regatta so folks could travel home. Phil Lotz showed us that practicing at the Mid-Winters helps, and took home the silver. Stu Nickerson was second while Ched Proctor, who was also down in Florida, took third, Jim Crane fourth, David Peck fifth and Gianni Cuccio, sixth.

The Fall Classic attracted 21 boats. Not bad considering that the Sonar NAs had "borrowed" a few Lightning skippers. Saturday the wind was "light & variable," but a challenging, position shifting race was completed before the early cocktail hour and famous lobster dinner. Sunday, a cold front came through and you couldn't ask for a better breeze as the final two races were completed. Stu Nickerson won this one, followed by Franz Edson and Don Barrett. Gianni Cuccio was the first Fleet 126er in the top 10, with 21 points, and fourth, Whit Batchelor fifth with 21 points also, and then Dick Thackaberry in eighth, with, can you believe it, 22 points. Talk about tie breakers. Needless to say, the racing was competitive and fun. Don Barrett on Niantic Bay won the Northern Circuit trophy again as his third in the Fall Classic combined with his second in the Governor's Cup (at Niantic Bay) gave him the best combined finish in the two regattas.

We also attended away regattas as well. Ched Proctor and Phil Lotz both took boats down to the Mid-Winters, and Ched even came away with a second overall. The Connecticut Governor's Cup, hosted by the Niantic Bay Yacht Club, was moved from September to June, and ran into the June wedding blues. We did manage to send two boats up, though. No comment on finishes.

Back at Niantic Bay in July, Fleet 126 sent 11 boats (out of 25) up to the CT/RI districts. Phil Lotz once again took home the silver. Jim Crane was second. Ched Proctor finished third. Jody Lutz took fourth and Gianni Cuccio grabbed fifth for a Fleet 126 sweep of the top 5 places. Not bad.

At home, we had races every weekend, and series on the holidays. Attendance was consistently good. Memorial Day weekend's Vice Commodore's Cup saw Saturday blown out, but more than enough fun was had Sunday & Monday to make a weekend out of it. Gianni Cuccio was first, Tom Ingram second, Dick Thackaberry third, Jim DeCesare fourth and Bud Titsworth fifth.

Fourth of July weekend saw more great racing (all three days) in the Commodore's Cup races with nine boats on the starting line. Once again, Gianni Cuccio was first, with the Thackaberrys second and Jim DeCesare third.

We finished up our club season with the Rear Commodore's Cup over Labor Day weekend. Gianni Cuccio, showing amazing consistency, was first, with fleet captain Eric Heller second, and Tom Ingram, in his last club regatta, third.

Overall, for the season, Gianni Cuccio was first, Tom Ingram second, Dick Thackaberry third, Eric Heller fourth and Jim DeCesare fifth.


Dick Price, a regular on the Lightning starting line, was awarded the H. Dayton Titsworth Award, an award

Dave Bull was the runner-up, winning many of the fleet races he participated in, as Dave is the fleet's most active traveling sailor, competing in any regatta within a six hour drive. Close behind is the ever present Dick Tuttle, who retired the historical "*Tape Duck*," #10679, for a new boat in the middle of the 1993 season. The fleet also held its annual crewettes race in which Pam Tuttle took tirst place after many years of sailing Lightnings on Cazenovia Lake.

Fleet 164's only newcomer this year is an old friend, Clay Murphy, who brings an added challenge to fleet racing at Willow Bank. Clay also brings opportunity to better the sailing in our fleet through crewing and teaching some of the younger and less experienced sailors in our fleet, as do many of our more experirnced and successful racers. Clay achieved a second place finish for the CNY Blue Jacket series, proving to be yet another serious contender in Central New York from the Willow Bank Fleet.

The Caz One Day finished our season of racing at Willow Bank on a beautiful fall day. The winds were light to moderate and shifty as usual on Cazenovia Lake but made for some excellent racing. Fourteen participants sailed in five races, breaking after the third for the traditional lunch of Dave Bull's "Chili Guaranteed to Bring Foul Air." The racing was tight as usual with Bob Cole finishing first and Willow Bank locals, the Murphy/Meira team, Dick Tuttle, and Dave Bull all finishing in the top five.

The 1994 season will bring more challenges within our fleet as the Roth boys, Geoff and Rich, Scott McBurney, Nat Dain, and the recently married team of Mark and Stephanie Jenner, provide an ever increasing threat to take a fleet championship. With the team of "Mr. Fabricraft," Craig Thayer, and champion sailor Federico Meira producing quality inexpensive "PNC" sails, which have been proven effective by champion Dick Hallagan, some of us on restrained budgets may be able to afford high quality new sails instead of the rags we've been using. All in all Fleet 164 looks forward to a successful, competitive, fun filled 1994 sailing season with the International Lightning Class Association.

