I was introduced to the Lightning in 1939 at the age of eight. My dad bought one of the early Skaneateles (#137) boats, and I took to it right away. By the time I was twelve, I was sailing in local regattas and having lots of fun.

My best years were during the 50s and 60s. I had won about five Connecticut-Rhode Island District Championships and about five Connecticut Governors Cup Championships. My best was a second and couple of thirds in the NA Championship, first in one Presidents Cup and a third at the Worlds in Naples, Italy. I continued sailing the Lightning until about 1984; then I succumbed to a 38-foot, Sirena 38, and have been racing PHRF to the present time. I call it the old man's Lightning where the keel does the hiking.

It's fun, but not like the good ol' days in the Lightning. I give credit to all my old friends that have stayed with the Lightning, in spite of the aches and pains. Brian Hayes' dad was my loyal crew for years and did a fabulous job. My old "Woody" is now in the hands of Brian's brother Neil, who has kept it in great shape. He took it to San Diego last Summer for the NA Championship. It looks like the boat will outlast me.

I live in Florida (November–April) and back in Connecticut the rest of the year. I still sail out of Niantic Bay, Fleet 85, which is the home port of the Sirena 38.

My latest activity is racing Soling one-meter, radio-controlled model boats in Punta Gorda. We have a group of thirty-four members and are having a great time. We race twice a week and abusing the racing rules like you wouldn't believe. Fortunately, no one is in the boats, so there are no injuries with all the collisions going on.

Bruce called the Office to let me know that he had not been very involved with the Lightning Class for some time now. He did share a little story that he worked very hard and finally received his Certified PRO rating from US Sailing but hasn't been asked to officiate a race since.

It would not be possible to pick a "best experience" over the twenty-two years I raced a Lightning because there were so many wonderful ones, but a particularly memorable event was the 1968 Metropolitan District Championship, which Nancy and I attended on our honeymoon. Dave White, Wayne Van Dyke and I sailed the brand new 10777, which was Nancy's engagement present. After a devastating cocktail party, Arnold Schwartz gave an impassioned speech demanding to be impeached as District Commodore (I don't recall the outcome of that meeting, and I am pretty sure no minutes were taken).

In 1981, while he was working in Dallas and I was unsupervised, as Nancy was finishing medical school in NYC, Kip got me hooked on fast cars, which led to sports car racing. A year later I took up this new avocation, which I still pursue, although no longer at the professional level. A week after the 60th anniversary at St. Pete, I will begin the 2007 Historic Sportscar Racing series at Sebring, Florida. I have many fond memories of my time spent sailing Lightnings and the fine people who make up the Class. From time to time I take a look at the Class' website and always read the Flashes from cover to cover. While I am still sailing, sadly I have only been in a Lightning a few times since I sold my boat in 1995.

Jim Force

I was born and raised in "Lightning Town," South Haven, Michigan, which was home to the ILCA headquarters office for many years. It was downtown off a second floor hallway above McKimmie's sporting goods and clothing store.

It seemed that everyone in South Haven had a Lightning, and every kid learned to sail on one. The boats comprised Fleet 30, based at the South Haven Yacht Club, less than a mile up the Black River from Lake Michigan. In those days, we sailed out the river to the "Big Lake." Today, you'd get run down by power boats before you got to the pier heads.

As teenagers, a group of us pooled scant resources, purchased #2494 and named it "Cardinal Puff" after a drinking game we participated in when not on the water. Later my brother and I bought #2946, and in our dating years, my wife and I bought #6039 in 1963. We still have it.

My life membership was awarded after I edited the Class yearbook in 1969. I was fresh out of journalism school at Wisconsin and just a couple of years into my public relations career when Helen Limbaugh asked me if I'd be interested in the job.

It was, and I know still is, a lot of work, but it was exciting to receive articles and photos from sailors and fleets all over the world. They came by mail in thick envelopes in those pre-Internet days, and I think I still have some "galley proofs" on yellow paper in the basement somewhere.

Another special memory was the 1968 North American Championships off Chicago. I rode on a committee boat and photographed and reported on the expertise of Bruce Goldsmith, Bill Shore, Carl Eichenlaub—who snapped a mast but still managed to struggle upwind and finish the third race—and Tom Allen, who won it all. The '68 NAs occurred just a few days before protesters tried to shout down the Democratic National Convention in downtown Chicago. We can judge those events through the lens of history now, but our priority at the time was sailing.

I've always been a recreational sailor, with an occasional race here and there. Our bright orange "Jabberwock" has been repaired and restored countless times over the years. Built by Hoernke in Milwaukee in 1956, she is about to hit the water for her 51st season.

We sail on Lake DuBay, a large windy basin on the Wisconsin River between Wausau and Stevens Point, and belong to the Lake DuBay Sailing Association. There are nearly forty of us with a dog's breakfast of vessels from scows to Flying Scots to small keel boats. We are the only Lightning.

Still, our woody turns heads when we've got her flat and flyin'. "Beautiful lines," they say. "Yup," we answer. "Beautiful."

Richard Guinan

I was Class President in 1985 and Treasurer for a few years prior. I was a member of the Texas District, Fleet 435, and sailed out of Rush Creek Yacht Club, east of Dallas. I was active in the Class from about 1969, first as a crew, and as a skipper from about 1973 until 1993 when I moved to Charlotte, North Carolina. I sold my boat when I left Dallas and have limited my sailing to other folks' boats on the North Carolina coast, where we have a second home on Bald Head Island.

For most of my sailing years, one or more of my three children and wife crewed for me and friends in our Fleet. The sailing and long haul trips to the NAs and other regattas were some of the best shared experiences of our family. We saw the country coast to coast and top to bottom and had great times with our Lightning friends everywhere we went. We still laugh at our adventures driving and towing the boat from Dallas to Seattle, including a side trip to the Timberline Lodge at Mount Hood—just to go where no Lightning had gone before. In short, sailing Lightnings for about twenty-four years is one the most positive stories in my life. Thanks to the International Lightning Class Association for continuing to make the experience of organized Lightning sailing possible.

LIFE MEMBERS

Eugene H. Walet III

I started sailing in 1941 at the age of six in a dinghy which I put a sail on and made it into somewhat of a Pram. I would sail around the harbor in Pass Christian, Mississippi, and New Orleans, Louisiana, thumping over many times while teaching myself to sail. There were no structured sailing lessons being given during my youth in my area of the country. Therefore, I spent many hours alone in my boat learning the ropes. In 1945 I moved up to a Snipe, which is 15½ feet, and sailed in a knock-about class at Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans.

As a youngster I had that competitive spirit and wanted to get into a topnotch racing class with a spinnaker. I talked my father into buying me my first Lightning, *Spirit I*, #3647, which was built by Williams Boat Works in New Orleans in the summer of 1949. I invited Pudgy McClure to crew for me on my Lightning to handle the spinnaker. He told me he had no idea what a spinnaker was and didn't know that much about sailing. I convinced him that one day I wanted to sail in the Olympics and together we could learn how to use the spinnaker. Needless to say, he became my good friend and long-time spinnaker man who, with my father, enabled me to win many races around the world. Pudgy and Claude Kohler crewed for me in the 1960 Olympics in Naples, Italy, where we sailed in the Dragon Class and finished seventh.

I chose the Lightning because it was a very competitive class at Southern Yacht Club with fifteen to eighteen boats racing throughout the year. Southern Yacht Club Fleet, #62, was one of the early fleets in the country. I was competing against such notable sailors as Cliff Prados, former President and Chief Measurer of the Lightning Class, Ed Overton and Ross Allen. I was competing against many seasoned Lightning sailors and getting beat time after time until I went to the President's Cup in 1951 in Toledo, Ohio. I finished third behind such notables as Howard Folt and Carl Smither. I was sailing a boat that weighed about 950 pounds of solid mahogany. That was when I first learned about the light weight boats, such as the Lippincott at 700 pounds.

That winter I convinced my father to buy a new Lippincott, #5082, which was delivered the last weekend of May, 1952 in Riverton, New Jersey. I named her Spirit II. That year we finished second in the International Championship at Spray Beach, New Jersey. In 1953 we finished third in the International Championship at Buffalo Canoe Club and tied with Doc Murphy for the Mid-Winter Championship at St. Petersburg. In 1954 we finished third in the International Championship at Crescent Sail Yacht Club in Detroit. In 1955 I won the Pan American Championship in Buenos Aires, Argentina, with Danny Killeen, Sr. and Carlos Eccheveria crewing for me. Danny was a Lightning skipper on #1033, and I met Carlos in Toledo in 1951 when he was crewing for Johnny Teigland, Jr., who won the Internationals. Also, in 1955 I was fifth in the International Championship at Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans. In 1956 I was second in the International Championship at Buffalo Canoe Club. After that I was referred to as the bridesmaid since I had never won the International Championship. In 1958 I was first in the Midwinter Championship at St. Pete with Helen and Jay Limbaugh as my crew. At this time Helen and Jay had bought Spirit II, #5082, from me, and I chartered it from them for the Mid-Winters since I was in the Air Force and not sailing actively.

In 1953, after competing in twenty-four races in various parts of the southeast, I won the right to represent Area D in the Mallory Cup, symbolic of the North American Men's Sailing Championship. The skipper had to be eighteen years old to sail in the finals, and I made that by twenty-one days. This was the first time a club from the South was invited to sail in the Mallory Cup. We sailed International One Design 33' sloops out of Larchmont Yacht Club. I had never sailed anything bigger than a 28 foot Sound Interclub. After arriving at Larchmont, Arthur Knapp who wrote the book "RACE YOUR BOATRIGHT' took me under his wing and invited me to crew for him on an International One-Design sloop. Between Arthur Knapp's hands on coaching that one day and reading his book in one night, I was able to win the Mallory Cup with my father, Eugene H. Walet, Jr., Ralph Christman and Jackie Ryan crewing for me. Ralph and Jackie were Lightning skippers from Southern Yacht Club. The fact that I had won the North American Men's Sailing Championship at the age of eighteen and beating all of the greatest skippers in the country who were at least twenty years my senior made headline news from New York to New Orleans. We were honored by the City of New Orleans with a ticker tape parade with all the trimmings.

In 1954 the Mallory Cup was sailed in Lightnings at Southern Yacht Club in New Orleans. I had to qualify through the same lengthy series of races to get to the finals. I thought this might be an easy series in my home waters in Lightnings, but it turned out to be a Who's Who of Lightning champion skippers in the finals, namely Carl Smither from Buffalo, Walt Swindeman from Toledo, Hank Cawthra from Detroit. Out of the eight skippers, four of them were Lightning Champions. Tough series, but I won again. No small feat with the competition I had. In 1955 I again went through the rigorous series of races to gain the right to represent Area D in Detroit sailing Luder L-16s and finished second, losing the championship by one point. After that, my father told me I had had enough fun and it was time to settle down and go to work.

In 1956 I represented the United States in the Olympics in Melbourne, Australia, in the Dragon Class with my father, Eugene H. Walet, Jr., Danny Killeen, Jr. and Carlos Eccheveria crewing for me, finishing fifth.

In 1969 I started sailing and racing offshore boats. I either skippered my own boat or crewed with friends in fifteen Southern Ocean Racing Circuits and several Key West Race Weeks. I skippered my own 68' Nelson Merek sled SAGA in three SORCs and three Key West Race Weeks.

In 2001 there seemed to be some interest around Pass Christian Yacht Club for rejuvenating the Lightning Class. I bought #10812 from Dr. Larry Frost, Buddy & Bo Clarke bought Buck Ballatin's #9696 and restored it. Eric Aschaffenberg, who was a big boat sailor, bought #13931, Guy Brierre bought #14129, and Whitner Church bought #11311. We were all excited about the Fleet getting back to racing. We had a very colorful Fleet with red, turquoise, black, green and white hulls. We had a lot of good races and a lot of fun as a Class until August 29, 2005. Unfortunately Katrina took all of our homes and most all of our boats. My Lightning was strapped to the trailer and tied to the pilings under my home. When we got back to our property three weeks later, the trailer was still tied up, and the straps were still secure, but there was no sign of Spirit, #14620.

In 2006 I bought #14355, thinking there might be some interest in the Lightning Class between Fairhope and Mobile, Alabma. I sold #14355 to my crew, Pete Furze in Pass Christian. There isn't much in the way of racing there right now, as most people are trying to put their lives back together and building their homes when and where possible. Hopefully, one day we will all be back in Pass Christian, and the Lightnings will once again be active.

Meanwhile my wife, Patsy, and I are living in Fairhope, Alabama, but we already have our house plans drawn when the time comes that we can go back to The Pass. The Lightning Class has meant so much to me in the fifty-eight years I have been sailing off and on in the Class. I have had a total of ten Lightnings, and all were named Spirit. The many friends I have made and enjoyed being with and sailing against include Jay and Helen Limbaugh, Tom and Ann Allen, George and Greg Fisher and others too numerous to mention. There have been many parties we all enjoyed at the St. Pete Yacht Club. I remember the Nationals which were held at Southern Yacht Club in 1996. I had my 50' wooden lugger as a spectator boat, and after one of the races, we towed around sixty-two Lightnings in two rows behind Alligator. At least that's the number my wife Patsy counted that day. That was a sight to see.

I have so many fond memories of being in the Lightning Class. I did have all of the Lightning Year Books from 1947 through 2004 until Katrina. I spent many hours going through those old year books and reminiscing about the good old days. I had hoped to be in St. Pete for the Mid-Winters this year, but we have a conflict and won't be able to make it. Don't count me out as a Lightning skipper, as I am only seventy-one years young and still wanting to compete. I hope to have another one in the not too distant future.

The ILCA Fund was established in 1982 as a way to guarantee the long-range operations of our Class. The goal is to secure funding equivalent to two-years of the operating costs so that the Class can remain solvent during hard times. Enjoy the 2007 Yearbook!! Here is a Brief Look at the '47, '57, '67, '77, '87 and '97 ILCA Yearbooks

From the 1947 Yearbook, an excerpt of "Just for Laughs" by Walter H. Phillips, on The 1946 Internationals at Skaneateles Yacht Club

Friday was the big wind. On the first lap, none of the first five boats used their spinnakers. We were the 6th, with George Barnes right on our tail. He rounded the mark and up went "Junior" (which is the name we soon adopted for the spinnaker). Should we chance it? His was going all right; in fact, he was going right by us.

"Up spinnaker." This was it! The next ten minutes of my life were tough. "Junior" would not stay full, and when he was full, Johnny, the sheet man, was nearly out of the boat. We soon realized our mistake, but how to get it down was another question. Barnes and crew, by beautiful work, had established quite a lead on us. The sail went down but not without difficulty. We learned later that he had taken on six inches of water. With the defending Champ bogged down, what would happen to us?

We were nearly at the mark, and "Junior" was still slatting around like mad. I went forward to pull it in-no luck, it wouldn't come down. We had our difficulties too and almost duplicated Barnes' near catastrophe. Suddenly, as if be magic, "Junior" collapsed in my arms. I think we violated about every rule in the handbooks about dousing spinnakers. Frankly, I'm still amazed at how it happened. We were lucky. That was no place for a bunch of kids to be playing with all that sail. I must have had a feeling that things were going too smoothly. In my mad rush for the cockpit, my foot hit the main halyard belaying pin. As if to add to our difficulties, it broke, sending our mainsail down in a shower. Our hearts sank completely. Actually, it wasn't too bad, but none of us seemed to realize that it could be easily remedied. As for myself, I saw weeks of preparation availing nothing. But we soon rigged it to a jury cleat and sailed merrily (?) on. I shall never know how all this happened in such a short time. When we started to take in the spinnaker, we were already dangerously close to over-running the mark. Everything is slightly vague but we must have worked fast. I do know that once settled down on the second lap, my throat was parched. In times like those I realized the veracity of the saying, "Water, water everywhere, but not a drop to drink!"

From the 1957 Yearbook, an excerpt of "Bill Cox Wins" by Wayne Brockett, on The 1956 Internationals at Buffalo Canoe Club

A hair-raising start and they are off. Tom Allen is first at the windward mark. In second spot yacht 6494, and third, Yankee Doodle, closely

followed by Karl Smither in THERMIS 3 Ms. The course is a long thin triangle running out into the lake a good two miles. It is landlocked and smoother at its base and blowing and rolling at its apex. Spinnakers pop at the mark, and Tom Allen's is lipstick red. Tom gradually pulls ahead, and Cox finds himself blanketed. Walet at this time is in tenth place. The sky is deep azure, and the clouds are breaking up and scattering. It is climbing toward high noon. Fallon is about fifth, and the boats out near the mark are making heavy weather of it. As they again start to weather, Point Abino Lighthouse shining white in the sun looks like a child's toy. The crews are soaked. Cox is two boat lengths behind Allen, and suddenly he is ahead. He keeps Allen covered and finishes first, with Allen right on his tail. The wind is now dying fast, and it is getting hot. Much yelling from the spectator boats. It now stacks up, with Cox leading, followed by Allen, with Karl Smither in third spot. Fourth is Tom Fallon and Fifth Gene Walet. We all have lunch and loganberry punch.

In the delightful world of Peanuts, Linus says, "You know, I learned something today, Charlie Brown. Never jump into a pile of leaves with a wet sucker."

My name is Snoopier, Lightning #10100, and as I pulled in the Buffalo Canoe Club measuring stall, I felt exactly like that wet sucker. Things were sticking to me all over, only they weren't leaves. Instead there were measuring tapes for my spar, a large scale to tell my weight, magnets to determine what metal my centerboard was made of, and even a geigercounter-type device to check my bottom for imbedded "impurities."

Along with well over one hundred other entries, I made it through the "pile of leaves" and proceeded to the lovely sand beach in front of the Canoe Club. As usual, there was to be one major technological discovery in the design of the boats or sails that causes raised eyebrows and an eventual ruling by the measurement committee. This year it was the light centerboard, heavy bedlog, low moment of inertia boat brought in by some of the better class "thinkers" that caused the furor. After much debate, the issue was solved, and these boats joined us on that lovely beach.

None of the boats were invited to the huge cocktail party at the Teaches, next door to the Club. However, not very many skippers, crews and friends missed it. The party was held the night before the qualifying races on a perfect summer evening. Everyone was having such a good time that the stories could be heard by us boats clear out on that long Canoe Club dock.

From the 1977 Yearbook, an excerpt of "The Other Side of the North Americans (From Way Down)" by Jack Burwell on The 1976 NAs at Sheboygan Yacht Club

We are sure that if you have read this far, you have read the title of his article and are well aware that you will not learn anything about how to make a Lightning go faster. The idea behind this article is to be able to relay more about what happens at major regattas, such as the North Americans, to some of those people who are not fortunate enough to have come home with the "silverware." While we did not come home with the silverware, we feel very fortunate to have been participants in the North American Championships and to enjoy the festivities which take place at this regatta.



At the time, I was content to be the State of Maine Champion and had never ventured out of the state to compete. Therefore, I'd not attracted anyone to come into the state to compete. It was plain to see that if you wanted to win in your own waters, don't attract outsiders. For about the first three minutes of Stu's talk, I was a little dismayed to learn that he was not going to discuss sail shape, tactics, or how to get the most out of your crew to win races. The thing he emphasized was to get involved with this great bunch of people who sail Lightnings. He went on to say that among all of the people he had met, Lightning sailors were the most enjoyable. After listening to this great guy talk about what he enjoyed so much, it was apparent to my wife, Marilyn, and myself that we should start trailing our boat to other regattas. After meeting many of the very nice people in the Lightning Class, it did not take us long to get into the swing of things (although we have vet to win or even place in a major regatta, our children think it's great when we show up at home)! So, due to Stu Anderson, we did get involved, and we did almost everything he suggested except win. Therefore, if you are a serious competitive sailor, you may as well go along to the next article.

From the 1987 Yearbook, "Wanted: The Perfect Crew"

The perfect crew can have no name, for he or she must be able to respond to any grunt or barely audible sound the skipper barks and recognize it as his or her name. He or she must have ears as sensitive as a radar detector to be able to understand commands given when the skipper is facing the stern. And the crew must only speak when spoken to, or screamed at, whichever the case may be.

In appearance, the perfect crew must have two legs, with sticky feet like a fly's, and four arms to hold a jib sheet, a centerboard pennant and untangle the spinnaker sheet at the same time. "Perfect" must also have 360-degree, X-ray vision like Superman to see through sails, masts, and the skipper's head. Perfect can weigh as much as seventy-five pounds extra in heavy air, but must be able to miraculously lose the seventy-five pounds if the winds die. Another must is being clairvoyant and telekineticthat way Perfect will never be caught in the bottom of the boat saying, "You never said tack!"

Lastly, Perfect must be humble. After a day of verbal and physical abuse, with the boat maybe coming in second, the next day in the newspaper Perfect's name becomes, "...and crew."



Maybe it's the Fleet grandfather who lends his boat out every week, or the couple who kept the Fleet active when everyone else was busy having kids. The support crew who cooks barbecue after every Fleet race, or the folks doing Race Committee even when it's snowing out."

The response was fantastic. These people are the heart and soul of the Lightning Class. They are the role models we want to emulate. They are generous, quiet, givers that attract others to our sport and make us proud to participate in it.

<u>Chris Graf</u>

Chris Graf bought his first Lightning in 1963. It was a Newport, and she was the first fiberglass Lightning in Sheboygan. Chris was a novice racer but was quick to jump into the fray. Ric Larson (age 16 at the time) recalls one of Chris' first races. "We were on a spinnaker reach heading south towards the bottles when I tried to pass Chris to windward. Chris' crew told him to luff us, he headed up, and we proceeded to capsize."

Chris is a retired urologist and current art dealer specializing in large outdoor sculptures. He chose the Lightning because it was a boat he could sail with his family. For many years he sailed with his late wife Janet and their four children. He says, "I never yelled too much because I figured my marriage was more important than winning any race." Together the family participated in six NAs and several other big events.


His claim to fame doesn't involve sailing. He recalls, "I did prostate surgery on a man who served with General Custer." His proudest moment was in the mid 60s when he sold his Newport because it was too slow, bought a new Allen, and won the Sheboygan Yacht Club season championship. His current ambition is to stick around long enough to get a free season's pass to ski at Alta.

Over the years he has been an important part of the local fleet. He organized the

paving of the dry sail lot at Sheboygan Yacht Club and hosted many of the famous Saturday night parties at the Brotz regatta. More recently the fleet participation has decreased, and there is no regular race committee. Chris stepped up, ran races every Tuesday night during the summer months and was responsible for training our current race committee. The average turnout of five boats rose to a high of sixteen in just two seasons. Thanks to Chris the Sheboygan Lighting fleet is on the rise. Building on that momentum, Chris' son Hans organized the 2005 NAs which was hosted by Sheboygan Yacht Club.

In the picture Chris is standing next to a sculpture titled All in one Boat. This is appropriate since Chris thinks that the class' greatest strength is its members. What could be better than sailing with your friends and family?





<u>Dr. Sylvan Newman</u>

Sylvan started sailing Lightnings on White Rock Lake in Dallas in the late 50s. After learning to sail on a Star in San Diego during WWII, he returned to Dallas to find a Lightning Fleet with great people. A past District Champion and Corinthian Sailing Club Commodore, the Summer Series trophy is named in his honor, and he was also honored by the CYC last year with the "Old Salts Award." Now in his eighties, he still sails weekend races.

Claim to Fame—Sylvan was the Fleet and District engine for over fifty years. Starting Fleet 435 at Rush Creek Yacht Club, he was a mover and shaker in the growth of Lightning sailing in Texas during the 70s and 80s.

Proudest Moment—Winning the 1983 Masters NAs as a crew for Stu Anderson and helping to host the 1979 Worlds and the 1983 NAs at Rush Creek Yacht Club...also, being married for almost 50 years!

Funniest Moment—"Once, one of our Fleet members installed a new bailer in his boat. During a windy and wet race, he opened the bailer on a fast reach, only to discover that he had installed it backwards. Well, you should have seen the rooster tail of water shooting over the transom!"

The Fans Say—After finishing last in the 2006 Leukemia Cup Regatta, Doc pulled me aside to teach me a very important lesson. "Stick with the fleet," he said. "Sailing off on your own rarely pays off," says John Womble, a new sailor. "Dr. Newman was right, and my finishes have improved ever since."

Vern Goldberg, also an active octogenarian in the Fleet who has know Sylvan for way too long laughingly said, "He is a stickler for detail in everything he does, except he usually shows up late."



ILCA LOCAL LEGENDS

Dean S. Cady, Sr.

Dean hails from Milwaukee Yacht Club, Fleet 69, though he began his sailing on Higgins Lake, Michigan, in the mid 1940s. Although he crewed on offshore boats, including several Chicago-Mackinac races, since his first sailing days his heart has always been with the Lightning. This love affair started in the summer of 1952 and continues to this day.

Martha Pfarr Cushman asked Dean his thoughts on the Corinthian Spirit. Dean responded, "The Corinthian spirit is the concept of playing by the rules. In other words, it is not how you win but how you sail the race. This spirit applies to both the Corinthian sailor (amateur) as well as the professional sailor. Having been involved with various sports before competitive sailing played an active role in my life, the principles of fair play and abiding by the rules was instilled in me. Of course, sailboat racing is unique in that it is a self-policing sport except when the sailing instructions provide otherwise. As a competitive racing sailor for over fifty years, I have always tried my best to abide by these principles, although I'm sure there were times when I could have done a better job. During my most active racing years, I did a minimal amount of judging, although it was excellent training in the fundamentals of the rules and their application in various situations. Having served as a US SAILING certified judge and a International Sailing Federation international judge for many years, I have become even more acutely aware of the importance of practicing the Corinthian spirit."

Claim to Fame—Dean is a Past Vice President of the United States Yacht Racing Union and a current US SAILING International Judge. He has served the Lightning family in various capacities at the Fleet, Midwest District and national levels. As the Class Vice President of Rules and Regulations, his expertise is called upon continuously for the review of Sailing Instructions for sanctioned events and interpretations of Class Rules.

His fans say—From Martha Pfarr Cushman, "Dean Cady is an incredible asset to any sailor. No matter where I'm sailing, he takes the time to listen to my rules question and give a reasoned opinion. He'll explain his interpretation of the rule and give valuable information on the reason the rule exists. He still gets on a Lightning pretty regularly so he can identify with what the sailor is going through, and that's invaluable. You've heard of the term 'player's manager'? Well, Dean is a 'sailor's judge'. Over the years, I can't think of anyone who has been more supportive of my sailing", says ILCA Past President Bill Faude.

Memorable moments—Being able to sail with my family all these years has to be at the top of the list. After that, it would have to be being involved, both as a sailor and judge, although not at the same time, in various Lightning North American Championships, and as a judge at a couple of Lightning World Championships.



William S. Clarke

Bill Clarke calls his home port Barnegat Light Yacht Club on Barnegat Bay, New Jersey. He has been the Fleet 335 Secretary for many decades, as well as Commodore of both Barnegat Light Yacht Club and Long Beach Island Yacht Racing Association. He first started sailing "long, long ago" at BLYC in the Sunday Sunfish Champagne Series.

Claim to Fame—As the chief cheerleader of Fleet 335, he has been instrumental in building Fleet 335 to the level it is today. He has done this by involving all of the juniors in the late 70s and 80s as crew for him at one time or another. Most of those juniors remain active in the Fleet today, with a number being boat owners themselves.

Proudest Moment—Bill's proudest moment was probably becoming a grandfather, but that has nothing to do with this. Bill was awarded US SAILING's W. Van Alan Clark, Jr. National Sportsmanship Award. In 2005, Barnegat Light Yacht Club awarded Bill with a Lifetime Membership for his leadership and involvement in the Club's sailing program, Board and general Club activities over thirty-five years.



On how to improve the Class—Bill suggests, "Why don't the individual Districts locate Yacht Clubs within their District that have a history of Lightning sailing and a couple of little-used Lightnings and suggest to the Yacht Club that the District schedule, staff, equip, pay for and conduct an invitational regatta at the Club. It only needs to be a simple one day thing, not a District Championship or anything like that. This would get Lightnings right in the face of persons who may be likely participants. It may be fun to participate in those regattas and may stimulate that Club—ie., light the match, etc. The District should also invite any other club that is looking for a class of sailboats to sail. If that could be done once a year or every other year at a different shadow fleet, it might be helpful. If the Yacht Club would host a party in the evening, that would be great.

I see the fleet growth issue as a matter that needs to be stimulated at the District level with the encouragement and support from the National level. I see it as a long-term process and one that needs particular (but not exclusive) focus on young sailors."





<u>Santiago Romero</u>

Santiago wasn't raised by a sailing family. Instead, he married one! His wife Maria has always loved the sport. She inherited this from her father Eduardo, a retired Lightning sailor who devoted his life to the organization of regattas and to the promotion of the sport of sailing in general. Santiago got the love of the sport—from his Father in Law!

He's the kind of guy who will buy a new boat just because he can sell his old one and have one more team on the starting line. I can count five boats, four active in the Salinas Yacht Club boat yard today that have arrived through this process. Problem is, it's getting difficult to sell them because he's fond of unorthodox colors! His most recent sailing machine is a purple and pink mixture. It's fast! Well, one gets used to it.

I bet the best-attended regatta in our calendar must be the Copa Santiago Romero, which he celebrates on his birthday— Halloween day! It is undoubtedly a very special date in which he throws unbelievable parties that demonstrate so well why the Lightning Class is so special. You may ask around about last year's costumes (see South American Championships photos). With Santiago's birthday there is always something special to remember. And then there's the t-shirts! Each year he plans to design a special

t-shirt for his regatta. Last year's edition featured a caricature of each of the sailors printed in the front and personalized, and a group caricature in the back. That is how much care and love he puts into his extended family, the Lightning Class.

And there's the support. He's donated two motor boats to the Salinas Yacht Club to be used for regatta organizing. His own powerboat is always ready and available if it is needed for RC chores or taking people out to watch the races. He himself has devoted almost twenty years to the Salinas Yacht Club, his home club, in which he served in many chairs until becoming the Commodore, from where he gave a tremendous support to the sport of sailing in general, and to the Lightning Class in particular.

Bob Stoller



Bob helped to charter Fleet 488 in the early 80s and has been involved with Lightnings and sailing in the Rocky Mountain area ever since. Bob has been the Lightning Fleet Captain many times and has served as Commodore of Denver Sailing Association. He has been helping other sailors to get into Lightnings by locating boats to purchase, bringing Lightnings to Colorado and assisting in repair and rigging.

How he started—I grew up in Hampton, Virginia, a few houses from Hampton Roads. I learned to sail on a Snipe and would help caulk the boat every spring, launch the boat, and let it swell so that it would be watertight. When I graduated from high school in 1959, my parents moved to Bethesda, Maryland, and as I walked around the block, I saw a woman wetsanding the bottom of a sailboat. She said it was a Lightning and asked if I would like to crew that summer. Bob and Marjorie Ware owned the boat and raced it out of the Washington Sailing Marina on the Potomac. I crewed for them and learned to sail on the Lightning and also attended the Districts at Annapolis that summer. When I moved to Colorado in 1970, I thought I had given up sailing. However, I discovered a racing program on Boulder Reservoir and rented boats for a while. Then, I found a Lightning for sale in Denver (#4865) and bought it. The boat was originally purchased by George Fisher and had been his first Lightning.

Our Home Fleet, Fleet 488, started without a permanent base and met regularly to race at open regattas around Colorado and Nebraska. I am the only Fleet 488 founding member who still owns and races a Lightning. An early highlight was the Kingston, Ontario, NAs in 1986, where I chartered a boat from Jim Carson. After that the Fleet declined until it started to sail regularly at Cherry Creek. The Marina agreed to allow on-site storage of boats with their masts up, and the Fleet began to grow again. Now, with the parking area and the crane, the Fleet has an active weekly racing program from April to October. Marty Mulhern is an unsung hero for his devotion to the Class and his work on securing a Lightning for the Community Sailing program and getting it race ready.

Proudest Moments—The overnight repair of a fellow Lightning owner's rudder so that he could race the next day; repair of my own mast after I broke the upper section while driving through a ditch near Reudi Reservoir (Aspen, Colorado). I discovered the problem on Saturday morning and scrounged up an old mast and repaired it in the rain and was sailing on Sunday; correcting my mast tune at the Sheboygan NAs and getting a fourth in a qualifying race!

Other Moments—The funniest moment was pleasure sailing the woody (#4865) on Boulder Reservoir with Irene, my wife, and Bear, our Old English sheepdog. Bear was standing on the rear deck of the boat and did not understand that we were moving over water. The dog jumped down to discover that it was not a solid surface and she was swimming! The expression on her face was priceless! The scariest moment was at the California Circuit while sailing the Marathon from Coronado to Mission Bay. We were flying the spinnaker, the swells were rolling in from the west and the tide was ebbing. The swells in the mouth of the channel were fifteen feet high, and I thought that we might bury the bow.

The Fans Say—From Steve Davis, ILCA President, "Bob was the first Lightning sailor to take me out on a Lightning. Bob sailed with me the first time I went to an out-of-state Lightning regatta. Bob is always ready to repair anything on a sailboat and is super fast in light air!" From Jan Davis, ILCA Secretary, "Bob is one of those rare sailors that is verbal; he can kindly and calmly explain to his crew exactly what he needs done in comprehensible English. (We all know of skippers, who shall remain nameless, that have no skill in this area)."

Here is Bill Cabrall's input about Bob Stoller: "I first met Bob in the early 80s when I was racing Stars. At regattas I kept encountering this beautiful wooden Lightning on the ramp or in the parking lot. I remember vividly walking taking a real good look at Bob's boat at Carter Lake one year and thinking, 'Wow, this is a beautiful boat, I've got to get one of these!' But the Star fleet saw what was going on, rallied for a quick intervention, and it was another ten years before I saw the light and gave up on running backstays."

From Mary Anne Byrne: "Bob Stoller gave me a chance to crew before I knew a sheet from a guy. Consequently, he put be on the jib. At the time my greatest skill was enthusiasm and my second best was reliability. With the patience of an paternalistic college professor, he taught me how to trim a Lightning jib, set the pole, and generally rig and ready the boat. I crewed for Bob in back-to-

back North Americans, an experience I never thought possible for me.

Bob knows where every Lightning and every lightning part is within a thousand miles of Denver, a quality that has stood me in very good stead. At the Aspen Open (yes, Aspen has a Yacht Club!) in 2000, Bob arrived with a bent mast, courtesy of a traffic situation on the drive up. For most people, deep in the Colorado rockies at 8000 feet in elevation, a bent mast would be a show stopper, but not Bob. He unhitched the boat, told us he'd be back, and took off into the high country. Two hours later he was back with a second mast (also broke, but in a different place) that he happened to know had been lying in a field in Basalt.

Sailing Stars had taught me how to splice masts (and the Lightning's long untapered section makes this process fairly simple), so I pitched in and before the day was done we had a new, spliced mast up and running on his boat. Even better, when we stopped for dinner, the only available seat on the Yacht Club deck was across from the prettiest blue eyes and the brightest smile I've ever met. Seven years later I still see them every day. You can too when Raeyane Farrell and I travel east to a regatta near your home club. Thanks Bob!!

Corinthian Sailing—I think it took a while for me to learn to sail for the pure joy of racing Lightnings and the teamwork that it involves. The interaction with my crew, rather than winning at all costs, made it enjoyable. It has become very important to me to help my fellow Lightning sailors be more successful in their own sailing so that the quality of the racing improves. I would like to be known as a Lightning sailor who will always help when help is needed and who has been committed to Lightning sailing.



ILCA LOCAL LEGENDS



Jim has been a member of Fleet 50 since 1959, and over the years he has made huge contributions to the Fleet and to the Lightning Class. Jim was a Virginia State Delegate for thirty-two years. During his tenure, he served on the Appropriations Committee for sixteen years and was Chairman of the Conservation and Natural Resources subcommittee of that Committee. In that capacity he was instrumental in the creation of Leesylvania State Park in 1992, the site of the annual Doc Gilbert Memorial Potomac Cup Regatta and this year the site of the Women's, Juniors,' and Masters' North American Championship. When the park was created, he made sure it was sailboat friendly, with two hoists in addition to the ramps used by bass boaters.

Jim is a Virginian to the core. He loves its history and its water. He was born and raised in Williamsburg, capital of the state in the colonial era. He has worked tirelessly on this year's celebration of the 400th year since the establishment of the Jamestown colony. He was even an extra in the movie, New World, the movie about Jamestown and Pocahontas.

Claim To Fame—On every Labor Day weekend since 1963, with one or two exceptions, Jim has led a flotilla of two to four Lightnings in the exploration of one of the Bay's waterways. Before heading out, the boats are outfitted with a small outboard motor and VHF Radio and are loaded up with coolers, tents, and sleeping bags. Last year, the group sailed up the North River off of Mobjack Bay.

Jim's skill as a politician comes to the forefront at about 4:00 or 5:00 o'clock on each day of the expedition. He looks for a house on the river with a pier and ideally a sailboat nearby and even more ideally with a gazebo or screened in porch. He then goes ashore and knocks on the door and asks the landowner for permission for the explorers to lay out their sleeping bags on the pier or to pitch their tents on grass. The landowner has always agreed, but before the evening is done, the landowner has usually invited the hearty bunch inside the screened porch or to another more protected area. Jim is always able to talk to the landowners about a local matter that is important to them and that involves the state government.

More Claim To Fame—While Jim buys brand new Lightnings from time to time, he also subscribes to the value of keeping old Lightnings alive— value he and others in the fleet probably inherited from Doc Gilbert, another Fleet legend. What happened on one of his Labor Day cruises illustrates this. It started with one of the expedition's Lightnings suffering a broken rudder. What were they to do? First, one of the explorers on that trip, Chuck, who is a veterinarian, became very popular with the local landowner when he befriended her dog and gave it a once over. Second, they fortuitously found an abandoned woodshop on the property that had a functioning band saw. Third, they scrounged up some plywood, roofing nails, strap iron, and 1/4" bolts. They cut the plywood to the shape of a Lightning rudder and used the strap iron and bolts to create pintles. A 2" X 4" was trimmed down to create the tiller. Jim still has this very functional rudder.