During the season 1993 the Fleet 166 had two active boats, Masi V and Minmax, who sailed almost every ranking regatta. Terho Aromaa participated also in the Worlds in Brazil. Our season began with the On the Rocks Regatta in the middle of May at Lake Tuusulanjärvi. This year we had most beautiful summer weather with good winds. Kimmo Aromaa won, even though he had to sail with his oldest sails and his crew was not the usual one. The best sails and half of the crew were in Brazil. The first two ranking regattas, which were sailed in Helsinki and Kuopio, were both short track regattas, i.e. three 30 minute races per day. Both regattas were sailed close to survival conditions in very cold weather. The first regatta in Helsinki was sailed with windward-leeward courses close to shore. The sailing was extremely difficult and resulted in several crashes and capsizes. In Kuopio we had first heavy winds and then no wind at all. On the first day we used a triangular course and on the second day a slalom course. In these regattas Masi finished fifth and second, Minmax was tenth and eleventh.

The District Championships were sailed in the beginning of August in Helsinki. First two races were sailed in light winds, two second races in heavy weather with cold rain and the last two races in 6-8 m/s with tricky shifts. On every day *Masi* had one good race and one poor race and was fifth in final results. *Minmax* sailed in the middle of the fleet and was 11th in final results. Leo Korhonen (10 points), Kari Mäenpää (11 points) and Saku Vento (16 points) were the best skippers.

In the end of August we had The Big Challenge, a single hand regatta at Tuusulanjärvi. In this regatta all normal racing rules are used, the use of all three sails is allowed, but no special equipment is allowed. This year a normal Hellerup course was used and because the wind was quite light, all sail combinations and manoeuvres could be used. Hartti Nisonen won the great prize (and a Ferrari) and Kimmo Aromaa was second.

After the Districts we had three ranking regattas, which were all sailed on lakes. In Valkeakoski *Minmax* was

fourth. In Jyväskylä short courses were used and *Masi* was fourth and *Minmax* sixth. In the last regatta at Tuusulanjärvi Masi was fifth. In our Districts final ranking series *Masi* was second and *Minmax* tenth, a total of 29 boats got a ranking series result. In the ranking regattas we had usually 10-12 boats and in the Districts 20 boats.

Most of our regattas this year were sailed using other than the usual triangular Olympic courses. Both regattas at Lake Tuusulanjärvi were sailed with a short Hellerup course. Three of the ranking regattas were sailed with short courses. In Helsinki and Jyväskylä windward-leeward courses were used, and in Kuopio a short triangular and a slalom course were used. Some important experiences were that a short courses tend to become too hectic in heavy weather. The slalom course is too difficult even in light weather, because reaches are too short for proper spinnaker work. This course is definitely only for dinghies. A run after the first beat helps the last boats to catch the fleet, so the race is not only following the leading boat through the race area.





The work was finally completed and the weather cleared to provide terrific weather the remainder of the summer and fall.





The 1993 season was plagued by bizarre weather and other conditions beyond control as we only raced in 10 out of 26 potential weekends. Ironically, the record Midwestern summer floods did not adversely affect CSA's operation but the lesser publicized flash floods of late September crested the lake 8 feet above normal and abruptly ended the season.

The 1993 season got off to a sticky start as CSA opening date was delayed 3 weeks due repaving of our boat and car parking lots. Despite the club not being open for business as usual, the 2nd Annual Mid-Continent Regatta was run in flawless conditions. All six races saw 8-20 MPH with sunny and 75+ degrees, not bad for only the second weekend of May. The event was sponsored by Pepsi and Mount Gay Rum who provided the skipper and crew trophies in addition to beverages. On the race course it was a one boat show with Dan Moriarty and his team of Scott Zerban and Matt Burridge winning the first five races and watching the finale from the beach. In the last race, Ken Kneipmann won the race and second place, rounding out the rest of the top 5 were: 3rd - Gerry Paoli; 4th - Terry Burke and 5th - Lal Burridge.

The Fleet sent several boats to the Districts in Nashville early in June. Despite getting only 3 races in light breezes, Carlyle sailors were able to hold their tempers in challenging conditions and placed 4 boats in the top 5. Congratulations go to Gerry Paoli who won his first Districts and was elected District Commodore. Dan Moriarty finished a close second with Rob Zerban 4th behind HIYC ace Cully Ward and Terry Burke was 5th. In 1994 CSA will host the Districts and this year's trophy winners have promised to do a better job of sharing the trophies.