Even More Claim to Fame—Jim is famous for his fundamental belief in free beer at sailboat regattas. Each year, since its inception twenty-three years ago, the Potomac Cup Regatta has had a beer sponsor. Those sponsors not only provided several kegs of beer and several cases of soda, but also often subsidized the regatta T-shirt.

Proudest Moments—There is an easy way to recognize Jim. He is skipper of the dark green Lightnings. His latest boat, 15311, is again dark green. The previous one, 14627, No More Excuses, was dark green. The previous one, No Excuses, was dark green. I believe he has owned seven dark green Lightnings in all. The first one, 6428, was a wooden Saybrook Lightning built in Connecticut.

In 1966 Jim took a short hiatus from Fleet 50. He was offered a job in Atlanta. However, he told his prospective employer that he would only take the job if he could find a place to race his Lightning. That he did. He found one Lightning, #180, on Lake Lanier. He told the owner that he'd double the size of their fleet. Three years later, when Jim returned to northern Virginia, the fleet at Lake Lanier had grown to eighteen boats! Jim established a dealership for the Newport built Lightning, which was based Glouster, Virginia. Every time Jim made a trip back north, he would swing by the builder and pick up another Lightning, either new or used, take it back to Georgia, and find a buyer. That's one way to build a fleet!

<u>Ken Irwin</u>

Ken began sailing on a Lightning at Hoover Yacht Club in Columbus, Ohio, around 1960. A member of Fleet 303 at Cowan Lake, he fell in love with the boat after his first crewing experience and in 1970 purchased Jay Limbaugh's trade-in.

Claim to Fame—Although no longer does the regatta circuit, hardly ever misses a club race.

Proudest Moment—The opportunity to introduce others to the Lightning boat.

The Fans Say—From Mike Brock, "There are not enough words to describe what 'Master Mariner' Ken means to the local fleet and club. Ken's dedication and service to Lightning sailing and to the club is the one thing that has remained constant over the past four plus decades. Ken is the only club member to be recognized for his relentless service and was awarded the title Master Mariner in addition to being a recipient of the Marcotte, a yearly Cowan Lake service award. He has served in numerous capacities including Lightning fleet captain for several years, club Commodore (1986), chairperson of several committees, board of governors and is our current webmaster and scorekeeper. Ken remains the "go to" guy when something needs to be fixed at the club or on race boats. He is a source of a wealth of knowledge and history. While Ken no longer travels the regatta circuit, you can always count on him to represent the Lightning fleet for Sunday club racing in Adrenalin, #14216.

We keep asking ourselves what would we ever do without Ken!

Frank Gallagher

Frank has been with Fleet 50 since 1966, and his personality is reflected in the history and character of the Fleet. He started sailing Lightnings with the Sea Scouts, then went off to college but came back and has won the Fleet Championship many, many times. The Washington DC area sees quite a few people coming and going, and so there are quite a few people who have sailed here for a few years before moving on. Their memories of sailing here might be vague, but they generally remember Frank. He is not a vague character. Frank is a Fleet 50 legend who focuses on what is important to keep the sport of racing Lightnings alive and well and whose generosity and friendship are enjoyed by everyone in the fleet.

Frank is a seat-of-the-pants sailor. Rig tuning—he has no idea. However, his boat always has a few special features, like the shock chord on his tiller so that he can hold it in place as he goes forward to gybe the pole as he single-hands on a Wednesday evening. Frank does well not by being very knowledgeable or technical, but by pointing his boat in the right direction and keeping it moving regardless of the many distractions on and off the boat.

Claim to Fame—Frank is famous for making sure there are as many boats on the line as possible, even if it means dragging an unsuspecting passerby onto the boat. The same applies to staffing the Race Committee. Frank hates to see a boat not sail because the skipper and crew are doing race committee. He'll do everything he can do get non-sailors to volunteer and, if the conditions are light, to release the skipper and crew to race. Frank will do anything he can to help a new sailor learn to sail faster and smarter, but on the racecourse he'll do everything he can to win. Frank himself has an amazing ability to do well with the most green of crew. He is famous for putting his green crew through twenty or more gybes on the way to the starting area.


More Claim to Fame—Frank keeps many an old Lightning sailing and racing. He buys Lightnings that are almost or about to be abandoned, gets them ready to go sailing at minimal expense, and then finds a newcomer who isn't sure they can spend very much to get into the sport. Then he makes sure they don't waste time and money working on their new old Lightning, but instead go sailing. For example, a few years ago, Frank took an old Lightning that was given to him and turned it into a Fleet builder boat. He sold the boat to Paul Maher, a young skipper, for only \$500, under the condition that when Paul sold it, he had to sell it within the fleet and for no more than \$500 plus one-half of what he had invested in it himself.

Even More Claim To Fame—Frank always has something to offer you from his trunk or cooler after you've buttoned up your boat. Recently, it has been Miller Lite—he is watching his weight. But a couple of years ago, it was a miracle punch! I know it involves rum and something.

The Fans Say—"How did I get started with Fleet 50? It was all Frank Gallagher's doing. Having wandered down to WSM on a Sunday morning in 1999 just to see what was there and standing around amazed at all the activity, I was cornered by Frank and asked, "Can you sail today?" Not able to come up with a good reason for saying no, I was invited to hop onto Jim Dillard's boat as crew. The rest is history." *David Thompson, current Fleet Captain*

<u>Jim McDonnell</u>

Also known as "Mr. Lightning" around Fleet 19 at Chautauqua Lake Yacht Club, Jim started sailing in 1942 and first sailed a Lightning in 1968. He learned the fundamentals of sailing on a Thistle in Boston. Jim loves the Lightning because it is a family boat, and he sailed with all of his children through the years. Jim proudly shared that his son in college was voted captain of his fleet—like father like son.

Claim to Fame—Jim has not been one to accept accolades for his tireless efforts on behalf of the Lightning Fleet and his Yacht Club. He is always willing to work on any regatta and is never concerned about who shall get the credit. His moment of fame was when Cal Schmiege presented him an award for putting on the Cornball Regatta for 25 years! This was one of Jim's proudest moments. Every year he wrote letters, called people and made the event a success.

His fans say—Jim has been a supporter of all sailing at Chautauqua, always willing to work on any regatta, never wanting any credit. Heinrich Kutschke says, "I crewed for Jim at local weekly races and some regattas. He was ALWAYS patient and understanding and instructed his crew in a positive way. He is indeed the kindest skipper I've sailed with. Because of his neverending enthusiasm for the sport, I purchased a Lightning and have been active in the Fleet since 1990." Chuck Hodges, Past Commodore and Lightning sailor, says, "Jim is the most dedicated sailor, let alone Lightning sailor. He was always willing to share his knowledge and

his boat to teach newcomers in the sport of sailing."

Funniest moments—1) As we were approaching the dock in heavy air, my son was ready to take a picture as a puff came, and the boat knocked the dock section into the water. My son grabbed the forestay, did not fall into the water and took the picture; 2) From crew Heinrich Kutschke, "Jim would put his hearing aid into a waterproof container and put it into his back pocket. So, as we were docking in pretty heavy air, Jim could not hear me so I bent over and shouted to his back pocket. Onlookers were wondering. (Editor's note: SO ARE WE!).

Improve the Class—Better communication within the fleets and information sharing with other fleets about many issues, and ten more boats in the Fleet!



This year is Joe's 55th year enjoying the sport he loves. At the Bay City Yacht Club, Joe has served as Rear Commodore (1960), Vice Commodore (1961) and Commodore (1962). In 1987, BCYC recognized Joe for his dedication and love of sailing, and recently, the Wednesday Night Championship Series for Fleet 216 has been renamed to the Joe Dissette Championship Series. Joe is also in the business of buying and selling Lightnings. His expertise is known worldwide. Joe spent several weeks one summer in Ireland at the request of local Irish sailors he had met when selling one of his boats.

How he began—Joe tells us, "Back in the late thirties and early forties I was spending my summers on Lake Charlevoix with my Dad. Those were high school years, but I managed to get the dealership for a little 13 1/2-foot sloop, selling five, starting a fleet, and racing Sundays at Ironton on Lake Charlevoix—sparking my interest in racing."

In 1938, I saw an article in *Yachting* magazine by Olin Stephens, designer of the Lightning. He extolled the excellent qualities of a new one-design class called "Lightning" and included pictures of Olin test sailing No. 1 on Skaneateles Lake in New York.

I said to my Dad, "Someday I would like to own a Lightning," but I had to wait until 1945 to get my wish—a homebuilt Lightning with no number, followed by numbers 498, 2949, 5577 (1st Carousel). Then, in 1964, I got my first fiberglass Lightning (Carousel 2), and the rest is history—lead-ing to Carousel 35!"

Greatest Moments—In 1998 at the ILCA 60th Anniversary Regatta held at the Skaneateles Country Club in Skaneateles, New York, Joe was in the Green Fleet with 87 boats competing—WOW! What a starting lineup, an awesome event! Joe had been having heart trouble, and that morning he and his wife, Ann, made an unscheduled trip to the hospital. The crew rigged the boat and circled off the end of the dock waiting for Joe to return. 223 of the 225 boats had been launched. With Ann driving through two barricades and down the launching ramp, Joe arrived and headed to the starting line. Joe finished 1st in the first race, setting the tone for the regatta. "Because we were ahead in the race, we finished in a mix of boats in the Blue Fleet. John McCree and Joe Schofield, my crew, asked the Racing Committee for a finish signal. We finished at the tail end of the Blue Fleet boats. The following two races were back to back with 5th place finishes—with a total of 11 points—the Green Fleet was ours. What could be better than winning your fleet at the 60th Lightning Anniversary Regatta? That had to be the highlight of my sixty-two years of Lightning racing."

Good stories—One of the funniest moments was seeing my middle crew, Glenn Hallett, miss his hiking strap, dragging his bottom through the water, holding on for dear life, as we crossed the finish line just inches from the committee boat, and just ahead of John McCree, for the win.

One of the scariest moments was capsizing just before the finish line at the mouth of the Saginaw River, flying the spinnaker in heavy air in mid-May. After being rescued by Mark Simoni (Coast Guard Auxillary) and practically carried to a hot shower (due to a slight case of hypothermia), I finally felt back to normal an hour later. Since we had to leave my Lightning, with its mast stuck in the mud in the channel at the mouth of the river, I, along with many in our fleet, watched from the club house as a professional crew tried to rescue my boat before a scheduled freighter ran it down. Fortunately, they managed to right it and tow it back to our BCYC just minutes before that freighter came charging down the channel with its searchlight focused on my Lightning in tow. I

will never forget the many hands from our fleet that stayed late into the night, watching the rescue operations, and then hosing the mud off my boat and sails before tucking her safely away!

"My lifelong friendship with Joe began in 1976 with the purchase of my first Lightning. My brother, Tom, and I were attempting to put the mast up. We had the uppers and lowers backwards in the chain plates. Joe, always anxious to help out a fellow sailor, advised us on the correct placement and offered a few rigging tips. By the end of the day, I had signed myself and crew up for a series of sailing lessons. One tip that I will always remember from Joe was 'never take your hands off the main sheet'—which fortunately I still do to this day." *Matt Princing*

Other Memories—Joe tells us, "When I joined the BCYC, in 1953, I had the only Lightning (Skaneateles 2949). The 110s had a large fleet and wanted me to sell my Lightning and get a 110. Long story short—I kept my Lightning! I found two more Lightnings and activated our Lightning Fleet 216, which grew to twenty in its heyday. I would like to be remembered for resisting the temptation, back in 1953, to sell the only Lightning at the BCYC, buy a 110 and join their active racing fleet.

I would also like to be remembered for the many skippers and crews that I encouraged to join in the fun of racing a Lightning. In addition, I would hope that the many people I have given sailing lessons to over the years would remember me gratefully for getting them involved in the wonderful sport of sailing."

Matt Princing says, "Talking with fellow sailors, we have decided that Joe has trained over 150 crew members—many of which went on to purchase their first Lightning."

Changes in the Class—" I would not change one thing! The Lightning is still attracting some of the best sailors in the world!"

Nelson Small Schmitt

Nelson is from Brazil and sails at the Sao Paulo Yacht Club with the Guarapiranga Fleet. He has been sailing Lightnings since the 1960s and is now the owner of Xamego VI, the sixth Lightning he has owned and built.

Claim To Fame—It seems that whenever someone needed a mast, Nelson always knew where one was available. It turns out that many, many years ago Nelson and some other Legends, like Tommy Sumner (Grandfather to the current three-time Jr. World Champion) got together and decided to chip in some money to develop the Lightning Class in Brazil. A fund was set up, and its purpose was to aid in obtaining parts in Brazil that could be made here. Nelson's tool shop has always been famous for coming up with those parts that you needed and weren't available in the country—masts, mast head caps, stainless steel spreaders, mast blocks, CB pins and all the measurement tools are just some of the parts he has built.

Recently, we ran out of masts. Nelson took it upon himself to find a supplier, provided all the drawings and qualified the samples, negotiated and bought enough masts to last a decade. The money came once again from the fund he controls.

More Claim To Fame—As a Class Measurer, he has participated in all the events held in Brazil. The most important aspect is that he does it all with great pleasure and pride. He will show and teach everything he has learned over the years and is still active in all our local events.

What the Fans Say—From James Sumner, "Nelson has been the Lightning Class in Brazil for three generations and is still going strong."

From Hans Ludwig, "Lately Nelson sails only with a female crew , doing so will surely keep him sailing for another sixty years."

From John Bennett, "It is only with people such as Nelson that the Lightning Class can grow. The boats he has built are always changing hands and popping up with new sailors joining the Class. Nelson has become a legend in finding room in his boat to fit an ice box with beer in it. There is always another can available. No matter how bad the conditions are, between races, if you have run out, look for Nelson!"





<u>Joan and Gary Hurban</u>

Joan and Gary call Fleet 75 at Nyack Boat Club in Nyack, New York, their home port. They started sailing in Seattle, Washington, in the 1960s. When asked, "Why Lightnings?" they answered, "What else is there!?" They would like to make it a Class rule that the gun for all regattas be at 7:00 AM, no limit to the number of races, no wind limit and a maximum of a fifteen-minute lunch break. If there is wind and at least two willing competitors (and there always will be if Joan and Gary are there) there should be as many races as possible!

Proudest Moment— They spent all their wedding money on a brand new Lightning (#8182) instead of furniture. This Proudest Moment may be overshadowed by their

daughter, granddaughter and son-in-law, De, Jordan and Matt Weimer, purchasing a Lightning. They will be racing this year in Annapolis.

Claim To Fame—That they are just as competitive sailing together, with either one skippering, or sailing their own Lightnings, "HIS" and "HERS."

The Fans Say—"They are always pushing themselves and the Fleet to improve."

<u>Helmut Braun</u>

He sails out of Fleet 510 at the Lagos Yacht Club in Nigeria. His "trademark" is his funny sailing hat, a golfing cap with a flap covering his neck and ears, which was made by a local tailor after he suffered a heat stroke during sailing some years ago. He started sailing in 1975 in Suakin, Sudan (Red Sea). He bought a 14 catamaran (Starcat) and a beginner's handbook. Initially, Helmut experienced some trouble when tacking the boat (had to jump off the boat onto a coral reef, push the bow about and jump back on) which made the family a bit nervous until he learned to back the jib during tacking (this technique was described in the advanced section of the handbook only). He was transferred to Lagos, Nigeria, in 1977 and started racing in Ospreys. Leaving Nigeria in 1980, he went back to Germany and onwards to Singapore he and his family started windsurfing in the Straits of Malacca. In 1988, he returned to Lagos, Nigeria, bought a wooden Lightning, eventually "upgraded" to fiberglass Lightnings and has been racing and cruising there ever since.

What the Fans Say—From Ian Edwards, "Helmut's energy for sailing is phenomenal. He is currently the oldest regular Lightning sailor in Lagos but sails more than anyone. He races every Saturday, missing only those few weeks when he is on vacation. He often wins our quarterly points competition, which covers all races for the quarter, and is always placed, which is a testimony to both the quality and frequency of his sailing. He cruises to various picnic locations around Lagos most Sundays—often two hours each way. His wife Dolly is his dedicated crew, and they are a great team. Helmut is also a great motivator for Lightning sailing in Lagos.

hours each way. His wife Dolly is his dedicated crew, and they are a great team. Heimut is also a great motivator for Lightning sailing in Lagos. He is always ready to take out a newcomer as crew to get them on the water. He encourages other sailors to go "cruising" on Sundays. He made it a point to invite me when I was new and was one of those that made my entry into Lightning sailing in Lagos easy and enjoyable.

As a crew member for Alan Emslie (2007 Nigerian Nationals winner), Alan told me back in 2005, "we just want to get close enough to him on the downwind legs to make him stand-up"—a quirk that I only discovered as I became more competitive with him. As you get close to him, he stands up to access the situation !

In the area of "quirks"—besides the hat that makes him look like he just came off a camel crossing of the Sahara, and the standing up downwind—the other thing is his boat. Everything is marked by numbers—every sheet, cleat, halyard. Even the center board has seven numbered positions marked, so when you sail with Helmut, it is "sailing by the numbers." He just issues his crew instruction by numbers so they don't even need to know what the "thing" does. It is strange if you ever sail with him (which I have only done once since I am always in my own boat), but it is great way to get a new crew working, as they do not need to understand the sailing term or work out what does what in the first few minutes in a Lightning. It also avoids problems between different countries/languages for sailing terms for the same item on the boat."

From Richard Willmott, "I have crewed for Helmut on many occasions; his numbering system is a piece of German precision. Going round the mark, you have board to 2, this rope to 3, etc. etc. Really confusing when all you really want is a beer !"


Why Lightnings—It's a versatile dinghy for our waters (tidal waters, commercial harbor, shallow inland creeks). The racing is never boring with all the competitive sailors in the Fleet. On the other hand, the Lightning has sufficient space to take a family cruising comfortably and even take along guests. We have been out with four adults, two kids and cold boxes without feeling crowded. My youngest passenger was a six-month old girl (with a very nervous mother).

Proudest moment—When Fleet 510 was eventually registered with ILCA. At that time I was Commodore of Lagos Yacht Club and tried, in vain, to register the Fleet for over a year because everything coming from Nigeria was automatically taken as attempted fraud. The registration eventually happened through the intervention of the British GP 14 Class who were running sailing workshops at Lagos Yacht Club.

Improve the Class—Helmut says, "I can only speak for Lagos; I hope to see more sailing workshops for the Lightning Class being held in Lagos. This could be done during the off season in USA and Europe (October–December and February–April) when we still enjoy sunshine and reasonable winds."



After nursing some sore bones from the windy waters of Chile over the winter, Metedeconk sailors made their initial 2006 sailing on the Southern Circuit. Jim Carson sailed the entire Circuit. Jody Lutz won the Midwinter Lightning Championship held in St. Petersburg besting, a 73-boat fleet. Jody showed his "light air wizard" skills, sailing with brother Jay and nephew Taylor while gaining an automatic entry into the Pan American Trials. The same Lutz team had sailed the prior regatta in Miami (finishing 8th) with 13-year-old Taylor steering and winning a race.

Back on the Metedeconk, the Spring Series became the Lightning Championship series. The championship series had been traditionally held in the summer, but motorboat traffic and family obligations had slimmed participation. Fortunately, the spring featured very competitive sailing with a familiar ending: Mitch Hnatt wins. Greg Kinzel sailed a very strong series to finish second, with Jody Lutz (with a crew of thirteen-year olds, son Jason and Timmy Crann) beating George Francis for third on a tiebreaker. Just before the Series, six Metedeconk boats sailed the Long John, with the Taboada brothers, Keith (third) and Brian (sixth) having the most success.

Long Beach Island held three major Lightning regattas in the summer: New Jersey State Championship at Brant Beach in June, Central Atlantic Districts in Surf City in July and the Atlantic Coast Championships at Little Egg Harbor in late July. Jody Lutz dominated the States, winning a three race series with four points; Mitch Hnatt took seventh and Jim Carson ninth. Keith Taboada finished second in the CADs, losing a first place tiebreaker to Mark Schneider of Riverton. Billy Bogardus took fifth, Jim Carson seventh, and Mitch Hnatt ninth. The ACCs at Little Egg saw the fourth, and Keith Taboada took tenth, with a first and third in the final two races. Metedeconk participation was strong in this event, with Mitch Hnatt, Greg Kinzel, Jim Carson, Billy Bogardus and George Francis also sailing. Later in the summer, Surf City held the New Jersey Junior State Championship, with Matty Schon winning and Robert Alldian taking fifth in his first Lightning regatta.

Local summer sailing was limited to the Barnegat Bay Yacht Racing Championship (BBYRA) which saw extremely volatile conditions (high winds some weeks, no wind others) and only five and the ten races scheduled completed. Mitch Hnatt reclaimed the Championship.

The North Americans in San Diego saw three Metedeconk sailors participate. Golfers often applaud themselves for out shooting their age. Jim Carson blows this standard away with his sailing performance: nearing 80, Jim gualified for the Championship flight in San Diego, finishing thirtyfourth. George Francis (seventh) and Paul Gelenitis (twentieth) sailed in the President's Cup. The neat part of their performance was George and Paul sailed with their children: George with daughter Gillian (the youngest participant in the regatta) and Paul with daughter Kristen and son Ryan. Jim also sailed the Masters, finishing 9th.

Metedeconk also sailed a Fall Series, which saw ten boats qualify (open to all fleets as is the spring) and again very competitive sailing. Mitch Hnatt again took honors with Brian Taboada 2nd and Matt Reiser of Lavallette third. While most sailors were taking their masts down and storing their boats, Jim Carson and Billy Bogardus visited the Frigid Digit in Annapolis, with Jim winning the first race in route to a twelfth in the 42-boat regatta.

After a few lean years, Metedeconk's Junior Advanced Sailing Program conducted by members of Fleet 34 on Wednesday evenings attracted a respectable turnout. This programs leads to the Club Junior Championship won this year by Caroline Hall. 2006 also saw what will hopefully be an ongoing trend at Metedeconk-a new generation of Lighting sailors with familiar last names: Lutz, Francis, Gelenitis, Schon making their debut in a Lightning. Their participation can hopefully continue a strong heritage of Lightning sailing at Metedeconk for years to come.

11444 and 13720 did race in invitationals, and 13720 also did Wednesday evening racing. Both boats held up the tradition of winning some of the races.


A new sail club member with a cruising boat has indicated that he wants to get a Lightning, so we're looking forward to getting a series going next year.



Many thanks to Howard Stickney who continues to serve as Fleet 77 Treasurer.






Keuka Lake




Galway Lake Sailing on Galway Lake Galway, New York





After a long recess following the Worlds, the Chilean Lightning Class notified me that I had become the new class president for the 2006 season. Without really knowing what I was up to, I gladly took the position (and the responsibility) and outlined what I thought should be the Class priorities. These priorities are: first, to keep the Lightnings active and hopefully capture some new participants; and secondly, to ensure Chile's participation in the Pan American Games, and after that, to select our representative in the Games.

As a result, we created a racing calendar focused on selecting crews to participate in international regattas that would give Chile a place in the Pan Ams. This would be an incentive for everyone to participate in the qualifying regattas and keep the fleet active. However, this was rapidly achieved by the very fine finish of Juan Eduardo Reid in the Pre-Pan Am Regatta held in Rio which qualified Chile to participate in the Pan American Games. The qualifying regattas would no longer be an incentive. So much for that plan.

On the other hand, sailing in Algarrobo became monotonous and unchallenging. The experience of Victor Lobos and his crew, who consistently traveled all the way from Concepción, made us realize that we should move, sail new courses, show the rest of the country what Lightning sailing is about.

Our goal for this year is to keep sailing new courses and hopefully gain new class members. We will be sailing some international regattas, but it would be a great success if we can have the presence of international sailors in our regattas. So, we will organize a stunning National Championship and you are all invited to join us.

The year starts with the Southern Circuit. We all would love to take eleven days to go sail three regattas in those cool days of early March. In the Dixie District seven boats made the trip. Neil Fowler and Todd Johnson (15202) had the best results with a 7, 2, and 6 in the three regattas. Allan Terhune did well also with a 10, 5, and 16. This was Nabeel Alsalam's (15142) first time sailing the Circuit. Three boats from Susquehanna did the trip: John Bates (14265), Star Mikell (15118), and Mike Wertz/Frank Hanson (15159). George Nagy (15221) from Hampton was new to the Dixie District and the Hampton Fleet but made the trip to Savannah. Jon Lange (15054) has made St. Pete an annual tradition.

Our District is continuing its policy of rotating the District Championships around the District. We sail our Lightnings on all types of water, and so our championships might as well be sailed in equally varied venues. One of our most active skippers, Jeff Storck, authored some sage advice for all after nearly demolishing his beautiful new boat Ariel—check your lifting bridle every time you go out and replace it with fresh line if you see any wear or if any segment of the bridle line has knots. Jeff tells his story on Fleet 50 web site.

And speaking of the web site, as of the middle of November 2006, the year-to-date number of Fleet 50 website visits was above 11,000, a 20% increase over the number for the same time last year.

Racing Events

The Local PRSA/Fleet 50 2006 racing season began March 25 with the PRSA Spring Icebreaker Regatta. Four Lightnings came out on a day

that was much nicer than the forecast predicted. Frank Gallagher took the day, claiming an impressive five bullets—a great start to the season. The following week, the PRSA spring series of eight races commenced. Twelve Lightnings came out on a picture-perfect day with sunny skies, a high near 70 degrees and northwesterly winds. Although the breeze started out strong and gusty, it settled down for the first two races before dropping to absolutely nothing before the third. Frank Gallagher continued his winning streak from the Icebreaker Regatta and won the day with two bullets. The series continued throughout the months of April and May, with variable wind and temperature conditions and a strong turnout of boats. Twelve Lightnings sailed enough races to qualify for rankings in the PRSA Spring Series 2006. Frank Gallagher finished in first place, with results that included 12 bullets in 34 total races, giving him a low point score of 30. Russ Roberts came in a close second, with 39.8 points, and Nabeel Alsalam was third, right behind Russ, with 41.6 points

This year, we once again held the Doc Gilbert Memorial Cup Regatta on the Potomac River south of Washington at Leesylvania State Park. Preparation was key. Sixteen skippers and crew came down to Leesylvania on a beau-

tiful Saturday morning a week before the race to work on the picnic pavilion, building a dozen new picnic tables and planting flowers, shrubs, and trees around the building, so we were in fine shape for the regatta which was held on Saturday and Sunday, May 6 and 7. All that preparation paid off as we had thirty-six Lightnings and seven Hamptons participate-a great turnout at this annual event, sponsored by the Old Dominion Brewing Company of Ashburn, Virginia. Regatta Chair, Russ Roberts, delivered one of the best organized and best run Potomac Cups in recent memory; PRO Rob Tompkins led a highly experienced Race Committee over two challenging days on the water. Winds on Saturday were from the northwest at 15-20 knots, gusty and shifty, while on Sunday they lightened up and came out of the northeast at 5-10 knots. Sailors from Annapolis and Havre de Grace dominated the top positions. Allen Terhune took first place, followed by Jon Guth in second, and

Steve Constants in third. Seventeen of the 36 competitors came from Fleet 50. Nabeel Alsalam was the top finisher from our Fleet in eighth place, and Ron Buchanan with son Mark was the second Fleet 50 finisher in tenth place.

The next event on the local schedule was the PRSA Spring Regatta held Saturday and Sunday, May 27–28 where ten Lightnings competed. There were good winds on Saturday, but nothing on Sunday, making for a very short race day. Frank Gallagher won, with Pat McGee taking second and Bobby Astrove at third.

With the close of the spring series, it was time to start up the Wednesday night informal racing. A great casual venue for beginner and experienced sailors alike, the weekday sailing this year was plagued by variable weather that included far too many thunderstorms. Wednesday night sailing started on June 14th and continued when the weather permitted through August, when perfect winds and warm temperatures finally made for good summer fun.

Tropical storm Ernesto did some damage to the Washington Sailing Marina when he passed through on September 1, leaving a lot of debris and a couple of downed trees. Fortunately no Lightnings were damaged in the storm. The staff at Guest Services worked hard and had the marina cleaned up within days, just in time for the 72nd Annual Presidents Cup Regatta and 13th annual Leukemia Cup Regatta held Saturday and Sunday, September 9 and 10. The Leukemia Cup is held on that Saturday in conjunction with the Presidents Cup. Fifteen Lightnings competed. On Saturday, light winds that changed direction every hour made for a sailboat racing nightmare, but PROs Bruce Bingman (upper course) and Todd Johnson (lower course) made the most of conditions, and each got a race completed before we retired for the day. Bobby Astrove, sailing with CJ Fisher and T Graham Fisher, took first place in the Lightning division of the Leukemia Cup. The winds were better on Sunday than on Saturday, and we were able to run four races on Sunday in northeasterly 6-8 MPH breezes under sunny skies with a high of 82 degrees. Benjamin Forman

and John Butler took first place, and new Fleet 50 skipper, Jim Ward, placed second. Frank Gallagher, sailing with Maryann Gallagher and CJ Fisher placed third, and Matt Klise, sailing with Bob Astrove and T Graham Fisher took fourth.

Fall series racing continued on to November 5, in good winds and generally nice weather. Nabeel Alsalam won the fall series, Frank Gallagher was a close second, and Pat McGee third.

Racing Beyond the Potomac

Many of our Fleet 50 skippers participated in races throughout the region. Bob Astrove, with dependable crew Billy Astrove and Mat Klise, took first place in the 2006 Woody Regatta held on Lake Onondaga (Syracuse, New York) July 22–23. Ithaca skipper, Byrne O'Brien, sailing with spouse Karen and Fleet 50 crew Joe Kimak, took second. Altogether there were 15 wooden Lightnings at the regatta, including Doug Dixon's beautifully restored #584. On that same weekend, but further south, Nabeel Alaslam, sailing with Pat McGee and Paul Maher on Shadowfax, won first place in the 2006 Delaware Governors Cup Regatta in Rehoboth. Other Fleet 50 boats participating in that race were Beedobeat, with John Butler,

Benjamin Forman and Tim Olson, placed second; Deux Poissons et Un Chat, with Ron and Mark Buchanan and Diane Reilly, placed third; Lord Jim, with Chandler Owen, Rose Gentile, Gloria Gilbert and Alanna and Gianna Varca, placed fifth; and String Cheese, with Jim Greenwell, Rob Holzbach, and Jamie Holzbach, placed eighth.

Still looking for action, Nabeel and Bobby took their boats and crews to the annual Susquehanna Yacht Club Sweet Corn Regatta the weekend of August 5–6, and sailed in light winds on Saturday and no wind on Sunday. Bobby placed second, Nabeel fourth. In addition to the good Fleet 50 finishes and great camaraderie, the participants tell us that the steaks were yummy and the sweet corn incredible.

Three Fleet 50 boats traveled to the New Jersey coast the weekend of July 29–30 to

participate in the Atlantic Coast Championships at Little Egg Harbor, New Jersey. Nabeel Alsalam placed 13th in a 70-boat field studded with rock stars. Benjamin Forman, sailing with Tim Olson and Ann Cody, placed forty-ninth, and the Keith family (Harry-Henry-Katie) placed sixty-third. Nabeel headed out again in August to participate in the 2006 Duck Challenge held In Havre de Grace, Maryland. Two days of beautiful sailing weather, a first-class sailing marina, good competition, and seven races (four on Saturday, three on Sunday) made for a great regatta the weekend of August 19–20. Nabeel took first place, with three firsts, two seconds, and an eighth. Patrick Phelan, regatta organizer, took second; Jason Werner, third; Kevin Macneil, fourth; and Jon Guth, fifth. Drew Hudson, sailing with Kristen Lopez and Jill Williamson, Joe Warren, sailing with John Hart and Carolann Brumfield, and David Thompson, sailing with Barb Thompson and Catherine Calvin, also competed.

Two Fleet 50 boats made the journey to Solomons Island on Saturday September 23rd to participate in the two-day 10th annual SMSA Small Boat Invitational on the Lower Patuxent River. The RC established a long windward-leeward course on the south side of the river in front of the Naval Air Station, somewhat sheltered from the waves generated by the strong southwesterly wind, and started the first race a little after 11:00 AM. It was a contest of survivorship from that point forward, in 20–25 mph winds with gusts to 35 (one gust of 37 was recorded at 11:20 AM). Twice as many boats capsized as finished the first race, and that was it for the weekend. Nabeel sailed away with first place in the Lightning division by a wide margin; Carol Park from Susquehanna took second; Star Mikell took third. PRSA won the Rusty Rudder Participation Award for the most boats from a single club, but Susquehanna pretty much dominated the Lightning division with four boats among the five finishers. To put it all in perspective: 37 boats registered and six finished. Just surviving the regatta was winning.

Five Fleet 50 boats traveled to Annapolis for the Frigid Digit regatta October 14–15 in challenging winds on Saturday and gentler winds on Sunday. Frank and Nabeel, both highly experienced Fleet 50 skippers, capsized in the second race on Saturday but recovered to finish in the middle of the Fleet. John Butler was the highest-placing Fleet 50 skipper overall, in 25th place (out of forty-one boats competing).

Fleet 50 boats traveled to the Pennsylvania Governors Cup at Susquehanna and to the Borderline Regatta at Kerr Lake the weekend on October 28–29 but did not race due to the extraordinary winds (gusts to 50 MPH) brought by a strong storm system that worked its way east after dumping 20 inches of snow in Colorado.

Four Fleet 50 boats traveled to Hampton, Virginia, the weekend of November 11–12 for the Hampton Fling regatta and enjoyed outstanding November weather on Saturday, with temperatures in the high 70s and gentle 10 mph southwesterly winds. An added treat was the arrival of the aircraft carrier Wasp, which sailed past the start line prior to the first race, coming home to Norfolk after three months on station in the Persian Gulf, announced by a 12-gun cannon salute. What a wonderful weather day to end the 2006 season.

Non-racing Events

The month of June brought the Fleet sponsorship of Virginia Special Olympics sailing held at the Washington Sailing Marina. Lightning skippers Joe Warren, Frank Gallagher and newcomer Norm Kruse (using Drew Hudson's boat) provided boats and drivers for the summer Special Olympics program. Sailing started on June 12 and was cancelled for the next two weeks due to thunderstorms and the flooding of the Potomac. The program resumed on Mondays in July. Light air prevailed for the Monday training sessions, but when it was time for the end-of-season regatta on July 22nd, winds of 11–17 knots from the southwest gave the participants a chance to seriously test their skills. The boats returned to the marina just before wind gust picked up to 20 knots, and fortunately, there was no capsizing. The best part was watching the reaction of these athletes—their visible excitement was rewarding for all the Fleet 50 participants.

Throughout the summer, informal weekend sailing took place for those not traveling to regattas. In June, sunny skies and steady southerly winds around 12 mph made for perfect sailing conditions. July and August brought the same. Funny how good winds prevail when a regatta isn't scheduled.



This year we revived the tradition of a mid-summer downriver cruise to Ft. Foote, a historic site along the Potomac River. On a beautiful sunny and mild Saturday in July, four Lightnings, four Lasers, two Interlakes, two Albacores and a Hobie Cat made up our flotilla. All week the wind forecast had been for northerly winds around 10 mph, but at the appointed time of departure the winds were light. By the time most of the boats made it out of the cove, the light winds became barely perceptible, and the boats were reduced to floating down river with the current. Albacore skipper Mike Heinsdorf, driving the 19-foot Carolina Skiff, saved the day by demonstrating awesome boat handling skills as he snaked his way around the upper Potomac, picking up the thirteen boats that had set sail and creating a chain under tow, delivering us to Ft. Foote in time for our picnic and volleyball game. While we were picnicking, the winds came back, and on the return trip we had northeasterly breezes at 8–9 mph, enough to make us move smartly, but not enough to heel us over. All enjoyed a relaxed, easy day.

Lighting skippers, led by PRO Jeff Storck, provided the Race Committee for the 2006 Albacore US National Championships held on the Potomac October 7–9. Good winds and cold rain were offered up on Saturday, nicer weather and lighter winds on Sunday, and beautiful weather but no wind at all on Monday made for a fun regatta for the 34 competing, one-design Albacore competitors who came from across the US and Canada to compete.

Looking Forward

Fleets 50 and 329 are coordinating their planning efforts for the 2007 Lightning Women's, Juniors', and Masters' (WJM) Championships Regatta at Leesylvania and the 2007 Lightning North American Championships Regatta at Severn Sailing Association on the Chesapeake. The Regattas will be conducted Wednesday, August 15 through Saturday, August 18 (WJMs) and Sunday, August 19 through Friday, August 24 (NAs). Nabeel Alaslam of Fleet 50 will serve as Regatta Chair for the WJMs, Steve Constants of SSA for the NAs. We look forward to these events and hope to see a great turnout.

Four Fleet 50 skippers will serve on the board of the Potomac River Sailing Association in 2007: Jeff Storck as Commodore, Pat McGee as Vice-Commodore, David Thompson as Rear Commodore, and Nabeel Alsalam as Membership Chair. PRSA is our club and is the organizing body for all one-design racing events on the Potomac in Washington DC.




Our season was marked by several big events:





Finland arranged the European Championships as well as the Youth World Championships in 2006. A total of thirty-three boats, of which twenty-one were Finnish boats, attended the combined Finnish Championships and Europeans in July in Juurikkasaari Jyväskylä. The number of the boats was a bit higher than we expected due to the Greek teams being very active this year. That may be a sign of preparations for the next Worlds in Athens in 2007. The weather for the Europeans was perfect, no light winds, as is often the case in July in Finland, and no heavy gusts like the ones that occurred just before the regatta when an old birch tree tipped over in thunderstorm and almost hit three of the rental boats.