The Spring Series trophy winners were: 1st - Dan Moriarty; 2nd-John G'Sell 3rd-Terry Burke; 4th-Mark Kneipmann and 5th-Arthur Merdinian. Dan continued to hog the finishing cannon as he won every race he competed in. This series set up several interesting duals as class newcomer Glenn Grummon and Ben Williams began a course of steady improvement and ace crew Arthur Merdinian skippered Stu Bernstein's boat to consistent finishes.

Our Summer Series saw Moriarty win every race except 2 (this was getting VERY boring) for the series victory. John G'Sell and Mark Kneipmann both showed their excellent light air speed and were separated by only 1.25 points with G'Sell winning runner-up for the series. District Champ Paoli and rapidly improving Williams tied for 4th, the tie breaker and last trophy going to Paoli.

Five boats went to Milwaukee for the NAs with Burke and Burridge (Matt was granted permission to sail in Dan's spot) making the Blue fleet, Gerry Paoli and Rob Zerban in the Green and Lal Burridge upholding CSA's honor in the Yellow. Everyone had a great time and Gerry is now giving "dance lessons" for the entire fleet. The Fall Series was canceled as flash flood waters ended the season prematurely.

Our fleet championship series is the second race of the day all season long. Over the past 4 years Matt Burridge and Dan Moriarty have switched skippering duties in a day. This year Matt had the same success Dan enjoyed in the morning seasonal series, winning the series and scoring all firsts with Jennifer Aljets and Dan crewing.

The battles for places 2-4 ended in two virtual ties. Terry Burke and Mark Kneipmann were in a duel for runner-up which took them to the finish of the final race to decide. Kneipmann was ahead and below Burke with both on port. Kneipmann tacked to starboard and could close the door on Burke at the pin but instead tacked for the line. Burke shot the line at the pin. In a "photo finish" Burke won the finish by less than a foot and in doing so became series runner-up with Kneipmann .25 points back.

Ben Williams and Glenn Grummon both made great gains throughout the season and certainly will both be contenders in '94. This improvement is best illustrated by the way in which their scoring tie for 4th was broken. As they improved and shadowed each other in the afternoon races all year they could have no idea the tie breaking race had already been sailed on the '94 season's first weekend. On that day, Williams had a 9th to Grummon's 10th. Illustrating the progress of each team, in that first race day there were only 10 competitors. The fight to avoid a DFL on this first day made the difference. Tragically, losing the tie breaker also dropped Grummon out of the trophies too. Hang in there Glenn, you'll get 'em in '94!!

Several significant non-racing events occured: Dave Jones bought a new boat and his crew Ned Sher bought Gerry Paoli's boat. Whats Gerry going to do? Fleet 266 has a crop of new sailors and Ben and Debbie Williams brought Douglas into the world and our future crew rosters. John and Carole Folwell moved to Ohio, John had been the Chairman of the CSA board for 10 years and a charter member of Fleet 266 at CSA and they are both missed.

We had a great time this year and hope you will visit CSA, Home of the 1994 Olympic Sailing Festival, for our Mid-Continent Regatta on May 14 & 15, 1994.

#### In Memorium:

In December our fleet was saddened by the passing of Stu Bernstein. Stu was one of the original members who moved the fleet from Alton Lake to it's current home on Lake Carlyle in 1970. He was a long time promoter of the Lightning class and of one design sailing while sitting on the CSA board of directors for 20+ years. All of the members of Fleet 266 will miss his enthusiasm, energy and camaraderie.





In the late Fall of 1992 there was a meeting of concerned members of Fleet 481. There had been a markedly reduced number of Lightnings competing in the Carolina Sailing Club monthly races during the year. In September only two boats showed up; it was a match race rather than a regatta. SE District participation had been fair, but these members felt that allowing the local racing to slide would ultimately lead to the demise of the Fleet. So, the Gang of Four laid out plans to recover what was about to be lost. First, it was decided to forego other regattas if there was a conflict with a CSC race weekend, at least for the first three months of the season. Second, crew lists were made so that no one could not sail due to lack of crew: as many different crew as possible were utilized to get them interested. Third but not least, a concept was developed called TUSL (pronounced "tussle").