After the Europeans, we continued with the Youth World Championships which involved only ten boats. Three of them were from Finland, others came from US, Greece and Brazil. In Youths, there were relatively heavy, almost northern winds, which are not often seen in Finland in summertime. But all the committee boats knew their tasks, and our 'service team' was prepared to fix all the damages caused. I would like to thank all the volunteers of the Finnish Lightning Class Association and the Jyväskylän Veneseura. Valuable work was performed. It is very nice to see that we have active youth teams again that will continue Lightning sailing next summer.

Valuable work has also been done in boat building. Pyry Craft made a new wooden Lightning for Kimmo Aromaa, who took gold with it in the Finnish Championships. Kimmo's previous boat has new active owners in Tuusula. New active sailors, especially youth teams and new boats, are the only way to promote Lightning sailing in Finland. We are in good shape now.

During the sailing season 2005 the Helsinki Fleet 166 continued to work in close cooperation with the Tuusulanjärvi fleet 456. Kimmo Aromaa had ordered a new wooden Lightning from Finnish builder Pyry Craft. This prototype took a much longer time to construct than planned, so he had to start the season with a borrowed traditional woody. The new boat, Masi VII, was finished during the Europeans in Jyväskylä, and Kimmo proved again to be the fastest Finnish sailor. Kimmo Aromaa as skipper and Mika Aromaa as forward crew won the District Championship for the fourth time in a row. For their cousin, Juha Aromaa, the Championship was the first one. It was nearly fifty years ago when Juha's father Raimo as skipper and Kimmo's and Mika's parents as crew won their first Championship. That was in 1957.

On May 14, the Finnish Lightning sailors had a heavy loss. Terho Aromaa, one of the founding fathers of Lightning class in Finland and one of our most successful sailors, passed away after a short illness. He had started sailing with Lightnings in the 1950s, had his most victories in 1960s, trained the next generation in 1970s and 80s and finished in the 1990s. He worked a long period as District Measurer and measured over 100 boats.

The most important events for the season 2006 were the Europeans and Youth world Championship in Jyväskylä. The Europeans were a success with 33 boats. The brand new boat, 15281 Masi VII, was christened with a good amount of bubbly drinks. The team won the District Championship and one race, even their tiller broke. It looks like that the traditional way of christening the vessel still gives good luck.

For the Youth Worlds, a few more would have been nice. The races were well organized. The main problem was our aging boats. During the Youth Worlds the "District Service Team," with guys from Jyväskylä, Tuusula and Helsinki Fleets, had to work around the clock. We sincerely hope that

the wooden boat project produces many new boats to replace the aging fiberglass boats.

The woody prototype Masi VII will be slightly modified during the winter, and a second boat will be built. The two woodies will attend the Worlds in Athens next summer. We hope that Lightning sailing in Finland will gain interest and the Class will be seen as a group with extreme sailing and a group that is known to race with over-rigged high-tech wooden boats.

Our Fleet had the honour to organize The Junior World Championships and the Europeans 2006! During the long winter we had our meetings to prepare fine championships during the coming summer. The clubhouse is located ten miles outside the city of Jyväskylä. The nature around the racing area is beautiful and almost wild.

We noticed soon that the interest from the Europeans would be very high. Without any doubt, we would get at least thirty boats, maybe even forty. We found out that our weakest point would be the old and very narrow slip. It would be impossible to get all the boats in and out of the water on time. So we had to make a bigger one. The work started just after the ice was melted in the middle of May.

Our home lake was still frozen when we where packing "Lola" and "Nikea" to the first ranking regatta. We drove 150 miles south to the lake Tuusulanjärvi. Timo O Järvinen worked hard during the winter to restore "Lola." Both boats had brand new sails, and the result was very good: Timo with his crew, Vesa Karhusaari and Antti Kanninen, finished fifth, and Samppa with Tero Kotimäki and Heikki Tulomäki won the first regatta. It was very promising that we had twelve boats already in this season breaking "On the Rocks" regatta.

Two weeks later the next ranking regatta was held on Lohja, 200 miles to southwest. This time our fleet was represented by "Nikea" and "Kristiina." Keijo Tulomäki bought this boat for his 14-year old son Heikki, who was training for the youth championships. There is one very interesting thing with this boat. Samppa and his farther had made this wooden boat during the years 1975–77, and now this boat came back to home waters! "Kristiina" and the juniors, Heikki Tulomäki, Anna Hendersson and the skipper Vili-Pekko Pukari, showed their potential by finishing 9th among eleven boats. Samppa with Keijo and Tero finished second.

The third regatta was held the last weekend of May. This time we didn't need to travel anywhere because the host club was our own. We had four boats from our fleet and total of twelve boats. Results on home waters where not very encouraging. "Nikea" (Samppa, Tero and Keijo) were sixth, Lola (Timo, Vesa and Antti) came in seventh, Juniors doing all the time better now with boat "Tuula" were ninth, and "Old Lady" was twelfth. Our juniors sailed with the team which they had registered to the Junior Worlds: Vili-Pekko Pukari, Heikki Tulomäki and Johannes Geiss.

After midsummer it was time to participate in the traditional 35-mile long distance race called Keitele Regatta. This year the Lightnings were the biggest fleet with nine boats. After two days racing, "Nikea" (Samppa, Tero and Seppo Varma) was number one of Lightning fleet and managed also to be the fastest boat in the whole regatta! Lola with Timo, Riitta Kangas and Petra Lehtinen came in fifth. Old Lady with Esko Lehtinen,



Olli Lehtinen and Heli Korjus were 6th. Tuula with Hannu Kolehmainen and Eija Kolehmainen were ninth.

Now it was time for the Open Europeans. Our friends from Switzerland and Greece arrived in good time before measurement day. It was a positive surprise that we got ten teams from Greece. It was also great to see that the Brazilian Junior Team arrived at the same time to take part in the Open Europeans. We where very happy that we got together thirty-three entries. Several of the foreign teams came without their own boats. This situation presented the organizers with a big challenge—how could we find a rental boat for every team? Finnish Lightning District Commodore Sakari Pesola and company did a great job by bringing boats to Jyväskylä.

The rental boats were in various conditions. We especially warmly remember the attitude of the Brazilian team. The condition of their boat honestly wasn't the top, but they didn't complain. And what a result they showed later with this boat!

During the championship the wind was blowing from the north and northwest. This is a very unfamiliar wind direction at this time of the summer. The other surprise was very positive. We had good winds every day instead of predicted south wind 0–6 mph.

The Europeans started with the same script as so many times earlier. The experienced Swiss team, skippered by Urs Wyler along with his crew members Walter Durr and Gilbert Durr, took the lead. They had a very good competition, especially from the two young Greek teams skippered by Christos Atzemian and Panagiotis Verginadis. When the final race started, the Swiss team had a "safe" lead with one drop off by six points, compared to Panagiotis. The last race showed how dramatically the situation can change. Urs finished 9th, and Panagiotis won the final race. So the young Greek team of Panagiotis Verginadis with his crew Timos Vlachos and Theodoros Poulakos won the European title by one point!

The Brazilian team was fourth with their "uncompetitive" boat. The best Finnish team was Kimmo Aromaa in eighth place. Once again we saw how difficult it was to sail on home waters. Our own fleet's result was: Samppa J Salminen with Tero Kotimäki and Keijo Tulomäki finished nineteenth, Timo O Järvinen with Vesa Karhusaari and Antti Kanninen were twentieth, Esko Lehtinen with Pekka Lehtinen and Jukka Lehtinenwere twentysixth, Ilkka Lilja with Anssi Lilja and Kari Elivuo were twenty-eighth, Vesa Purokuru with Petri Sallinen and Pekko Sallinen were thirtieth, and finally, our juniors Vili-Pekko Pukari with Heikki Tulomäki and Johannes Geiss came in thirty-second.

The Finnish Championship was formed from the European results. Kimmo Aromaa with Mika Aromaa and Juha Aromaa won the championship, Matti Leppänen won silver, and Niko Lappalainen won the bronze medal. Samppa in seventh place was the best from our own Fleet.

Now it was time for the Junior World Championship! We had been preparing ten equal boats for the juniors plus one reserve boat. We want to thank John Atkins, VP Junior World Championship, for his outstanding efforts and a great job trimming the boats. Also we want to thank John for his advice, help and perseverance when communicating and sending an endless number of emails during the long winter.

We had ten entries in the Juniors: one team from Brazil, three teams from Greece, USA and Finland. During the practice race the weather was sunny and warm, and wind was light from south 0–6 mph.

When we awoke up on the first competition day, the morning the wind was back to the north, and all over the lake there were white caps from wind blowing 20–25 mph. The first race was dominated by the Brazilian team skippered by Thomas Sumner. European Champion Panagiotis was second. While the sailing area was very near to the clubhouse, all the boats came on shore to have a warm meal. Boats where changed after each race. Thomas also dominated the second race and, Panagiotis followed him.

Many teams washed their boats and sails on the shore. It was a big surprise when they heard that it is not necessary because we are sailing on drinkable waters! FINLAND DISTRICT

The third, fourth and fifth races were won by Panagiotis, and Thomas was second in every race. So the title was still open, and in fact, it was open until the last mark rounding. What a thriller. Winning the last race, the 2006 Junior World Champion went to Thomas Sumner, Felipe Brito and Filipe Gil from Brazil. This was Thomas' third Junior World Champion—a record which might be unbeatable!

The silver medal went to Panagiotis Verginadis, Timos Vlachos and Theodoros Poulakos. Bronze medals went to USA Nicholas Aswad, Connor Aswad and Peter Hazelet. The best Finnish team, Pyry Itkonen, Laura Hemming and Maria Hemming, were eighth. Our own boys, Vili-Pekko Pukari, Heikki Tulomäki and Johannes Geiss, finished ninth. Eppu Pötry, Anna Henderson and Eero Viitanen finished tenth.

Immediately after the Junior Championship was over it was time to concentrate on the traditional 65-miles long multi-fleet race through the whole Lake Päijänne. It had been blowing very hard during the week. Now when 160 boats where waiting for the start signal, there was almost no wind at all. Altogether seven Lightnings where starting in the race. Our Fleet was represented by "Nikea" Samppa J Salminen, Keijo and Heikki Tulomäki, "Muje" Anssi, Rudolf and Henrik Lilja and "Old Lady" Pekka, Esko and Olli Lehtinen. Also Timo O Järvinen was sailing a TP boat "Burgundy." When the race time limit was achieved after sailing twenty-six hours, the Lightnings didn't reach the finish line. "Nikea" was nearest but had still five miles to go. For the first time in history, all Lightnings got DNF!

On the first weekend of October we had the next Ranking series in Kotka. Among ten boats "Nikea" with Samppa, Tero and Heikki Nurmi was third. "Lola" with Timo, Vesa Karhusaari and Olli Lehtinen finished fifth.

These results meant that Samppa J Salminen won the bronze medal in the whole ranking series. Timo O Järvinen was seventh, Vili-Pekko Pukari was fourteenth, Esko Lehtinen was nineteenth, Ilkka Lilja was twenty-second, Vesa Purokuru was twenty-third, Hannu Kolehmainen was twenty-fourth, Timo Lehtinen was twenty-fifth and Olli Lehtinen twenty-sixth.

We finished our very active season on Lake Tuusulanjärvi on the last weekend of September with eleven Lightnings. "Nikea" Samppa with Tero and Heikki Nurmi was second, "Lola" Timo with Timo Lipas and Antti Kanninen 6th and "Kristiina" Vili-Pekko Pukari with Heikki Tulomäki and Johannes Geiss ninth. The sun was shining warmly, and it was very windy. Three boats capsized. We have never had such huge surfing than in the last race. It was really a fine way to close the incredible season!

These great championships had a very positive effect to our Fleet. We got also several "new" boats. Now it appears that the Lightning sailing in Jyväskylä is finally on the rise after several quiet years. We are waiting for a very active summer 2007. Thank you to all our Lightning friends who where visiting our Fleet and club during the championships!

Fleet 456 hosted the annual season opening and Lightning ranking regatta On the Rocks in early May, where twelve Lightnings participated in fresh winds and waters. The winner was Kimmo Aromaa of HSK, but the places 2,3,6,7 9,10 and 11 went to Fleet 456 sailors Niko Lappalainen, Matti Leppänen, Esko Aalto, Pekka Bollström Gerhard Sternberger, Antero Punttila, and Eppu Pötry.

The ranking series continued in Lohja with eleven boats, six from our Fleet, where Niko Lappalainen was the winner, and in Jyväskylä with twelve boats, five from our Fleet, where Matti Leppänen was the 2nd.

In midsummer, nine Lightnings, five from our fleet, participated in Keitele Regatta, a 30-mile long distance day sailing along beautiful lakes and waterways in mid Finland. Samppa Salminen of Jyväskylä was the winner on his home waters, and Matti Leppänen of Tuusula, the second. Another event on waters of the Lake Päijänne tempted four Lightnings from our Fleet and three from other fleets to participate among the 100+ keelboats in a 60-mile long, non-stop distance sailing. The race was shortened at midnight due to dying wind. The best of Lightnings was Samppa Salminen of Jyväskylä, and the best of our Fleet was Matti Leppänen (fourth). Three of our Lightnings sailed among two hundred others sailed in a wooden and classic boat regatta "Viaporing Tuoppi" around Helsinki archipelago. Sakari Pesola with Sininen Salama was the second just after the Finnish Champ Kimmo Aromaa, Matti Leppänen with Kikka the third, and Esko Aalto with Sofia the fifth.

The highlights of the season were Lightning Class European Championship 2006 and Youth World Championship hosted by Jyväskylä Boat Club. Europeans got together thirty-three boats from Finland, Switzerland, Greece, and Brazil. The junior team of Panagionitis from Greece won the title of European Championship; and the best of our Fleet was the sixth Matti Leppänen, followed Niko Lappalainen (13), Pekka Bollström (22), Esko Aalto (23), Kaarlo Jaskari (24),Perti Pyy (25), Eppu Pötry (junior, 27), Gerhard Sternberger (29) and Olli Kanerva (33).

The Lightning Class Youth World Championship trophies went to Brazil (First), Greece (Second) and USA (Third). Our fleet was presented by Pyry Itkonen (Seventh) and Eppu Pötry (Tenth) with their crews.

Weekly racing series, sailing school for beginners, sailing training, cruising, and promotion events were also organized by our fleet and the host club TP actively during the season on our lake.

Our membership remains strong and committed to the spirit of the Lightning sailing and Lightning racing. See you next year at the Worlds in Athens!

We definitely learned much, and it was great fun. Our final results weren't so good, but we didn't let it bother us. Or at least I didn't, and more than final results, I was pleased with the experience we got.


Back to Square Two and Up Again

Sailing with Juniors—Bill Mauk

The 2006 Florida Districts were held in May at Davis Island Yacht Club. The club is placed a short five-minute sail from the race course, which has a special set of challenges. Conditions on Hillsborough Bay are like racing on a mid-sized lake, as it is located on Hillsborough Bay, surrounded by land, but with a possibility of a sea-breeze working in from the Gulf of Mexico.

The racing was very competitive. Going into the last race, three of us were within one point of the championship. But even more than the nature of the competition, I had a fantastic experience sailing with two excellent junior sailors.

Going into the Districts, I needed crew, so I asked Mark Bryant, Florida's VP of Youth Development, for suggestions. When he found me Amanda Holm from Ft. Meyers and Zeke Horowitz from Sarasota, I was excited. Mark had coached both of the high school students. They started in strong Optimist programs and now sail Lasers and 420s on their school teams. Amanda even started her high school's team and teaches sailing at the Ft. Meyers Sailing Center. Zeke has a passion for team-racing and has a full schedule of events around the country this summer, including high hopes for the Sears Cup. The only small downside was that neither of them had stepped foot on a Lightning.

Their solid sailing foundation made it fairly easy to become outstanding crew. Zeke sailed with me on Friday in the Masters competition. After the racing was over that day, Amanda joined us and we went out and practiced for about 90 minutes. Amy Linton talked through the mechanics of working the bow with Amanda and when the racing started on Saturday, we not only had great boat handling, but these juniors added much more.

We had thorough discussions on strategy, which developed into solid judgments for most of the races. Zeke was particularly good on tactics during the race. His decision-making on fleet management always kept us in the hunt. Amanda was a genius at seeing the wind on the runs and judging were to place the boat for the next pressure.

When things were not going well, they were patient and always stayed in the race. Sailing with Juniors turned out to be a fantastic experience for me.

After the regatta was over, they both said they really enjoyed the Lightning. They especially liked all the sail controls, and both gained significant knowledge about what standing and running rigging could do to the shape of a sail and what it means to boat speed. They thought the three-person crew was really great and liked the ability to move the boat around with crew weight. They said they would talk the boat up with their friends.

What was surprising to me was they had not heard of the Junior North Americans or Youth Worlds. They had very little idea that the Pan American Games were comparable to the Olympic Games. They were excited about the possibility of competing and thought if more junior sailors knew of these events, that it would be good for the Class.

If we are to grow the Lightning class, junior sailors should think of the Lightning as a one-design class to which to advance as they think about their sailing future. For this to happen we need to ask more juniors to sail with us (we might even improve our finishes!) and get the word out on the Championship opportunities.

By the way, we finished tied for first, but lost the tiebreaker. The team of Jeff and Amy Linton, and Mark Taylor is tough competition, but the future looks bright. I recommend junior sailors highly!



Our first day of racing for 2006 was on Sunday, May 14. This was Mother's Day so the turnout was small. Also, two Lightning sailors, Hank Jelinek and Mark Marussich, served as race officials, so only two boats skippered by Rich Miner and Chuck Chute went head to head, with Rich taking first place for both races. The following week, the pace picked up a bit with four Lightnings on the course for the first race and three for the second. With a good wind out of the southwest, Rich Miner racked up two more bullets, and Don Okner took a second in the first race, followed by Hank Jelinek and Chuck Chute in that order. Don did not sail the second race during which Hank and Chuck collided and went over. Fortunately, the damage was not severe, and both boats were seaworthy and competitive for the balance of the season.

The Gabor Cup Regatta was scheduled for May 28. Unfortunately, we had to cancel racing on that day due to the lack of wind. And if that was not enough of a disappointment for the many boats and race officials who showed up for the event, on the following weekend we again had to cancel regular racing again due to lack of wind. During 2005 we had zero cancellations due to lack of wind, but things caught up with us in 2006 with four of the first eight races being cancelled.

On June 11 the much wanted wind—at moments a bit too much—returned. Three Lightnings battled it out in a breeze of 10–12 knots with gusts to 20 knots out of the north-northwest. In the first race, Don Okner with son Jim Okner and Pete Brown as crew took first place. They were followed by Perry Anderson and Rich Miner. In the second race, the honors went to Rich and his crew, wife Gail and Edgar Braendle. Perry and crew Margaret Anderson and Ali Brown took second place, and Don Okner and his crew in third. Pete Brown's quote of the day was "I like hiking out!"