One design racing is the best way to learn sailing, but keep the competition friendly. With that thought in mInd, the best way to enjoy racing is to improve the level of competition in the Fleet as a whole. This requires a combination of education and partying. During the Spring of 1993 the Fleet sponsored the TUNE UP SEMINARS for LIGHTNINGS (TUSL) during the April and May CSC race weekends. All local boat owners and even members of nearby fleets were invited to attend; crew were guaranteed. Some of our better racers let others skipper their boats and crewed for those newer or less experienced sailors. Saturday's three races were video taped. Later that evening in April there was a hamburger and beer party with a review of the taped races by North Sail's Brian Hayes giving a very successful and appreciated seminar. The next morning in the parking lot Brian provided an excellent demonstration of how various crew duties should be performed before that day's races. It was very well received. In May a similar formula was used, but the Saturday night seminar was a round table and black board discussion of the racing lead by two of our own more experienced skippers. TUSL gave a mixture of instruction and socializing that restored the enthusiasm for racing. John Pelosi with crewing professionals Phil Culpepper and Kent Mullikin had the 2nd best showing on the Southeastern Circuit at 7th place. Michael and Anne Rees provided steady competition and even better friendship. Doug King successfully repaired an older boat and assured himself of fairly steady crew by marrying Kathie, and thus has risen as one of the better sailors in the Fleet. Grant Wolslagel resisted the appeal of another nearby sailing club and remained a consistent sailor with Fleet 481. The newest member was Deborah Bender sailing an old boat with excellent advice from her father, a Lightning sailor from long ago. Work schedules kept Bob Wilkins off the water much of the time but he still contributed greatly by running various race committees, including the Governor's Cup. Worth Lutz and Art Thingulstad always provided help when needed. Pat Terry and Martha Vinson, among the Fleet's best crew, will join together and get their own boat in 1994.

Fleet 481 is dedicated to the Carolina Sailing Club. A number of members have been and are currently serving leadership roles in the CSC. During 1993 Michael Rees and Ned Nutt were on the Board of Directors. For the Governor's Cup Bob Wilkins was Co-Director of Water Activities and Ned Nutt was responsible for Shore Activities with wonderful help from Fleet crew member Angie Maletto. Doug King will be Director of Water Activities for the 1994 Governor's Cup. Ed Michels wrote the computer program for scoring and has made a major ongoing contribution with membership surveys. Past Commodores of the CSC include John Pelosi and Ed Michels.

The BORDERLINE REGATTA, developed and hosted by Fleet 481, has become one of the premier regattas for Lightnings in the Eastern United States. For 13 straight years it has attracted nationally known and ranked sailors to race and socialize during the 4th full weekend every October. The competition is high, the camaraderie is warm, and the party is great. The CSC has shown wonderful support by providing its best for race committee; each year many volunteer to help with the BORDERLINE. The reason for the popularity is simple: Fleet 481 goes out of its way to put on a good show (and great food).

Lightning Fleet 481 looks forward to 1994 and to great racing with the Carolina Sailing Club and the Southeastern District. We hope to see all of the ILCA at the BORDERLINE REGATTA October 22-23, 1994.



Lightning Fleet 486 sails on Alton Lake, a pool of the Mississippi River. Unfortunately we found our lake at the center of national attention for the entire summer of 1993. We were stategically located at the center of the new, temporary "great lake" that formed during the greatest flood ever recorded near St. Louis. We frequently saw our sailing area on TV through the eyes of a helicopter observer. We could also spot our clubhouse roof in newspaper pictures taken at even the highest altitudes. It was easy since there was nothing but water for miles.

We apparently have El Niño to thank for the many thunderstorms that parked over the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers all summer. At Valley the rivers came together and gave us a sailing area seven miles wide. We actually suffered from three floods; first a spring flood that abated long enough for us to open the harbor, then the BIG ONE that put an extra 20 feet of water in our harbor, and finally a third flood in September which only added insult to injury. We now have an extra eight inches of mud over the grounds and in the harbor. We will be spending quite a bit of time on civil engineering to have a useable club next summer.

Our flood insurance check will completely refurnish the inside so the outlook is promising.

For sailing activity the club members stayed together and traveled to regattas. Our fleet championship was sailed on windy Arkabutla Lake near Memphis during the Cotton Pickin' Regatta. Our good friends in the Memphis fleet even provided trophies! Rick Conaway will be recorded as the 1993 Fleet Champion. Fran Renschen was second, Wayne Watson was third, and Bryan Uhlmansiek was fourth. Steve Wyers got in a little sailing at Carlyle Lake, taking advantage of the free month of sailing that was generously offered to us "flood victims." The rest of the fleet used their boats as large colorful yard decorations. Sailing is a good reason for a vacation so our members also sailed in St. Petersburg, the Chesapeake Bay and many of the Midwest's finest lakes.