Six Lightnings were at the line for two races in an 8-knot south southwest wind on June 18. John Incantalupo, with wife Margie and son Sean, made their 2006 debut on that day. However, the following weekend brought rain but no wind, so we again had to cancel. Fortunately, for our Marine Base Regatta, held on July 2 and sponsored by the Snipe Fleet, we were treated to a 10-knot wind out of the southwest that encouraged five Lightnings, two Snipes and a Sunfish to engage in handicapped competition. Perry Anderson served as race official for the event which was won by Mike Kelly and his sister in a Snipe. Don Okner and his crew, Jim Okner and Pete Brown, took second, followed by Rich Miner and crew, Gail Miner and Edgar Braendle, in third position. It was a humbling day for the Lightnings.

The annual, Independence Day Family Picnic took place on July 3rd to coincide with the Lake Mohawk Country Club fireworks. We had a great turnout with about 90 members and guests enjoying traditional hamburgers and hot dogs before viewing the fireworks from our docks. Thanks once again to Cathy Chute and Bambi Newton for organizing the event and for all who helped with the setup, cooking and other jobs that made this the best family picnic ever!

For racing on July 9 we had a 5–10 knot wind out of the southwest that brought seven Lightnings to the line. Race official Lincoln Rowley set a triangle course and ran two races, back to back, with the Lightnings sailing seven legs in each race. This was a picture perfect day that saw the return of Mark Marussich to the waters of Lake Mohawk. However, wife Siobhan was not crewing because she was expecting their first child, Catherine, born a few short months later. In the race, Rich Miner took two firsts with Don Okner and Perry Anderson each taking a second and Chuck Chute and Hank Jelinek trading places for third.

On July 16 the wind was out of the northwest at only five knots. However, there was enough air to move a boat, so races were held with Don Okner and Jim Okner doing their turn as race officials. The Spring Series ended the following weekend on a sunny July 30 afternoon with 4–8 knot wind out of the northwest. Also, the Junior Sailing program ended in early August, and once again, a group of young people have now learned the basics of sailing—skills that will last a lifetime.

The early August racing conditions were not great but more sufficient to allow us to complete the first four races that were scheduled. On August 6 there was a wind out of the east-southeast between two and six knots. Rich Miner, along with Gail Miner, served as race officials while three Lightnings competed. Perry Anderson took two firsts. On the 13th, Perry Anderson, as well as Margaret Anderson and Bill Henderson, ran the races and were challenged by a wind of only four knots out of the west that eventually came around to the southwest and picked up for the second race. Again, three boats sailed in the light air with the Miner boat finishing first in both races.

The pace picked up on August 20 when we were treated to a southwest wind that climbed from 5–10 knots. Six boats were at the line for two races in which Rich Miner and Perry Anderson swapped for the first and second place honors. However, on August 27 racing was canceled due to lack of wind.

The Commodore's Cup Regatta, our last handicapped event for the year, was held on September 4, 2006, and was won by Commodore Rich Miner skippering one of the five Lightnings that competed in the event. In second place was Jeff Urbanski in a Snipe followed by Mike Kelly also in a Snipe who edged Don Okner out by 1.3 seconds for third place position. The event was filled with a few mishaps. Margie Incantalupo decided to practice the "woman overboard drill," and John's Guardian Angel later suffered a bit of damage to its bow during a hard docking. Shirley Miller raced a Sunfish and went for a dunking when she turtled. Thankfully, no one was hurt and all had a great time. On September 10, the winds were light out of the northeast, but six Lightnings raced with Hank Jelinek running the races. Nearly our entire Fleet was out on the lake that day. 

Ron McCormack, with crew Ron Longueira and Sylke Jackson, sailed almost every weekend, hugging the inside and roaring out of the middle of the Fleet with a handful of bullets and some spectacular knockdowns. Bill Cook came out just enough to "mess with their heads," bearing straight down the line on port ten seconds before the gun. Stephanie and Bill Mayo got a new boat and always seemed to come out of nowhere just when you'd counted them out. Ryan Sprole and his dad were always among the first at the mark, and their brand new boat didn't make much difference. Charles Taus sneaked away from his new baby when he could, and new members Bill and Kelley Roesch have started to cut deep into the Fleet. They will be a threat next year. Joan and Gary Hurban and Bob Sengstacken (back from the Worlds and newly wed to excellent Penny on the river) travelled often, giving us a break from their relentless dominance of first places. Dan Parietti, with crew Jeff Sorenson and Star Mike (Carney), was on the road almost as much. Bob Sengstacken's crew, Mino Tsutsui and Daniel Zitin, showed their skills several weekends, managing once to capsize at the finish right in front of Race Officer Bob. Larry Decker and Jan Crittenden took a bunch of aces, even when they didn't have Shea Thorvaldson with them, and George Penny's crew, his "Brooklyn Girls," Lizzie and Jennie (and Carlo), became real sailors on an early Nickels boat, 13625-still game, and still quick downwind. Eric and Ann Beck got a new boat cover which they needed; they spent the whole summer on Lasers. Art Broadbent joined the Fleet and is learning the ropes (quite different from the woody of his youth). Mark Silverstein brought Dan's old boat back to the yard, and Les Ginsberg got his black boat on the water, though not as often as he wanted to. Jim Wolf moved away, but Eric Kent's return brought a wily skipper back to the line.

We have two traditional regattas here in Nyack that date from the days when Lightning Fleets dotted the Hudson River, Long Island Sound, and Great South Bay—when the Metropolitan District was a power in Lightning sailing. The 32nd annual Magnus Pederson Regatta was sailed June 3 and 4. We had fourteen boats on the line on Saturday, braving lousy forecasts for heavy rain and thunderstorms. We were rewarded with occasional rain and winds from 2–18 knots. The exacting Charlie Green kept the race patrol busy moving marks to adjust to frequent 30-degree shifts, giving us good upwind and downwind legs. With eight races, Gary Hurban took first overall with a series of good choices, Bob Sengstacken earned a third, Joan Hurban was fourth, and Larry Decker sixth, with long-time visitors filling in the spaces. Ched Proctor, known to many of us in the Class, led a round table discussion during cocktails, and we dissected the races. A delicious steak barbecue followed. It was a weekend with lots of sailing, great food, and friendship.

Our second big event was the Last Blast Regatta, a regular stop on the unofficial Northeast fall tour. The races, our river, and NBC's renowned hospitality drew top talent and fast boats. We had 22 boats at the first gun, and there was a lot of traffic. Ched Proctor and Dick Hallagan, Class legends, took first and second, and our own Bob and Gary with incomplete crews took third and fourth. Ryan and Chris Sprole crowded the top, and Eric Kent sailed Stephanie and Bill Mayo's new gray boat a little too well. Joan, Ron, Dan, George, and Bill and Kelley had some excellent beats and some fast runs, and although some boats filled with water, no one went over in semi-blasting winds, steady NE 15 to 20 with nasty gusts and a sudden lull that drifted fitfully west. We had a great party thanks to Dan and the fleet. It was an excellent day of sailing. The conditions minimized the advantage of brand-new boats, because everyone was going fast. Tactics mattered more than hull stiffness, and although some of us were concentrating on survival, others played the wind and current like Zen sages.

We love these boats, and we love racing them.





District regatta at Macatawa was lightly attended, but those who stayed home missed fine hospitality, dinner at the yacht club and excellent racing. There was no golf. Dave's favorite conditions prevailed throughout the regatta, a very tactical 3-12 in relatively smooth water by big lake standards, with a persistent veer that clicked right in big shifts on both days. This caused the occasional, significant boat-favored starting line, required good layline management from competitors and nearly wore out the volunteers on the weather mark boat. Starting second row at the boat and tacking was a decent strategy for most of the weekend. Charlie Hess won the first race with blinding boatspeed that caused me to have to look the other way, and Joel Humphrey won the last race with a well-timed tack towards the shore on the last beat. In between, our host Michael Norris and perennial favorite Jim Allen traded wins. We had a couple of nice tacking duels with Michael, but the last leg was never quite long enough. On the final beat Michael crossed a few of us with one of the few lefties of the weekend to save his points and capture the George Sipel trophy on tie-breaker with the Allens.

The "northern circuit" was also lightly attended. Tawas drew a small but competitive fleet, with Jim Allen and Ernie Dieball schooling the faithful from Fleet 216 in ideal boatspeed conditions. Charlie Hess was just as fast on our other Great Lake but was undone by an overstressed gooseneck and awarded only style points for best comeback after a quick Sunday morning repair from borrowed parts. The party at the Princings was a little more subdued, now that Willie has assumed some role model responsibility for his young daughter.

The world's largest Lightning Fleet, Pontiac Yacht Club, saw 57 races completed of the 65 scheduled for the Spring, Summer and Fall, Sunday and Wednesday Series. 

The Lightning Fleet is the recipient of the "racing spirit" generated at our club.

The Lansing Sailing Club Lightning Fleet sailed a "Dual" Season during 2006 to encourage participation. The "Full-Season" was comprised of 61 races held on 21 Sundays between May and October. Scores were based on the individual skipper's best 24 (40%) scores, with 40% participation needed to qualify. The "Half-Season" was based on a predetermined schedule of 16 race-days (33 races) during the season. The best 21 scores were used to calculate the individual results. No minimum participation was required.

Our 41st Annual Tune-Up Regatta was held on May 20th. We continue to be one of the first regattas in the Michigan District regatta season, and hold a one day (Saturday) venue that attracts several skippers for purpose of setting up for an early tune-up. This year, the fleet was dominated by Tom Klaban (Pontiac Yacht Club) with his two sons, Eric and Brian, who scored six first place victories. Second place went to Chris Jacobson (Bay City Yacht Club) while third place went to Blaine Severin (Lansing Sailing Club). A total of nine boats raced in the 2006 regatta.

The 387 Lightning Fleet annually presents special awards for character and performance. The honored skippers were; Pat Dolan (Fleet Champion), Jim Fletcher (Corinthian Trophy for sportsmanship), Merrick Hurlbutt (Challenger Award for competitiveness), Larry Koster (Most Improved Season), Johnathon Ahlbrand (Rookie Skipper) and Susanna Tellschow (WOW! astronomical improvement). Crew awards went to; Gil Chesboro (Crew of the Year), Michael-Salomen Jost (Rookie of the Year) and Alanna Harvey (Jane Marshall Wet Bottom Award for stalwart crew).

Our participation in Michigan District Regattas was somewhat less this year than in previous years. The 387th was represented at the District regattas: District Championship (1), Pontiac White Cap (3), Devil's Lake (1) and Higgens Lake (1). We also sent 1 boat to the Nashville Blue Nose and 1 boat to the Wawassee regattas (out of district).


An unusual photo: Bill Fastiggi looking forward to view the competition



NIGERIA DISTRICT

The Lagos Yacht Club and Lightning Fleet 510 again enjoyed sailing throughout the year thanks, to the relatively constant climate, a gentle if prolonged monsoon season and no major storm on sailing days. A variety of class, pursuit and team races were held in the harbour, offshore in the Bight of Benin and in the creeks and lagoon. A number of Club cruising events were organized within the Lagos waters, and these family friendly BBQ events attracted good attendance from the Lightning Fleet.

Races for trophies or the quarterly points series were held nearly every Saturday of the year except once or twice when the wind failed or the water hyacinth got too thick. The second quarter was won by Ian Edwards in Scud, with Helmut Braun second and Andrew Barton third. The third quarter was again won by Helmut with Ian Edwards second and Mark Haas third. The fourth quarter is still in competition as we go to press. A new programme of Sunday races has also started with a growing participation.

The Lightning Fleet in Lagos is expanding steadily, with six new boats arriving in March. This and the delivery of several sets of new sails has prompted much more vigorous competition in the racing this year, with the lead in series changing place regularly. The fleet of Lightnings is now twenty-eight glass fibre hulls with another fifteen woodies also now in full sea-going condition.

As reported previously, we have re-built the original locally-made wooden Tarpon, based on the Lightning design, first sailed in 1947. This has now been completed and with gleaming varnish looked a fine sight when she was, at last, launched in April. To commemorate this event a T1 Regatta was held on Good Friday with thirteen woodies competing for a new trophy. By careful arrangement of the sailing instructions, T1 won the competition, crewed by the Clubs three trustees (combined age of 216 years). It is intended that this event will become a regular annual fixture.

The National Championships were held on November 4 with a total participation of twenty-five Lightnings and eleven Tarpons (woodies). The weather was kind to us during the racing, although many members would have preferred much stronger winds. However, when a major storm broke soon after the close of sailing, it was agreed that we had been lucky after all. The full programme of five races was completed during a long day within Lagos Harbour. The overall winner for Fleet Champion was Agnes Desport with crew, husband Olivier. Second was Mike Barnes and third Richard Willmott.

The Lightning Class annual dinner was held in April on the open deck of the Lagos Yacht Club, under a tropical starry sky, overlooking the city waterfront. This formal event was well attended, champagne flowed freely and a good time was had by all.



The Ohio District was represented in San Diego by three boats from the Ruhlman family. It should be noted they all qualified to sail in the Championship Fleet. Dave Vieregg and Bill Buckles also represented Ohio.

Twenty-five Lightnings showed up at the annual "Snowball" regatta at Buckeye Lake October 7–8 to help George Fisher celebrate his 80th Birthday and BLYC's 100th anniversary. George Fisher is renowned as a great sportsman and gentleman, having been recognized by US Sailing as the winner of the National Sportsmanship Award, W. Van Alan Clark, Jr. Trophy, a few years back. A past president of the International Lightning Class, old friends, Jim Dressel, Tom and Anne Allen, Bruce Goldsmith, David and Jody Starck, Skip Dieball (winner of the regatta), and scores of others honored him during the celebrations. The Saturday night party was quite a special event that none will soon forget....if they could remember in the first place! Bertie Werley with George's sons Greg and Matt Fisher hosted the event.









For the second year in a row, Bob Harkrider ran the table in the Southeastern District, winning the Traveling Series and the District Championship. Terry Tyner opened the 2006 season with a win at the Lake Murray Sailfest on his home waters in Columbia, South Carolina. Terry duplicated the win a few weeks later at the VooDoo Regatta on Lake Norman.

On June 3, we turned to our District Championships at Wrightsville Beach, North Carolina. The competition was fierce. In Race1 there was rain, Race 2 brought 20-knot breezes, and the day ended with dying breezes in Race 4. Three skippers won races, including Pierce Barden, Bob Harkrider, and John Sawyer. Barden won the day with a low score of eight points. On Sunday, Bob sailed 1-2 while Avis Bridgers won the final race. With a throw-out in effect, Harkrider won the championship with a low score of eight.

When September arrived, we went back to the lakes. John Sawyer joined Bob Harkrider and Terry Tyner as the third skipper to win a traveling regatta, taking first at the Augusta Invitational. Two weeks later, he duplicated the result with a win at Waccamaw. In Atlanta, Marcus Moehlman, new to the District this year, won first place, becoming the fourth skipper to win a series event. Pierce raced the ACCs (36). Lenny Krawcheck (11), Terry Tyner (29) and Pam Barron (38) raced Savannah. Pam also had a great finish at the Bluenose. 


The GYA Championship was held on July 15 and 16 at Mobile Bay, Alabama, hosted by the Mobile Yacht Club and Fleet 135





White Rock is a small inland lake with no wave action, so clear air and boat speed were critical. The leaders consistently had the best speed. In the end, we had some good racing, and Texas will send at least two boats to San Diego. See you there!!

The 2006 sailing season is now coming to a close. We had more boats at the Texas Districts than we have had in many years, and for the first time in ten years, we sent more than one boat to the North Americans. 

2006 Lightning Youth World Championship Jyväskylä, Finland

July 17–20, 2006

During the third week of July, ten teams, three from Finland, three from Greece, three from the USA and one from Brazil, descended on the Yacht Club of Jyväskylän Veneseura, located 20 km south from Jyväskylä (approximately 280 km north of Helsinki and 450 km south of the Arctic Circle) in the suburban town of Säynätsalo on Juurikkasaari (a small island), to determine the 2006 Lightning Youth World Champion. Thomas Sumner was present to defend his title as Youth Champion, along with his crew which included Felipe Brito who crewed with Thomas in 2004 and Felipe Gil.

The Organizing Sailing Club was Jyväskylän Veneseura JVS together with the Finnish Lightning Class Association. The sailing area was located right next to the club on Lake Päijänne which stretches for 65 miles to the south. The boats were provided by the members of the Finnish Lightning Class Association. The Youth World Championship was preceded by the 2006 Lightning European Championship and followed immediately by the PaijannePurjehdus, a multi-fleet race, in which Lightnings participate. The race starts at Jyväskylän Veneseura and finishes 65 miles to the south. Panagiotis Verginadis had just won the European Championship, with Christos Atzemian finishing in third and Thomas Sumner in fourth leading up to a very competitive Youth World Championship.

The regatta started with a practice race on July 17 at 6:00 PM in the evening. The wind was as had been predicted, south at 0 to 6 mph. As usual, most teams did not finish the race but sailed past the finish on the outside of the pin. The morning of the 18th, the first day of racing, the wind was from the north, an unusual direction for this time of year, but more unusual, it was blowing between 10–12 m/s with gusts to 14 m/s. The first race was started with wind approaching the 25 mph limit. During the race gusts were recorded somewhat higher, but generally the winds were somewhat less as the race preceded. Two boats tipped over and did not finish the race as they required assistance. Thomas Sumner won with Panagiotis Verginadis a close second. The third and fourth boats were separated by 20 cm (8 inches) with Nick Aswad in third and Christos Atzemian in fourth. This set the stage for the next five races.

Since the club was only a short sail from the race course it was decided to bring the teams into the club between races so the they could get a hot lunch and the boat repair team could make any necessary repairs. The temperature was very comfortable on shore but cool on the water as the north wind brought down the cool arctic air. The second race was started later in the afternoon with winds slightly less than the first race. Again Thomas won with Panagiotis in second. Nick Aswad, while almost capsizing on the final downwind leg, finished in third followed by Chad Miller in fourth.

The second day of racing dawned with the winds still out of the north, but slightly less than the first day and yet cooler temperatures. The tight competitive racing continued through the two races, with Panagiotis winning both races and Thomas finishing in second. Christos finished in third in both races and Nick in fourth.

The third day of racing again dawned with the north wind still blowing and the temperature still dropping. The fifth race started in medium winds with continued tight racing. Panagiotis won the race with Thomas in second, setting up an interesting sixth and final race. If Thomas Sumner was to win his third Youth Championship, he had to win the last race. Nick finished in third and Christos in fourth, giving Nick a two-point lead over Christos for third. Ian and Chad were tied for fifth, with Alexios only two points behind in seventh.

At the first windward mark rounding of the final race of the Championship, Alexios was in first with Nick in second. One of the markset boats had Thomas 45 seconds behind the leader in seventh with Panagiotis in fifth. Throughout the next five legs, Thomas caught and passed the leaders finishing only a boat length or so ahead of Nick and Alexios, with Panagiotis in fourth. This gave Thomas his third Youth World Championship, Felipe Brito his second Championship and Felipe Gil his first. Panagotiotis, Timos Vlachos and Theodoros Poulakos tied with Thomas but lost the tie breaker based on who beat who in the last race, finishing second in the Championship. Nick Aswad with Connor Aswad, Peter Hazelett finished in third with Christos Atzemian with Faidon Kounas, Themis Parousis in fourth. The fifth through seventh places were tied on points with the tiebreaker going to the team that had the best finish in the Championship. Alexios Papoutsoglou, Maria Mesiskli, Kouros-Sokratis Moghaddam-Gholipour finished fifth with Chad Miller, Daniel Kagan, Tanya Miller in sixth and Ian Schillebeeckx, Beth Ward, Lucas Hofmeister in seventh. The three teams from Finland finish in eighth, ninth and tenth.

This was by far the most competitive Youth World Championship that I have attended. No position was decided until all six races had been completed. Not only were the teams very competitive but the Race Committee did a excellent job of setting the courses and the equal quality of the boats kept the racing close. Again the Lightning Class wishes to thank JVS and its organizers as well as the Suomen Lightningliitto for running an outstanding Lightning Youth World Championship.

Ollie Ahonen from JVS served as the regatta chairmen, and Sakari Pesola served as the chairman of the Suomen Lightningliitto (Finnish Lightning Class). Ollie and Sakke were my main contacts throughout the organization of this Youth Championship. Many e-mails were sent back and forth during the planning stages, and their dedication provided the base for a very successful Championship.

Per-Ole Holm, an International Judge, served as the head of Jury, and Timo Lippas was the Race Chairman. Both Ollie and Timo were members of JVS. The members of the Lightning Class came from all the various Fleets throughout Finland, most traveling hundreds of kilometers to be at the event.

Kimmo Aromaa, who sailed in both the 1980 and 1982 Youth World Championships, was responsible for the boats. I know that there were many working under Kimmo both their preparation and maintaining them through out the regatta. They were found working on the boats when we arrived in the morning, during lunch break and late into the evenings. Rumor has it that they didn't leave till after dark every night (with 20+ hours of daylight that made for a very long day). But this dedication made for very equal and competitive boats for each team. Others that helped throughout the championship are listed below.



How the West was Won

Last October a former Class champion asked me, "How are you going to defend your title at NAs in San Diego? Up to that point in time I had considered our victory in Sheboygan as a bit of a welcome fluke. However, over time the idea grew on me, and I prepared for San Diego in the same fashion as I had for Sheboygan—lots and lots of crewing, physical work outs and boat preparation. I also made sure this regatta would be fun for us. My dad had retired and was going to help me drive the boat the 1,900 miles to San Diego. My wife, Chris, and our two boys, Patrick and Tim, were going to fly out. After the regatta we would take several days in southern California as a family vacation. These NAs would be all about fun. If the regatta worked out OK then that would be great too.

If you want to read a regatta write up that is a "box score," you can read someone else's article. This one is mostly about why the Lightning Class is so great—although there is a bit on the racing too.

My Top 10 list of fun stuff at the San Diego North Americans:

- 10. **MBYC Mai Tais**—Only drink one per day; two is pain the next morning, and three induces coma. But one is OK!!
- Great Friends—This regatta was a reunion: Bill Buckles, Mario, Telma and Marc Buckup, Gary Demarest, Greg and Leenie Florian, Sean Carroll, Phil Parshley, John DiBenedetti and Dr. Jim Sears, plus our new found friends and whole crew in the daily "Mai Tai corner" of the MBYC bar. Good luck in the 470s Katie!
- The Ruhlman Armada—This family has enough boats for their own Lightning District. Hey, since all three made the Blue Fleet, they could get Abby her own boat and get the extra NAs qualifier in '07!
- MBYC Crew—Jeff Coppens, Pete Bellin, Scott Finkboner, Kirk and Edna Johnson and too many MBYC members to name, super hospitality and graciousness, a wonderful week of activities, culminating

with an unforgettable Luau Awards Banquet in the sand. BTW, who won the keys to the Woody anyway?

- 6. **Tobi the Seal**—Each morning (except for one) we'd sail out by the channel buoy and say "Hello" to the lounging seals basking in the sun. We named our favorite one "Tobi" for the obvious reasons.
- 5. Sailing the qualifiers instead of taking a bye. It was the perfect warm up for our team, Dan and Tobi Moriarty and myself. We needed the time in the boat but didn't get so much that we remembered any bad habits.
- 4. **Juniors**—On the race course (but not the bar), finishing well and conducting themselves with Class and good sportsmanship.
- 3. **Families**—Watching the MacDonald kids put the family boat away after a day's racing. I don't think I'll ever forget the sight of their five-year old daughter trying to push the boat into the parking space from underneath the transom!
- 3408 Beachwalk Condo—Team Yeti, Todd & Christine Wake, Ben Spiller and Lal (my dad). We all shared a condo, tuned up, shopped, drank, ate, commiserated and watched seagulls drink from lawn sprinklers together. Try the sea gull trick after several Mai Tais!
- The Racing Competition—Parking next to Jim Carson, Jeff Linton, Jeff Coppens, Bill Mauk and near by Allan Terhune's teams. After each day's tight racing, we'd decompress and laugh about the twists of fate and manna from heaven, etc. What a great group of fierce, friendly competitors this Class has!

OK, now the racing. This regatta will be long remembered for the venue, beautiful conditions where "Ground Hog Day" meant another day in sailing paradise. This year the qualifiers were sailed in 8–12 knot sea breeze with moderate ocean swells and relatively big wind driven chop. During the practice race and qualifiers, we noticed the wind variations were very hard to see due to the wave texture on the water, but they did not appear in sheets, as in lake sailing, but rather in "lanes" or "columns" like long narrow fingers reaching downwind. Getting to a lane of 2–3 knots more breeze (and the shift) before the competition was very important, as it meant we could shift into a higher pointing mode with the velocity.





Technical Stuff

We deviated from our standard tuning for these conditions (as we had in Sheboygan) and discovered that it worked well for the long starboard tacks directly into the chop. Racing with three skippers on board can be difficult, so all I did was focus on sail shape and steering technique in the waves. Dan and Tobi Moriarty did everything else and were strong communicators keeping me from "mushing" weed and grass patches. Their expert boat handling skills directly translated to speed (upwind and down) and showed why they are highly prized as team mates. We felt as fresh as a Sheboygan morning and were hoping for another week of living a charmed life.

Qualifiers

I was concerned that we won the qualifiers because I knew that only two or three times had the winner gone on to win the championship. However, I am not superstitious (although maybe a slow learner) and remembered that once the jinx was broken by Mark Bryant in San Diego in 1980, so there was precedence. Larry MacDonald with his all star family team of Adam and Joy were tied with the family teams of Jeff and Amy Linton (Mark Taylor also along) and Allan and Katie Terhune (with Kris Smith) with five points. With

the conditions being fairly consistent from one race to another (ignoring some bizarre variations series in the top five in the series. We were happy for our friends Dan and Michou Richelsdorfer who won the coveted Fallon Trophy and made the Blue Fleet. Hearing Bill Neal relate the lore of Tom O and Marie Fallon's contributions to the ILCA for those who had not met them was a true delight.

Racing

The Championship Series-I made a bad error early on the way out to the race course. We did not sail by the channel marker to commune with the sea lions as we had done during the qualifiers. These are beautiful animals who luxuriate in the warm sun and eye the sail boats gliding by. The real mistake was leaving the boat in the same "gear" as it had been during the qualifiers. This became a huge problem as the wind in race #1 was only 8-10 knots, and we were not set up for the lighter stuff, I botched the start, pin balled the first third of the beat and failed to find a good lane upwind. We rounded about tenth but then were cut down like weeds by taking too deep gybing angles (again thinking like the breezier qualifiers) and eventually finished twenty-eighth. No excuses here. A mental error had put our dreams of a repeat championship in real danger. I also assumed the Native American alias of "Kelp on Rudder." We were beaten out of sight so badly I did not even know that David, Jody and Tom Stark

Race #2

Tobi snapped us out of the funk from our 28th, and we reviewed what had worked previously and why it had worked. We re-tuned for the lighter conditions and then started to have some fun. Allan Terhune was launched, and we spent time tracking him down to finish second, with "bouncing Hallagan" third." Dick had a potential disaster in the morning when his hoisting bridle ring opened, and his boat fell on to the trailer but sustained no obvious damage. Dick has sailed a beautiful regatta in 1980 at the same venue with his now-grown kids, Jean and David, and clearly he had not forgotten any of his successful techniques since. He was very fast. Team Linton-Linton-Taylor had one great and one bad race, and only Terhune and Starck were sailing consistently at this point in the regatta. After years of chasing Larry MacDonald, I knew we'd see him roaring back in the series. This was shaping up to be an uphill battle with some of the toughest competitors in North America and the enormous talents from South America, Buckup, Herman and Reid in the fray.

We definitely felt as though race #2 was a more representative effort of how we could sail, but everyone else was figuring out the venue too. As a result, by the end of each day's races, I would be fried mentally and wanted to surrender the helm. After race #2, Tobi sailed the boat in as we were chatting back and forth with the Terhune team and just loving the 14 knots and bright sunlight conditions, as well as the opportunity to "race" the President's Cup competitors in through the jetty to the hoist. PRO Stan Betts had run a four-leg race for the Green fleet, helping them get to the hoist first, a very popular move in the large Green Fleet.

Day #2—Races 3, 4 and 5

We did not think about the pervious day's disaster and recovery. We focused on the little steps that make for a good race and only on what was in front of us, getting off the starting line and finding a workable upwind lane. My team had a great attitude, great communications and clearly it worked for us. Pre-race I spent some time "loving" the boat (cleaning and rubbing her bottom) and talking with new friends to help put me in the right mindset for a pivotal day. We had to regain control of our destiny this day or see the chance for a repeat championship fade forever. **Race #3:** "The race with the big left turn." The sea breeze pumped fifteen degrees left to 255 degrees and stayed there on the first run. We were well placed and came away with a modest win in a four-leg downwind finish race, with Juan Reid of Chile pacing us and Jeff "I choose left" Linton third. Allan Terhune collected his only non-top ten race (a 14th, his eventual throw out). Things were getting interesting in this series as the wind and chop were both less than the day before.

Race #4: With the race course set more to the left, the orientation of starboard tack was more into the chop as the sea breeze strengthened and the chop was becoming a factor again. Juan Reid was launched and there was no catching him. We worked hard to claw up to Linton, but he shut the door beautifully at the finishing pin, so we ducked and followed them across for third. Tom Allen and Bill Fastiggi followed in fourth, fifth and Terhune sixth. At this point in the series, we had no idea what the points were but only saw that our performances were much better and that the Linton, Terhune and Reid teams were sailing very well. We were grateful that a third race was signaled for the day.

Race #5: I totally destroyed a perfectly good start and relied on Dan and Tobi to serve as "air traffic control" and find a lane on port as we bailed out as early as possible and took many transoms to find a lane. They found the most beautiful, big, wide open lane in pressure that we'd seen all week long. We started to sail fast and found a way to recover from the start. Brief forays left were OK, but it was clear that the game was on the right. We also noticed some current lines where weeds accumulated but did not figure out how to take advantage of them. The pressure was up on the runs and we, Allan and Jeff gained separation from the Fleet. Al gained on us but we held him off. Linton was third with Fast Brian Hayes (Carter Utzig and Laura Jeffers on board) were fourth. They left did no favors for Juan Reid, however, who collected a thirty-first.

During the race we also pulled the spinnaker halyard tail all the way through the spin sheet block in the corner and could not sheet in or out and wondered if the chute COULD come down. Somehow Tobi fixed the problem by untying knots very quickly. This had never happed in seven seasons in this boat, and it occurred twice in one-leg race, once the hoist and once on the take down. These Gremlins made me nervous.



Series Day #3—Race #6

The run for the roses. I finally looked at the standings, and it appeared the sailing conditions had torn the Fleet into many pieces in races #1-5. After 4th place, point gaps between places were eight to ten points. Assuming a race #6 occurred (to allow for a throw out), only three boats could win. Going into this final race we had seven points and a twenty-eighth as a throw out, Jeff Linton with eleven points and a twety-first as a throw out and Allan Terhune with fifteen points with a fourteenth as a throw out. Team Starck was solidly in fourth with twenty-one points with a twelfth as a throw out. The dynamics of a three-boat duel meant that it would be a significant risk for any one boat to try to sail someone out of the race. The theory of the case was that if one boat was sailed out of it, the other might slip by. It appeared to be to the advantage of all three boats to go out and race for it rather than resort to "funny stuff," although if it happened, we felt confident with our hand-to-hand combat skills. However, if we finished fifth or better, we would win the regatta no matter where any other team finished. This final fact encouraged us to absolutely go for it in a tactical sense and let our speed do some damage.

The conditions were unique in this race, as the breeze was all the way around right to 310 degrees, and the starboard tack near the beach was where all the articles, local banter and common wisdom said you had to be. In the back of my mind was a similar situation in the last race of the 2003 Miami Worlds where the sea breeze pumped back against where it should have been (and hung me out to dry), so I was a bit nervous about where our competitors were. However, the start time was an hour earlier than the day

before, so if the sea breeze pumped as it did yesterday, it should be an hour further into that race, and if it went left there, it would be a huge potential gain for those bucking the local knowledge.


The start for us was like the lyric from song Alice's Restaurant..."and they all moved away from us on the bench." It was as if someone had poured oil on the water around us and there was a smooth two-boat length gap to leeward and to windward of us at the start. No one was near, and we obliged by tacking to port and marching to the beach. Three minutes after the start we were lined up on port with Coppens and Terhune off the hip to windward (in that order) sprinting to "right land" but never saw Linton. As it turned out, Linton was pinned on the left, and we did not see them until the windward mark. We tacked under the lay line and worked hard to gain altitude to make the mark through the chop. Al was immediately to leeward of us by two to three boat lengths but had to tack out and find a hole on the lay line with a three to four boat group immediately behind us, rounding about fourth.

Rounding first caused us to get conservative. Al and Jeff followed us to the right on the run (looking down wind), but Al gybed onto port first on a good streak, passing us in the process. We picked the left gate and followed Al up wind. After wriggling free upwind, Al showed how fast he is off the wind and passed us a second time, along with Larry Mac Donald going into the beach side gate. We decided to keep our distance, rounded the unfavored gate in third for the last beat to the finish. Larry had a solid performance, and the second place finish lifted them to fifth in the regatta. I have no doubts that sometime soon Joy and Adam MacDonald's names will be on the North Americans perpetual trophy.

By our not fully committing to the right of the last beat, we opened the door for Dick Hallagan (who was VERY fast all week), who put the pedal down and passed into third place. We were hedging to the left because Jeff Linton was out there again and was the closest boat to us in the overall standings (until Al's victory), so we covered them to the finish. Al won the race and lifted their team to second overall, by two points, over Team Linton, who was seventh in the race.

When the horn sounded, we were 4th, had successfully defended and there was no muting the enormous yell and falling down group hug. Maybe Sheboygan wasn't a fluke? Just like last year, Tobi sailed us home, and we had MacDonald and Coppens supplied champagne for the bowl, which we shared with the Class. I'll never forget the luau awards or the top ten list from the whole week. This regatta was so much more than a box score summary!

Thank you to Mission Bay Yacht Club for a great vacation! Huge thanks to my team mates, Dan and Tobi Moriarty, for their expert skill on and off the water. They create the positive environment that allowed this team to perform (and for driving the boat home while my family and I vacationed in Southern California). Thanks to my dad, Lal Burridge, for helping with the drive and spending a week with us—it was even better than the "good old days".



The biggest thanks go to my family, wife Chris and sons Patrick and Timothy who gave me the freedom to train year round for this one event and share in the many sacrifices that made our strong performance possible at this regatta.



We sailed the second race well and suddenly found ourselves out in the lead, coming into the last weather mark with Tom Allen Sr. and Michael Poltorak right on our heels. The last downwind was fun, with the three of us jockeying for position the whole leg. One boat length to the finish, we were neck and neck, and then a wave. Tom Allen Sr. got the best of it and won

with us in second and Michael Poltorak in third, all within a boat length. What a finish. Two good races, first to the hoist, there was sunshine, and we were out in front.

Day Four

Psyched that we were actually winning, we liberally applied zinc on the way out. It even covered our lips. All week, Ashley had wanted to see sea lions, so we journeyed past the red navigation buoy for pictures. BARK! BARK! Oops! We got a little too close for their comfort, although having one on our bow would have been amusing. We picked up where we left off the day before, winning the first race convincingly. Then things went down hill. We again got too excited, started making mistakes, and sailed two frustrating races. We all felt that we had fallen several places in the standings. It was to our surprise to discover that we were still in the lead! After some math, we knew the last race would determine the regatta, with Joel Humphrey, Bill Hofmeister, Tom Allen Sr. and Terry Burke all close behind us.

Day Five

Shortly thereafter, we realized that Bob Burke was a mile out in front and untouchable, so we focused on the boats near us, trying to catch up or at least hold our position. The second weather leg wasn't much better than the first. As we headed downwind for the last time, both Mike and I looked up and saw Joel several boats ahead of

us winning the regatta, followed closely by Bill. Slightly downhearted, we started saying "oh well" and "it was too good to last" when Ashley started talking about going upwind.

Wait, we have another leg!!

Mike and I had misread the course and thought we were finishing. Back into the race now, we sailed the last quarter of the leg focused, determined to catch boats upwind after a good rounding. Ashley was reading out numbers constantly, and we were able to take some steps up. Half way up the leg we could not only see the leader but had significantly closed the gap between us. Was this really happening? We had passed five boats by the time we were 100 lengths to the finish, including Joel and Bill. Time to cover. 50 lengths, 10 lengths, 5, 3, 1, did we get a gun...BANG! Euphoria overwhelmed us. We finished 4th and knew we'd won. It was the best I've ever felt sailing, especially after feeling dejected on the downwind, only to come back so dramatically.

What an amazing event. I want to thank Mission Bay Yacht Club, their staff, and Lightning Fleet 488 for putting together a fun regatta; all the participants for some very competitive racing; Steve and Jan Davis for use of their boats throughout the summer and for all they've done for sailing in Colorado as well as the Lightning Class; my lovely girlfriend Elizabeth, who just started sailing this summer and loves it, for driving out to San Diego with me and for being her; and finally, Mike Ledger and Ashley Jerman—none of this would have been possible without the two of them. They are great sailors, good friends, and fun to hang out with. I look forward to sailing and sharing stories with them in the future. 'Til then, Shake 'n Bake!

2006 Women's North American Championship

The first false start occurred when an unexpected health concern prevented the 'boat delivery person' from being able to make the trip. Plan "B" quickly went into action when Denise's husband, Ken, offered to deliver the double-decked boats (Stone Cold and Ric Larson's boat, also from Sheboygan) to San Diego. Ken arranged to use his father's van for the trip which offered plenty of storage room for boat supplies, luggage (think 3 women) and even enough room for stretching out for a quick nap (think driver saving hotel expenses)!