There is no doubt that Valley Sailing Association (and Fleet 486) will survive to sail again. Please feel free to stop by and check out the flood plain for yourselves. We have many reasons to count our blessings. A beautiful sailing location, good friends and good boats. But most of all we have to thank our club treasurer, who made sure to pay the premium for the flood insurance.

Our focus this year was on Junior sailing and fleet and district members spent a lot of time coaching teams to enter the qualifiers for the World Lightning Youth Championship in Switzerland in July 1994.

We initiated the program by inviting under 19 year old members of four district clubs to a cocktail party at the hdme of now ILCA president, Tony McBride. After an initial response of over 20 youth sailors we began a six week series of social evenings and chalk talks featuring intensive on-water coaching and instruction from local luminaries including Bill Fastiggi of Burlington, Peter Hall and his 1989 World Championship crew, Alain Boucher and an IYRU judge.

Each Friday night we'd get together to focus on one particular facet of the sailing mix. The first night we used our surfeit of youth and strength to get all the Lightnings out of the sail-shed and rigged. This proved entirely satisfactory and everyone, boat owners and youth sailors alike, enjoyed the experience, particularly the owners.

A difficulty was assigning crews to boats and to each other. Next time we plan on importing a sage from some Himalayan hilltop to guesstimate their weights and experience so that there are no mismatches. As it turned out, we had the right number of kids for five boats and a couple of spares besides. Once on the water it was obvious that all the kids could sail well and we knew it was only a matter of time before they started to come into their own as Lightning sailors. Our guest speakers on Friday nights were a joy and spoke about sail trim, boat handling, mental preparation and the rules. The six weeks before the trials were filled with short races, brushing and team training.

The trials themselves were held over a two regatta series and Marty Essig from Hamilton consistently arrived first at the weather mark and expert boat handling and sail trim took care of the rest. Somewhere towards the back of the fleet our teams began to warm to their task and started to finish well when the wind picked up. After six races Marty had five wins and a third but was punished severely in the seventh when he neglected to ease the back-stay going down wind in 25 knots and watched the mast first invert, then snap forward at the hounds leaving two PCYC boats battling for second and third.Canada's two reps next year will be the teams of Marty Essig, Tory Crowder and Todd Fedyszyn from Royal Hamilton and Kevin Vines, Bernard Roach and Patrick Leger from Pointe Claire Fleet 499.

The volunteer work of the fleet members at both Royal St. Lawrence and Pointe Claire Yacht Clubs was exemplary. Boats, sails and equipment were freely loaned to the kids and time was devoted to their supervision by a wide assortment of skills and talents. The kids could do nothing but learn.

The spin-off, of course, was that we grew an entire battery of trained crew for all the Lightning owners, near and far. It won't be long before these kids will be owners and the cycle can be repeated.

No one could complain about the weather this year. From mid-May to mid-October, we had great conditions except for the weekend we sailed the Youth trials the first time and the occasional evening race.

Our club championship, determined over a dozen evening races was won by Tony McBride with Kim Browne second.

Tony and Kim and Cynthia Joy also went to Milwaukee for the NA championship where Tony was inaugurated as president of ILCA with the traditional 16 oz serving of neat whiskey.and where the winds blew hot and the beer flowed cold. We are very proud to have a fleet member elected to such an exalted position in such an august body as ILCA. Tony has also been the spark to a revival of Lightning sailing on our lake and deserves the highest commendation for his efforts. Tony has also since begun a winter training series for the youth teams wherein topics like categories of wind conditions, starting tactics and rules will be as fully explored as time and concentration allows.

Kim Browne volunteered to be the trip co-ordinator for our youth team next year and has started a program where she will work with each of the qualifiers to assist them getting their money and schedules together for the World Championship itself.

David Browne, our Fleet Captain and District Commodore, loaned his boat to the kids, promoted the class, successfully organized our District Championship, race managed the Canadian Women's Match Racing Championship, married off a daughter and traveled to France for a two-week recovery period. Good on ya, Dave.

Pointe Claire Yacht Club, like so many other clubs, has a core of dedicated racers and willing volunteers that get things done and make things happen. Perhaps it is due to our small fleet, or simply the characters who make it up, but we have developed a close, respectful group of sailors whose skills have expanded exponentially in a few short years and whose joint efforts on land have been rewarded many times over. On-water histrionics, so much a part of fleet racing, are nearly non-existent at our club while hard racing and close covering is all the rage. There are no sore losers or big winners which makes the bar after racing a comfy place to discuss who did what to whom.

Fleet 499 is alive and well and while the fleet itself is growing slowly, we sail more and enjoy it more. Any questions?