The second false start involved a crew member switch. When a new job opportunity changed the plans of the third crew member a mere two weeks before the event, Amy Simonsen came to the rescue with a very quick, 'Yes, I would love to go—let me re-arrange my (and my families') sched-ule!" Once again Plan "B" came into play.

Denise and Kathy arrived at Southwestern Yacht Club Monday morning to find that Ric and his crew found the boats first and already had them separated (yeah!). We noticed that not all the braces had been removed from the trailer, though, and quickly determined why. Luckily, Nick (all round helpful, sweet man who provided endless hours of work manning the davits, getting the lunches, and providing whatever general help was needed throughout the week) happened to walk by and make the mistake of saying, "Let me know if there is anything I can do for you!" Nick put all his strength into removing the last of our stripped bolts so the struts could be removed, and we could move on to boat setup. Thanks again, Nick. Then on to a very easy and fast boat measurement process. Thanks, Bill and team.

Although the number of participants was disappointing, the level of competition each team brought to the regatta made for an exciting event. We first met Meagan Ruhlman at the 2004 NAs held at the Buffalo Canoe Club. She was a junior skipper who had her boat moored next to ours and finished 3rd in that event. We first competed against her at the 2005 Women's NAs in Milwaukee, and then again the NAs in Sheboygan, so we knew she would be tough competition.

And tough it was! At the end of Day 1, with 2 races completed, we are tied with Meagan winning the tiebreaker (1-2, 2-1). Meagan wins the first race of Day 2 and is leading in the third race. We get close enough to her on the last downwind to engage in a tacking duel on the final upwind leg. The first 2 tacks don't appear to be working in our favor, but persistence pays off. By working ourselves to her left, we finally get between her and the finish. At the end of Day 2, with 4 races completed, we are still tied, but we win the tiebreaker (1-2-4-1, 2-1-3-2). Now for Day 3. Meagan has an excellent start in the first race and gains a lot of distance on the remaining fleet. Avis Bridgers and her team from North Carolina have been steadily improving every day, and they too are having a great race. They split from

the fleet early on and come back with a nice lead over us. We now are two points behind Meagan going into the final race, but there are no negative thoughts. After all, this is what we came here for! Let's just "Git R Dun!" Oops that is another Ruhlman...

Our focus in that final race was to race as hard and as smart as we possibly could and see what happens. We have a good start and keep great boat speed both upwind and downwind. Avis has another great race and again takes second. Our 1st place finish in the final race gets 'Stone Cold' the trophy!

San Diego proved to be an excellent venue for the event. It was worth the drive! (Just ask our Boat Delivery Man). The Southwestern Yacht Club was wonderful and the hospitality exceptional. The racing conditions, with warm temperatures (same everyday), consistent winds (same everyday), gentle swells (almost the same everyday), and beautiful scenery, will be hard to beat. Thanks to all who made the event possible.

**Just a note regarding participation levels of Women's and Junior N/A Championship events. These events provide great opportunities for participants at a VERY reasonable cost. Our Class supports these events from the Executive level, but it needs to be better supported through the Districts and down to the Fleets. Our team challenges each District and Fleet to help increase next year's participation in both of these events. It will be a Fleet and Class building experience!

Thanks to the Southwestern Yacht Club for doing such a great job with the Lightning North American Masters' Championship!

2006 Lightning South American Championships "How the South was Won" (but not by us!!) Brian Hayes

Matt Burridge's fine article in a recent Lightning Flashes, titled "How the West was Won," showed how he and his team managed the travel, the conditions and the competition to win the North American Championships in San Diego. This article is an exact mirror to Matt's in that it will cover the overall experience but will differ with one notable exception. The author of this article and his team did not even come close to winning the South American Championships. In fact, due to many circumstances directly within our control, we were barely able to compete and, in fact, featured a scorecard with more letters than a healthy serving of alphabet soup.

It started innocently enough. New ILCA President, Steve Davis, our Class Executive Secretary, Jan Davis, and I decided that, if everything fell into place, we should try to go to the South Americans in Salinas, Ecuador, so that we could: a) get together with the South American Lightning sailors to hear their ideas and opinions on the Lightning Class, b) show the international Lightning community that the Class Office and officers were committed to growing the class internationally, and c) "show 'em how it's done"!! Well, two out of three ain't bad.

October 30, 2006—Introduction to Ecuador

I leave my house at 6:00 AM for a 10:25 direct flight from JFK to Guayaquil. I have two bags, my laptop, a couple of hundred dollars, very limited international travel experience and a couple of years of junior high school Spanish as my assets. Jan and Steve leave at around 8:00 AM Denver time but have stops in Houston and Panama City before arriving in Guayaquil. My flight lands on time at around 5:00 PM, and after collecting all my stuff, I meet up with Arturo, Paco Sola's crew. I am whisked away to a local Café where we chat in "Spanglish" and await the arrival of several other local fleet members.

Juan Santos arrives first. Juan's English is similar to my Spanish. Then more local sailors arrive. Carlos Lecaro, Santiago Romero and a few others. At around 8:00 PM I am then whisked away again, this time to dinner with the "guys" at the Banker's Club in Guayaquil. After a great dinner I am taken back to the airport where I see Jan and Steve just as they arrive. The three of us hop into a waiting van and head off to Salinas, which is about two hours away. It is 11:00 PM. We arrive at the Barcelo Hotel (pronounced bar-sell-o) in Salinas at 1:00 AM. Our accommodations, which have been arranged by Santiago Romero, are perfect. The hotel is quite nice and new with many modern amenities, which we are soon to discover, are not featured in many areas of Salinas. We arrange the sleeping so that Jan and Steve get the bedroom and I get the cot in the common area, and we crash at around 2:00 AM.

October 31, 2006—"Try the Ceviche!!"

Our team begins to stir early. We are all used to getting up fairly early, especially President Davis. If Steve isn't cranked up and doing something by 6:00 AM, I am told, there is something wrong. Steve's the Energizer Bunny. Last to bed, first awake. (More on this later). Carlos Lecaro comes by the Barcelo and picks us up around 11:00 AM for the two-mile drive to the Salinas Yacht Club ("cloob-day-yots" for the taxi drivers). The Club is awesome. Plenty of room. Two hoists. Lightning Bar. We find our boat and rig it, as there is not much activity at the Club on a Tuesday. After a while Jan and Steve decide it's time for lunch. We sit in the outdoor restaurant. Now I'm not saying this is verbatim, but this is my recollection of the conversation.

Jan: Oh, they say we have to have the ceviche!

Brian: What's ceviche?

Steve: Oh, it's a mix of things like squid, shrimp—sort of a salad kinda thing.

Brian: And you eat this?

Jan: Oh, it's delicious!

Steve: (to server) Uno ceviche mixto por favor!!

Jan: (to server) Si!! Ceviche mixto!!

Brian: (to server) Diet Coke and toast...por flavor!! (my Spanish is not good!)

6 minutes later ...

Steve: This is really good!! How's yours, Jan?

Jan: Awesome!!

Brian: My toast tastes great-if you're interested.

The rest of the day went harmlessly. We met Marcelo Leon and his wife and crew and sit at the Lightning Bar and had dinner with them and a few others while sharing lots of stories and great laughs. We retired back to the Barcelo, and Jan went off to bed while Steve and I went to the bar and casino (we won \$30) before retiring.

November 1, 2007-Why is that Lady on the Ground?

Wednesday dawned, and the practice race was scheduled for 2:00 PM. We helped Marcelo with his boat, as well as Olaf Dyck and Cristobal Perez. We sailed out with perhaps 13-14 other teams for the practice race, a five-leg windward leeward, and raced four legs, then dropped out to sail against some of the competitors to check their trim and set up.

Opening ceremonies were scheduled for 8:00 PM (which, come to find out, really means about an hour later Ecuador time), and Jan, Steve and I arrived plenty early. A traditional flag raising ceremony, with Jan doing the honors for the lone US team, was followed by a formal indoor ceremony with many dignitaries, including Steve, giving speeches.

Now I'll stop here because this is about the time that our trip turned from being fun and frivolity to an exercise in creative crew replacement and stamina. Remember the ceviche from early?? Well here it comes. Literally...

After dinner was served, Steve was chatting with Paco while I was attempting to ply some of the locals into a drinking game when I hear, "She passed out. She fell straight to the floor." Now I'm not certain what or who they are talking about, but I look on the balcony and I see Jan surrounded by many concerned sailors. Steve darts outside and I follow. Jan had passed out and fallen down. Not sure why but she doesn't look well, and we quickly ask for a ride back to the Barcelo so she can rest. Needless to say, Jan is totally incapacitated for the next 24 hours. Details not required. (See above: ceviche!!) I adopt a new mantra. Cerveza, rum, toast!!!

November 2, 2006—How Do You Say Jib in French?

We awake for the first day of the championship, short one crew. Jan is out. We put her on the "unable to perform" list, give her bananas, juice and water and head to the club. I have a 9:00 AM clinic scheduled (which, as we learn, is really 9:40), and we need to find a third for the day. The clinic goes well as I use a whiteboard to draw prebend concepts and discuss headstay sag in my best Spanglish. We all head over to my boat and display the effect prebend has on the sail shapes and field questions as best I can. The "reunion de Capitains" is at 11:00 AM (which really means, to my amazement, 11:00 AM), and I listen in and catch a few key phrases while being assisted by Paco with some translations.

Racing is at 1:30 PM, and at noon Steve and I are introduced to our third, Pierre. Pierre is a Spanish and English speaking Frenchman living in Ecuador (and I thought I had identity issues!!). His kids are sailing the Opti Regatta, and he is game to go racing. He is very good. Pierre quickly gets the hang of proper heel and can fly the kite well. We finish the day with a 10,1,OCS. Steve looks tired. Kinda sluggish. Pierre is fresh as a daisy. We have a cerveza and head back to the hotel to check on Jan. Dinner is at 9:00 PM (yeah right) on the beach, and we want to see how Jan is doing. We have a 7:00 PM meeting scheduled for the ILCA but postpone it until Friday, as we don't think Jan will be up to it today. Steve looks tired and curls up in bed at 6:30 PM. Jan does the same. I don't see either of them until the next day.

The beach party is awesome. Our host, Xavier Monge, has the party right in front of his home on the beach. I arrive at 9:00 PM (way to early), find the baño (bathroom) and grab a glass of wine. A bonfire is stoked up, and tables are set up on the beach as well as two bars, dozens of tiki torches and a huge buffet. I gather near one of the bars and chat with many fellow sailors. All are concerned about Jan, and I am now concerned about Steve. Remember Steve is the Energizer Bunny. He's in bed at 6:30. Not good. I finally eat around 10:30 and sit with Cesar Baquerizo and his wife and enjoy some great conversation and learn more about Ecuador, the Galapagos Islands and the Salinas Yacht Club. The Baquerizo's kindly offer me a lift back to the hotel, and I gladly accept it so I am back and in bed by 1:00 AM.

November 3, 2006—Who's This Guy Who Looks Like Steve??

I am the first one to wake up. I knock on Steve and Jan's door. 9:00 AM. "You guy's alive in there?" A minute later Jan comes to the door. I ask Jan, "How ya feelin'? "Better," she replies. Steve is in a fetal position on his bed. "Is that a good sign?" I ask her. She nods, "Nope." OK. Plan C.

Steve awakes and is determined to sail. Jan is up to it today as well. Jan is at 60%. We estimate Steve at 35-40%. Nearly 100% between the two of them. Not bad. Jan and I prepare the boat while Steve rests upstairs at the club. We drop the boat in and chase the fleet out to the start line. Steve sleeps in the bow. Jan and I chat about lots of stuff (but ceviche is off the topic list). We start the day with a third, but our stamina is not good, and we get worse as the day goes on, not quite getting left enough and sailing poorly in general, to finish with a 9,14. We sail in and Steve looks green. Jan is better.

We have a South American ILCA organizing meeting that Steve is to run, but we get him back to the hotel and put him to bed. We won't see him for another 14 hours. Jan and I run the roundtable discussion, and we come away from the meeting with a lot of good ideas and a feeling that, under the right circumstances, the opportunity for future success for the Lightning in South America is attainable. We are excited to see that the local sailors are anxious to help. Time will tell how we successful we are as a team in moving forward and implementing some of the ideas that were discussed at this meeting.

That evening is the awards dinner for the "Copa de Santiago Romero." It is an annual race sponsored by Santiago Romero. The race had been held about two weeks prior, but the party is really what it is all about. Starting promptly at 9:00 PM (read: 10:00 PM) this was an event not to be missed!! Open bar, sushi bar, pasta bar, chicken, steak, shrimp, six-piece band, beautiful trophies for the winners and personalized t-shirts for every one who competed with a caricature of each competitor on their own t-shirt. This event was first class all the way!! Dancing, food, interesting party masks (ask Jan!). One thing I do know. A great party translates well in any language!!

November 4, 2006—Finally, We're all in One Piece, Except the Mainsheet!!

Saturday morning comes and Steve is moving and Jan is moving. Everyone is healthy(ish)!! Finally our team is together. Let's see if we can salvage this regatta. Three good finishes can put us in a position to be as good as 2nd. I'm confident we can do it. Steve has much more energy today, and Jan is way better. We head out to the course with high spirits. I do a survey of the boat on the way out. Looks good. But..."Hey Steve. You think that little chafe in the mainsheet is OK? Oh well. Gonna have to be since it's an internal boom sheeting. We can't re-tie it". (Note the clever use of fore-shadowing here)

First race of the day we win the pin. Sail fast to the left (re-read results of Pavlov experiments the previous evening). We were fast enough to get under Juan Santos' bow and tack and led at the first mark. We held our lead on the run and lost two boats from the right on the next beat. Lost another (from the right) on the run for a 4th. We're still in the game. Two more top 5s gives us a small chance for 2nd and a good chance at top 5.

Race #8. Individual recall. Is it us?? We go back. Last at first mark. Last at 2nd mark but closer. We work left, and the boats on the right go light. We get breeze and a header. Back in the game again!! We tack. BIG lift!! Top 10?? Maybe better?? BANG!!! Now I don't ever remember breaking a mainsheet before in a Lightning. Been sailing them for the better part of four decades. Can't even recall SEEING a mainsheet break. But there is a first for everything. Broken mainsheet + internal sheeting boom = thanks for coming, your consolation prize is backstage. We limp into the club holding the tail of the mainsheet 1:1 and begin to break the boat down. We slip of the boom end cap and re-lead the mainsheet so the boat is ready to go for the next time. This certainly wasn't the boats fault. It is our responsibility to check the equipment and make certain it is race ready. With all the other "items" on our agenda during the week, we missed the chafing on the sheet. Our scores were 10,1,OCS,3,9,14,4,DNF,DNS. Solidly 12th. Mid-fleet. Not quite as good as Juan Santos and his team. They had 2,3,4,2,(11),2,1,4,2. Dominating!! Congratulations to Juan and his team. They sailed great!

The awards dinner was as impressive as every other party. There was food, wine and dancing as usual. Carlos Lecaro, the regatta chairman, did an excellent job as the Master of Ceremonies (I could easily be out of a job). Each competitor was recognized as well as individual race winners. Also, in ILCA tradition, a raffle was held with 100% of the proceeds donated to the local Red Cross (which everyone agreed is a great way to allocate the funds). Carlos and Company raffled off twenty North Sails hats and bags as well as miscellaneous ILCA gear. They were HOT items!! The crowd was in a frenzy!! Good times!! 



European Championship Jyväskylä, Finland



The Lightning Class European Championship began in Jyväskylä with Greek domination. After three races on the first day, only one Finn, one Swiss and one Brazilian boat were in the top ten.

After the three races are over, the experienced Swiss team, lead by Urs Wyler in "Meltemi" along with crew members Walter Dürr and Gilbert Dürr, were in the lead. Wyler had already sailed 30 years in the Lightning Class world elite. In second place were the young Greeks in "Krinis," captained by Christos Atzemian and crewed by Faidon Kounas and Themis Parousis.

The Brazilians, Thomas Sumner, Felipe Brito and Felipe Gil, slipped to third place. They were also the current Youth World Champions and were are competing in the Open European Championships, though they could not win the actual title of European Champion.

On the first race day the most successful Finnish team was Matti Leppänen and his crew in "Gamma." This team, representing Tuusulanjärven Purjehtijat, was ninth in the competition with Kalle Ahola and Mari Leppänen as crew.

On the second day, the hosts themselves started to get a feel of the winds of Lake Päijänne. Kimmo Aromaa and his crew, sailing on "Masi VI," won Saturday's second race and rose to seventh place as the best Finnish team. However, in the gusts and shifts of Lake Päijänne, the top two from the previous day were the best.

The last day was a magnificent one for Panagiotis Verginadis and his crew. The day was sunny, but winds kept shifting. Panagiotis Verginadis, with his crew Timos Vlachos and Theodoros Poulakos, maneuvered the difficult circumstances best and took two number ones. That was enough to take them to the top of the results—just one point ahead of the Swiss skipper,



Urs Wyler. Urs, sailing on "Meltemi" with crew Walter Dürr and Gilbert Dürr, achieved yet another trophy position in an international regatta, but leading the regatta for two days, it must have been a disappointment.

"Krinis," with skipper Christos Atzemian and crew Faidon Kounas and Themis Parousis, was third in a very exciting regatta. All the Greek teams showed competitive seamanship—two out of three top places is not bad at all.

Then came Atzemian Panagiotis Verginadis, also from Greece, holding fourth place with an equal number of points. Five points behind them were the governing Youth World Champions from Brazil, Thomas Sumner and his crew. Otherwise, the top ten was comprised of all Greek sailors. The next best Finnish boat, Matti Leppänen's Gamma, was in eleventh place.

The Lightning Class European Championship ended on Sunday in Säynätsalo. There were three races that day, starting at 11:00 AM. The fleet returned to the harbour between 3:00 and 4:00 PM. The prize giving ceremony started at 6:00 PM at Juurikkasaari race harbour in Säynätsalo. Sailing events continued on Monday with the Lightning Class Youth Worlds.

Seventy Lightning Class boats sailed in the Atlantic Coast Championships this last weekend at Little Egg Harbor Yacht Club in Beach Haven, New Jersey, This event was sanctioned by the US Olympic committee to be a pre-qualifier for the US Pan American competition to be held in Annapolis in October of this year. The ultimate winner of that event will go on to represent the United States in the Pan American Games in Brazil in 2007. Seventy percent of the boats came from local states (NJ, PA, NY, MD, CT), but boats traveled from locations as far as Quebec, North Carolina and Michigan.

NORTH AMERICAN CHAMPIONS



The first National Championship was held when the first boat was publicly less than eight months old. Nineteen boats participated, and John Barnes won with three firsts.

In 1945, the Championship was renamed International, there being thirty some boats in "foreign" countries.

In 1961, the first Lightning World Championship was held, and that year the Internationals were renamed once again, this time to the North American Championships.

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
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
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


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
